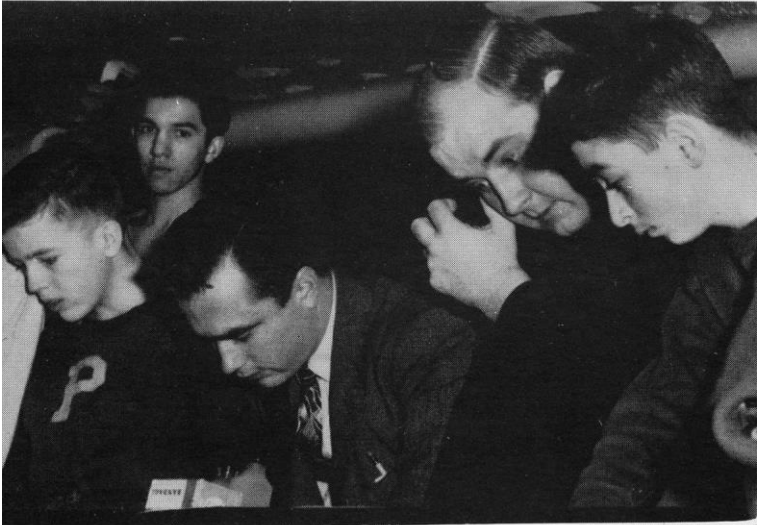
Track

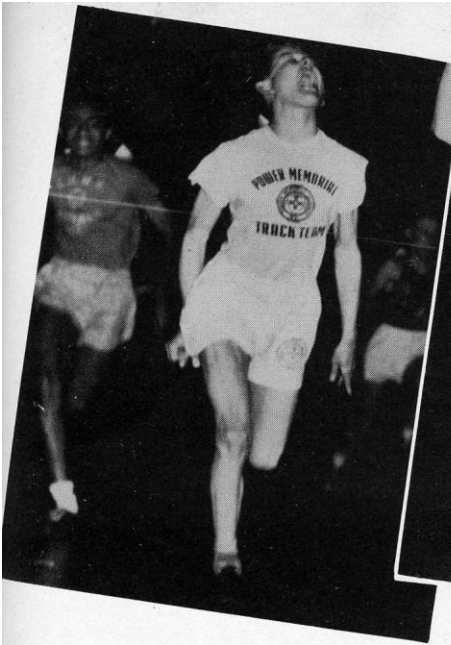
With the backbone of our strength in the Junior and Midget divisions, however, we hope for even more impressive seasons in the future.



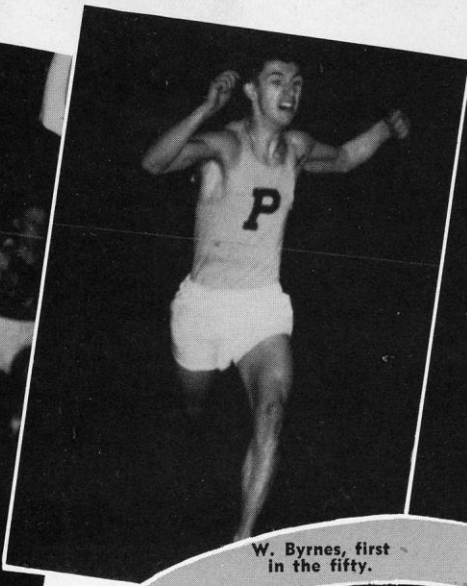

Beside the magic circle at Madison Square Garden in the C. H. S. A. A. championship meet.

