NEW YORK STATE Scholastic Track YEARBOOK

FOREWORD: THIS 1974 EDITION of the New York State Scholastic Track Yearbook has many changes designed to maintain--if not expand--its widely-acclaimed coverage of schoolboy track while, at the same time, cope with rising financial burdens.

Printing and distribution costs have continued to increase at an alarming rate. Therefore, for the Yearbook to continue as a viable enterprise--as an avocation--alterations in content and style were necessary, especially with advertising revenues registering only a moderate gain. The page-size was increased from 6" x 9" to 8½" x 11", enabling more information to be printed with basically the same size type in use as in last year's edition. On all performers' listings the names now are in capitals to enhance readability of the small type. The schools' locations have been dropped (such as Lathan for Shafer or Bellmore for Mepham) to conserve space. An exception is made for such schools as Monroe or Edison, which exist in more than one city.

The number of photographs has decreased a bit; although, they now are larger with improved quality. Also, a sort of exchange was made in the athletes' listings. The all-time lists were trimmed so that, at readers' requests, expanded yearly lists could be presented. Moreover, for the first time a set of national HS indoor class records is available, through the work of Jack Shepard, following the lead of this yearbook which published such records for the state for the first time last year.

By and large, then, you have a larger-sized yearbook with fewer pages--but with improved editorial and photographic content.

STATISTICAL EXPLANATION: The leagues and associations that govern scholastic track in New York State do an excellent job. However, the Yearbook believes that some of the rules imposed on athletes and competition by various groups are restrictive at times and do not enable full recognition of outstanding achievements. For the most part, therefore, the Yearbook follows the policies (some are noted here) of Track & Field News--the established "bible" of the sport--with regard to records and statistics.

The 1973 outdoor lists considered all marks made during the period of 12 months beginning Sept. 1, 1972 and ending Aug. 31, 1973 except for late summer marks made after this yearbook went to press in mid-July. Class marks are the best performances made by athletes while competing as freshmen, sophomores, juniors and seniors. An athlete is considered to be a junior, for example, until the first of Sept. prior to his senior year.

Furthermore, for purposes of maximum completeness, no performances have been excluded because of type of meet, form of competition or placing in an event. In cases where anemometers were not in use during sprints, hurdles and horizontal jumps, decisions concerning wind velocity were made on the basis of reliable reports by seasoned correspondents.

For indoor listings and records, no performance made outdoors during the winter season, regardless of the size and surface of the track, is acceptable. Oversized indoor tracks are more than 220 yards, and marks made on such tracks are so categorized.

Some frequently used abbreviations are: n-non-winning, h-high, m-meters, *-junior, **-sophomore, ***-freshman. (Other explanations and abbreviations appear throughout the Yearbook.)

PRICE: This Yearbook is heavier in weight than past editions and will cost more to mail (at least 50¢) on a first-class basis (3rd class is unpredictable, even careless). Also, there now is talk of an increase in general mail rates beginning in Jan., 1974. With this--and printing expenses--in mind, the Yearbook could not be priced lower than \$2.00 through the mail.

SUCCESS: Last year's 1973 edition sold almost 2,000 copies, a 30% increase over the previous year. There were 2,500 copies of this edition printed. Pass the word. If you're satisfied, let others know about it. HS coaches, especially. You are the yearbook's connection. I know you're out there (you received advertising flyers). Encourage your athletes to purchase the yearbook. Maybe your school library would be interested. Don't forget the parents of your athletes, the kid who ran for you five years ago, even opposing coaches. See our ad on page 10 to order additional copies.

Even if every copy is sold, the Yearbook will have problems next year if gains are not made in advertising revenue. Take advantage of the \$5 coaches ad. Or, if you run a track camp, conduct a meet or sell equipment, take advantage of the low display rates, which have remained the same since 1966. Full page-\$60, Half-page-\$35, quarter-page-\$20. Same rates for next year, and the deadline for the 1975 edition will be July 1. Reserve your space early.

INFORMATION: Keep up with HS track (and other sports) on a weekly basis through the NY State Sports Writers Assn, which publishes a bulletin throughout the year. See their ad on p. 34.