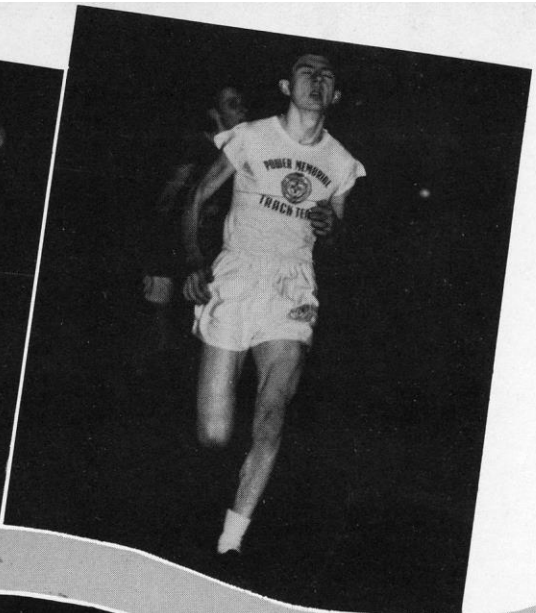




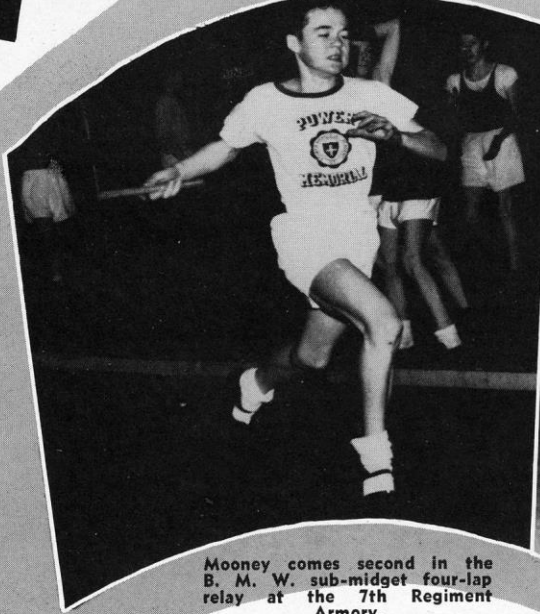
Lanthier leads his heat in the midget fifty.



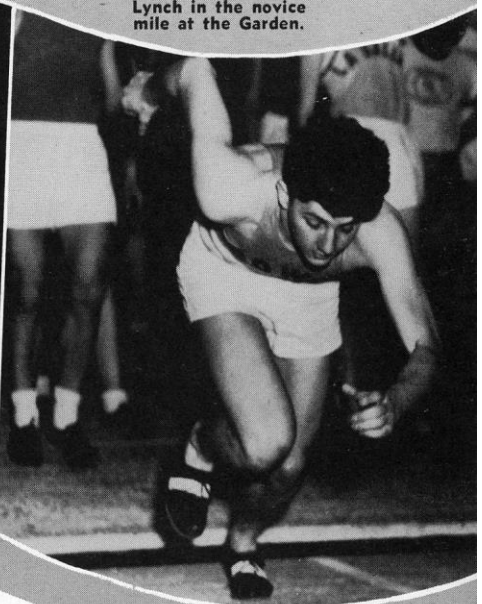
W. Byrnes, first in the fifty.



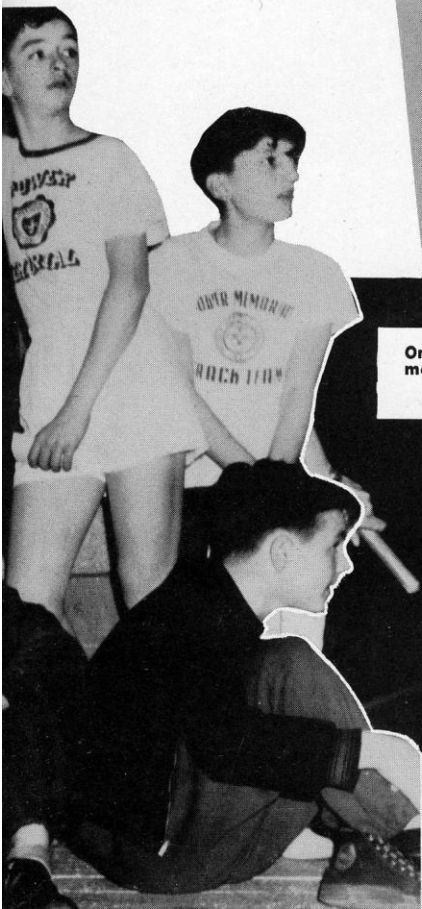
Lynch in the novice mile at the Garden.