ABOUT THE AUTHOR: Marc Bloom, a New York City Junior High School English teacher, has had a love affair with HS track since he ran for Sheepshead Bay (with little success) in Brooklyn in the early sixties. He has written extensively about track for newspapers and magazines and has been a senior contributor for Track & Field News for the past decade. His first yearbook was published in 1967. The project has continued on an annual basis except for 1969.

New Yorkers nationally acclaimed in Banner Season

74 NYSST/Outdoor Review

The 1973 outdoor track season in New York State was one of enormous individual accomplishment. Week after week the dominant development was the continued success of a select few. Sure, there were the usual team duels, and wire-to-wire photo finishes and meet records. (What's track and field without meet records?) But the script of heroics rarely changed. Centrowitz and Belger and Berger and Gaughan and Masback and Franck and Alitz and Horton and Jankunis and Adler and Nathaniel, among others. Who did they beat and by how much? And how fast or far or high did they go?

It was a year when a 4:09 miler was second best by more than six seconds...a year when a 1:50.8 half-miler was third-team all-state...a year when injuries were costly to the state's top sprinters...a year with two 7-foot high jumpers, both ending their seasons on weak legs...a year when an "out-of-the-woodwork" two-miler added running acclaim to his heralded athletic repertoire.

It also was a year when five state records were broken in addition to several class marks. The '73 campaign was supposed to be among the most productive ever in New York. In many ways it was; in some ways it wasn't. Last year, predicting an extraordinary season, the yearbook asserted, "Never before have so many athletes returned with such impressive credentials."

Most of the athletes reached or exceeded their expectations. But several youngsters, for one reason or another, fell flat. Some teams fell flat, too. Moreover, a few events, in general, seemed flat at times. Hidden among the glitter and the glop were scores of strong young sophomores and juniors, many of whom were confined to relays last season. This spring, making their individual debuts, these competitors will form the core of the NY effort.

Here is a rundown of the season, event by event:

SPRINTS: It was a very ordinary year for sprinters. In the 100 22 athletes broke 10-flat. The most consistent was Lafayette junior Gerald Russell who had one 9.6(heat), two 9.7's and a 9.8. Those marks got him the Brooklyn, Kiwanis, Eddy and NY City titles. He was whipped, though, in the Easterns by city rival Carl McKenzie of Clinton, 9.8. McKenzie, who had a seasonal best of 9.7, was not the 9.5 smasher he was thought to be on the basis of his solid 9.6 in the summer of '72. A newcomer was Millbrook's Neil Green, a junior who had a pair of 9.8's including a decisive Inter-sectional(hereafter I-S) triumph. The 100 also was hurt by the recurring injuries of indoor 60(6.1) recordholder Dave Meyer, the pre-season favorite for dash honors. Meyer, who had a 9.7 best, posted his only major victory in the South Shore. Another junior, Manny Rosenberg of Valley Stream, best him in the Nassau meet; then, Meyer pulled up in the I-S. At this writing Rosenberg was about to leave for Israel to compete in the Maccabiah Games. All these underclassmen--including 9.9 frosh Fred Dugard of Edison(NYC)--offer great promise to revitalize this shortest of outdoor events.

The '74 220 also could be a hot number if Uniondale's Willie Smith can shake his leg injury. Off his 31.3 nation-leading indoor 300, the Knight flash was expected to be in the 21-flat neighborhood all spring...with New Rochelle's Keith Davidson right on his tail. Davidson, a step behind Smith indoors in 31.4, also got hurt early in the season. But he was able to rebound to a 21.8 I-S triumph. Smith took a weak fourth. NY City's Roy Lake(Boys) and John Stewart(Whitney) had the state lead with 21.5's. Lake, primarily a quarter-miler also had a 21.6 and 21.7, but Stewart edged him in the PSAL championships(after Lake won the 440). Dugard shattered the frosh record with a 21.9. Another freshman, Willie Combs of Central Islip, ran 22.2. Most races in the state are on the turn.

QUARTER-MILE: It was supposed to be all Lake, and to a large extent it was. After putting in 880's and 1320's through the relay season, Lake finally put it together in the Eddy Games with a runaway .8 victory. Billed as a match between Lake and local favorite Steve Gomes of Colonie, the duel

ever materialized. Gomez was third in 49 behind runnerup Art Williams of Turner, 48.9. Gomez' Capital District cohort, Al Johnson of Mt. Pleasant, may be the new one-lap star on the horizon. Running with the grace of a veteran, the 16-year-old Johnson broke the state frosh record with a 50.1 clocking. Canarsie's Bill Cruz and Oceanside's Gary Schmidt turned in 48.5's. Cruz did it to beat Lake in a disputed decision in the Bklyn PSAL. Schmidt, a junior, won the I-S in convincing fashion. Back again this year, Schmidt is expected to divide his efforts between the 440 and the intermediates. A major disappointment was Tony Basile of Christian Bros., Syracuse. A 49.3 runner in '72, the Fordham-bound youth only did 49.7 and didn't even qualify for the I-S finals.

HALF-MILE: Ah, the 880. New York had three of the nation's best, although the order of their ranking came as a surprise. Mepham's Belger is the top prospect for the '74 season--and who can deny it? Belger tied Jim Ryun's national junior record of 1:50.3, breaking the world record for 16-year-olds by one-tenth. He did it with a seventh in the National Junior meet(under 20), competing against 19-year-old collegians. He led the qualifiers with a 1:50.5 in his heat and, two weeks earlier, ran 1:50.4 to beat Craig Masback of White Plains in the I-S in upstate Kenmore, a Buffalo suburb. Belger beat the other third of the trio, Boys' Bill Dabney, in the Juniors, the Eddy Games and on the sprint medley anchor in the NY Relays. He was an even 2-2 with Masback, also taking him in the NY Relays individual 880 while losing to the Princeton-bound honor student in the Loucks Games and Easterns. Masback's Easterns victory was a best of 1:51.7 which gained him a Golden West invitation. He won the Sacramento race in 1:54.1 off a strange 57.8 pace. Dabney, second in 1:54.5, ran his fastest of 1:50.8 in the Juniors in Gainesville.

Belger's time was second nationally only to a 1:50 by Indiana's Don Sellers, who beat Belger by a stride in the Juniors and Dabney(1:53.8) by a neck in the International. Dabney, expected to threaten the national mark of 1:48.5 because of his scintil-

lating past performances, never really put it together. After a thrilling 1:50.2 leg in mid-April, he ran unspectacularly while seeking similar success in the mile. If Belger is pushed by anyone this year, it could be by LI neighbor, Ron Stafford of Regina. A sophomore, Stafford surprised his heralded teammate, Ed Valenski, with a 1:55.6 CHSAA triumph. In all, 35 runners broke 1:57, as compared with 26 in '72.

MILE: The purple sash on Matt Centrowitz' uniform said Power--and for good reason. He grinds out a swift pace and just keeps on going. Power, NY State Athlete-of-the-Year for 1973, Centrowitz, now at Manhattan, was the number one schoolboy miler in the US with a 4:02.7, second to collegian Tom Schilling's 3:59.2 in the Juniors. (At press time Matt was off for Europe to compete in Junior duals with WG, Poland and the USSR, at 1500 meters.) A week before that he won the Golden West in 4:05.4. His other major mile triumph was a 60-yard Eddy win in 4:10.6. Moreover, the 4:02.7 was the fastest prep mile in six years and put him fifth behind Jim Ryun(3:55.3), Tim Danielson(3:59.4), Marty Liquori(3:59.8) and Gerry Lindgren(4:01.6) in all-time miling annals.

In an ordinary year McQuaid's Chris Horton would have been the state's top miler. Traveling 16,000 miles to invitationals to seek quality competition, Horton was pulled to a 4:09 for second behind Matt at the Golden West. The Rochester youth, now at Brandeis, had five invitational triumphs, including a 4:13.8 in the All-American and a 4:15.1 in the Easterns.

Matt's only loss came in the NY Relays in one of the finest Eastern mile fields ever assembled. The winner was Nazareth's Pete Gaughn, the indoor champ who had hoped to run with Matt all spring. A severe hay fever problem wiped out his chances, after he added victories in the Hartford(4:13.5) and CHSAA(4:14) meets.