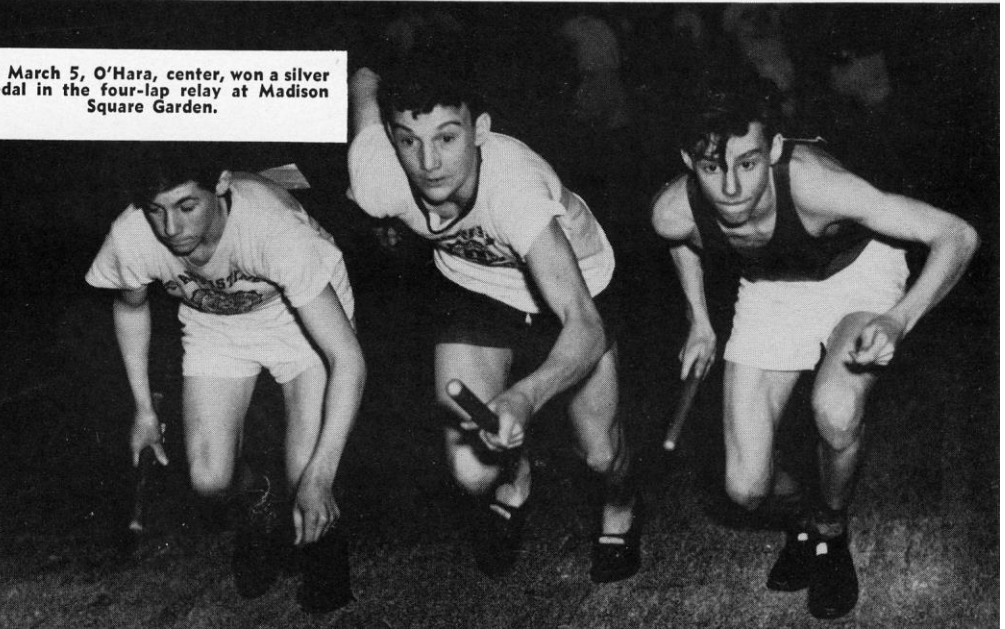
Mooney comes second in the B. M. W. sub-midget four-lap relay at the 7th Regiment Armory.

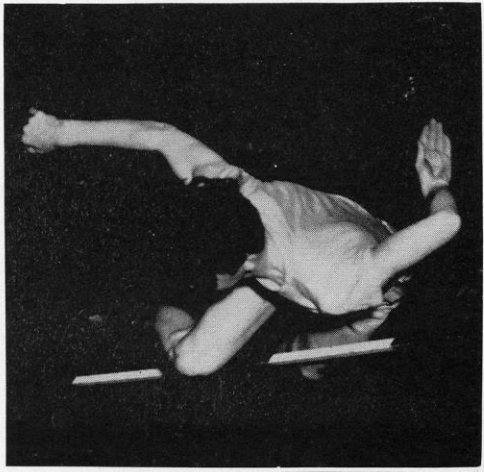


O'Connor lunges off the line to place for the senior 220 in the B. M. W. championship meet.



On March 5, O'Hara, center, won a silver medal in the four-lap relay at Madison Square Garden.





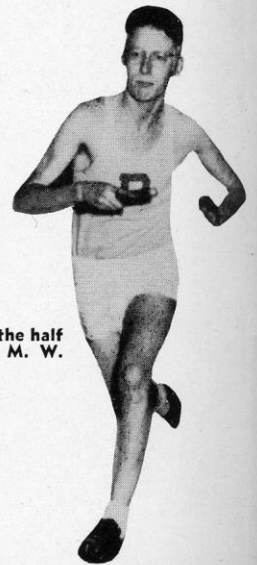
Tighe goes over a high one at the Garden.



Buckridge takes a gold medal in the novice 880 relay at the Garden.



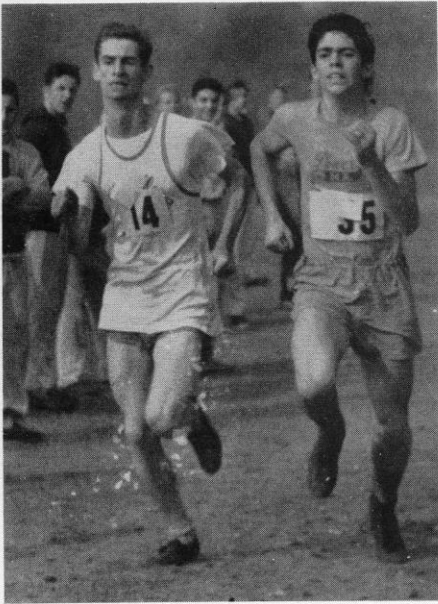
Rossler prances home first in the Junior half mile in the B. M. W. championship meet.