From every angle the mile had the greatest depth ever, and more is expected next spring. Of the 40 runners at 4:23.5 or under, 14 are back including North Salem's Ken Murphy, somewhat erratic after an early-season 4:14.6

TWO-MILE: Take a junior pentathlon champion who has 90 straight swimming dual-meet victories, is valedictorian of his class and was runnerup in the I-S cross-country run. Put him on a meticulously-planned training program under the guidance of coach Rich Michalski, a former 4:07 college miler. What have you got? You have an 8:55 two-miler in Curt Alitz of Highland Falls. That mark got him third in the Golden West, his first real competition of the season. It also got him a state record and a victory over Centrowitz who had won the mile two hours earlier.

Earlier, with the opposition far behind, Alitz had run times of 9:04.2(NY Relays), 9:05.2(Section 9), 9:07.6(Easterns) and 9:02.4(I-S), together with the 8:55 a five-race average of 9:02.9.

Centrowitz opened the campaign with a 9:01 state mark to beat Gaughn(9:04.6) in the Nanuet Relays. After a CHSAA victory(9:03.8), he broke the mark again in the Int'l(8:56.8), placing second to Illinois' Craig Virgin whose 8:41 broke Steve Prefontaine's national record. Fourteen returnees at 9:36 or better provide a good base for this spring's 2M activity.

HURDLES: Uniondale's Robert Adler provided the only spark in the highs and lows. He won both events in the I-S and lost a dead heat in the Easterns highs to Jersey's Reg Blackshear. Then, he justified his late Golden West entry with a windy 13.7 for fourth, a stride behind the winner, Cornelius Addison, 14.6 and 19.4 as a junior, looks like he'll be a smooth stepper this year for the Mt. Vernon hurdles factory. Schmidt led the intermediates in 38.4. Forced to abandon hurdling because of an injury, New Dorp high jump champ Bill Jankunis probably would have been ranked nationally in all three events.

FIELD: State records fell in the high jump, triple jump and javelin. Jankunis flopped to a national best of 7-1 in the Staten Is. champ and added another 7-footer in the PSAL. But he blew it with a basketball injury a few days before he was to de-

part for the Golden West and, after that, the Juniors. Bowe's James Nathaniel, a consistent 48-footer through May, got some advice from Ken McBryde. He proceeded to pop beyond McBryde's own state mark in the Easterns. Second to Ron Livers, state mark in the Golden West(second to Livers again) and Juniors(fourth). The Javelin rarely is held here, but Molloy's Steve Francke got enough of a chance to heave a 218-8 and break the state mark and qualify for three post-season invitationals. In the HJ Farmingdale's Jay Meissner, a 7-footer last year('72), equaled that mark in a 7-footer dual but never maintained the form that characterized his 6-11 indoor jumping. One of his losses was in the I-S, won by Riverhead's Terry Hatcher in 6-9. The long jump was bland, and four 14-footers could add little lustre to a pole vault that was "spoiled" by the 15-foot efforts by John Hochuli in '72.

Most of the quality weight tosses came from LI or the Central NY area. Seaford's Greg Llewellyn put a state-leading 61-5¹ in his sectional, then got only third in the I-S behind Joe Kessel and Mark Domanico. John Nespoli and Steve Millard were the 2nd and 3rd 60-footers. The unpredictability of the weights was exemplified by the failure of discus leaders Domanico and Millard to qualify for the I-S event.

RELAYS: Lafayette led the sprint teams as perennial champ Boys was completely shut out. The mile was deceptive. It appeared weak with only one team under 3:20(Mepham, 3:19.2), but 13 more foursomes were below 3:23. Last spring saw 20 teams break 8 minutes in the 2MR, the first time any state had ever done it. The event also saw ten teams(including 2 from NJ) break 7:55 in Queens-Iona as Boys won in 7:46.8. Farrell took the big ones; Penn, NY and NJ Relays. Molloy erased the state four-mile mark with a 17:24.8 in the NJ Relays. In the same meet Mepham set a nation-leading 3:27.2 in the sprint medley. The prestigious Penn DMR went to Paramus Cath(JN) as Tim Conheeney held off Centrowitz, whose 4:08.8 enabled Power to take second in 10:10, a CHSAA mark.