Another silver medal for O'Hara, left, for the four lap relay, this time in the 7th Regiment Armory.

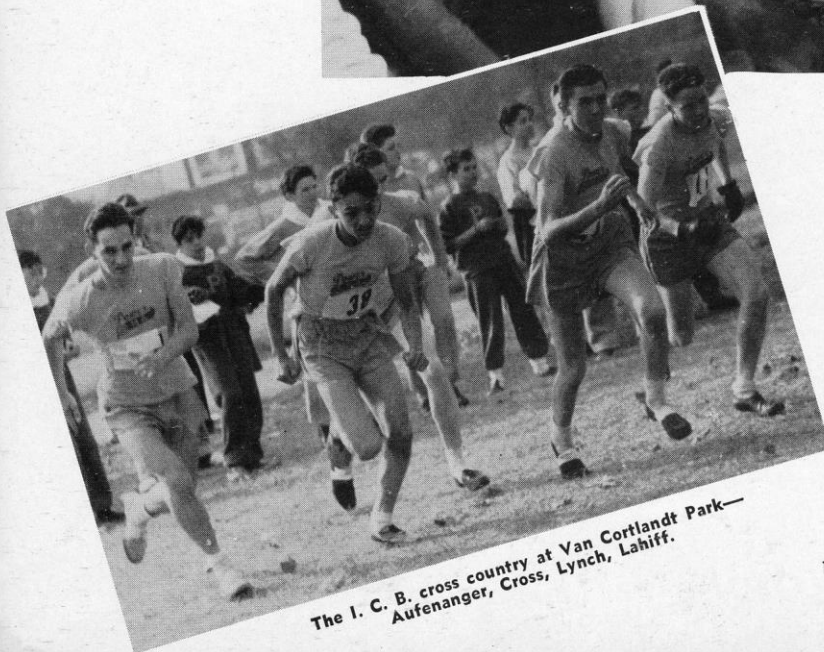




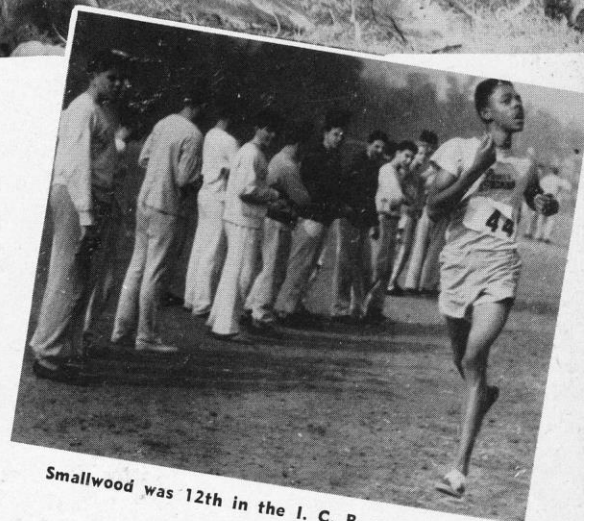
Baldwin, right, wins fifth place in the I. C. B. cross country.

Aufenanger, Cross, Lynch, Lahiff.



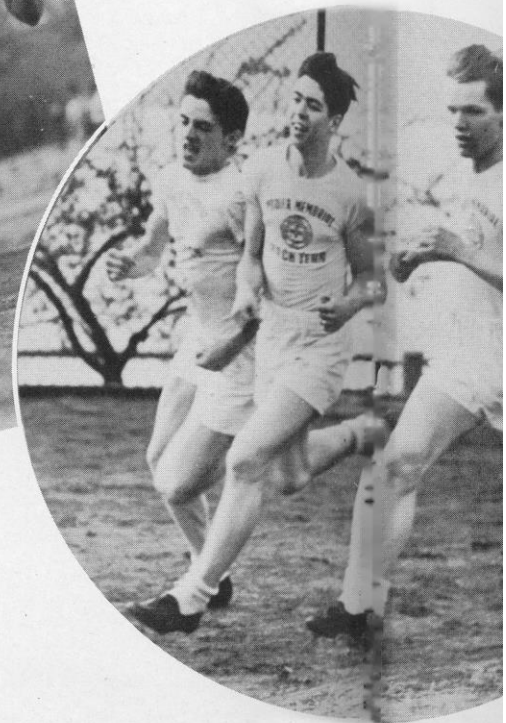

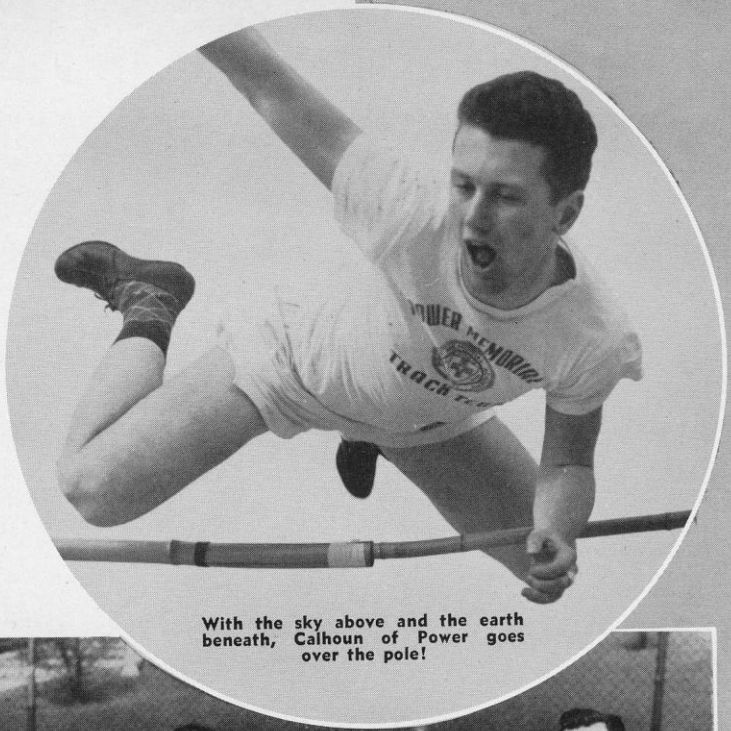
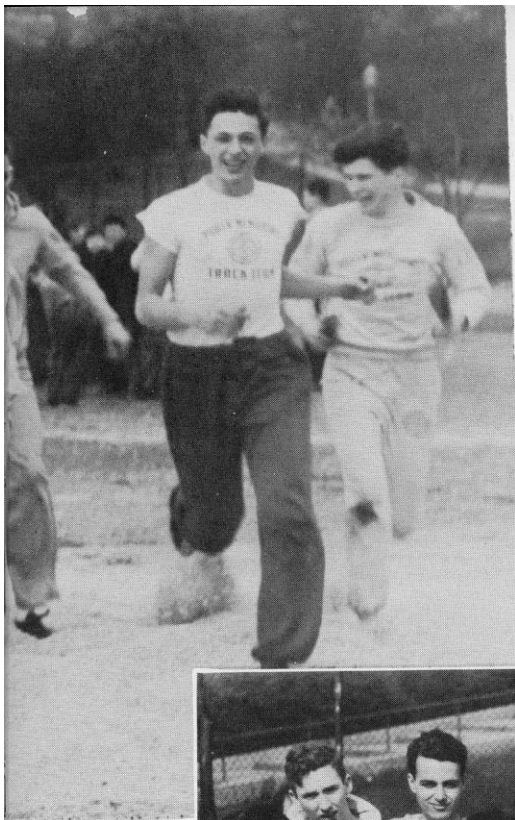

Dupre, Bailey, Sansone, Byrnes drive off the line to a fast start in a practice sprint at Riverside Drive.

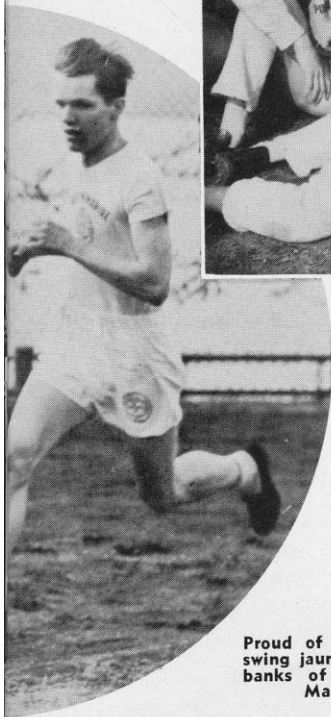




With the sky above and the earth beneath, Calhoun of Power goes over the pole!