Archbishop Molloy HS of Queens is Team-of-the-Year for 1973 of selections based on championships and honors won, balance, outstanding athletes and consistency. The Stanners, which beat No. 3 Nephew in three of five invitational, were CHSAA outdoor titlists and league triple crown winners, having taken the X-C and indoor meets earlier. Basically a team with balance, its only all-state was javelin recordbreaker Steve Franks. Molloy also accounted for a state 4M mark(17:24.8) and its top runners were distancemen Tom Hummel and Mark Ogden. Tony Perrone, head coach, is assisted by DeWitt Thompson, and brothers Patrick Lolley, Aquinas Richard and Patrick Hogan. Nephew slipped to third when Uniondale beat them in the So. Shore and County meets. Their scheduled dual meet never came off.

Matt Centrowitz of Power, the state's top athlete for 1973, has his efforts well-chronicled in other sections of this yearbook. The nation's top HS miler, he ran 4:02.7 and also had an 8:56.2 2-mile and a 151.5 half-mile leg. (In the team rankings dual meets, for the most part, were not considered since such results were either unavailable or incomplete.)





The quality of indoor competition in the state, particularly in the NY City metropolitan area, is widely known. At the State Armory in Manhattan, the site of many a record race, the meet standards are eye-openers. Then, how does Pete Gaughn come off breaking nine meet records (one a national mark) nine armory races?

The Nazareth senior, now at Manhattan, was the winter season's leading athlete. In two of those races—the Loughlin 2-mile and the Hayes 1,000—Gaughn was beaten, but he still managed to dip under the meet standards. He ended up with a flat-floor mile mark of 4:13.1 and other bests of 1:55.7 (880), 2:14.6 (1000) and 9:13 (2M).

Ironically, Gaughn and many other indoor headliners—such as Howie McNiff, Jay Meisler, Dave Meyer and Willie Smith—had more success in the winter than in the spring. In the season's first major meet, the marathon Loughlin Games, McNiff astounded onlookers by beating Gaughn and Power's Matt Centrowitz (9:10.4) in a 9:09.8 2-mile. He also had a 9:07.4 on West Point's oversized track and won the intersectional at Cornell in 9:28.0. But the sub-9-minute race was not to be found outdoors.

Farmingdale's Jay Meisler, now at UCLA, was unbeaten in the high jump and led the nation with a best of 6-11. Berner's Dave Meyer set a state 50 record of 6.1, running second to none in the short sprints. Uniondale's Smith raced to an I-S 300 triumph in 33.3, the fastest in the US and one-tenth off Otis Hill's national record.

Arlington's Jeff Chumas became the first NYer to vault 14 feet indoors. The 600 was blessed by the hard running of Farrell's Chris Ryan (1:13) and White Plains' Craig Masback (1:12.607, 1:13.1).

In perhaps the season's most exciting race Centrowitz was upset by Boys' Bill Babiney in the All-City mile. Babiney, the PSAL champion, hung on Matt's shoulder till the last turn and drove passed him down the stretch. He was timed in 4:13.6 to 4:14 for Centrowitz.

The outstanding relay race was the distance medley in the LI Coaches Invitational. Wantagh out-legged several stacked four-somes to set a national mark of 10:21.8 in this seldom-run indoor event. The mark was broken a few weeks later in Jersey as Essex Catholic nipping Lawrenceville produced 10:16.4 for both teams.

Sadly, the Eastern States championships were not held because of administrative problems, preventing the season's-end matchups of the abundant talent. The meet is expected to be revived this year.

Harriers Find Hills Upsetting

The predictability of cross-country running was shaken quite a bit last fall as upsets throughout the state marked the 1972 harrier season in New York.

One of the most notable upsets came in the State Intersectional meet on the grounds of RIT in Rochester. What the course lacked in aesthetics, it made up for in surprise. In the A division Christian Brothers of Syracuse, the heavy favorite, was thrashed by Lockport, 137-216, enabling Section 6 to take the title.

Dave Marrotta's eighth-place finish led Lockport, the 6-A league champion. The Brothers, a strong third in the prestigious Easterns three weeks earlier, could not prevent the leaders on the flat and muddy 2.5-mile course, strewn with puddles from overnight rains.

The individual winner in A was Kingston's John Cabeil in 12:49. In B Howie McNiff of Magnus set a course record with a 12:41 clocking, and the C winner was North Salem junior Ken Murphy, 12:59. Section 1 took both the B and C races while the team victors were Wantagh and Floyd, respectively, both from Long Island.

CBA's success in the Easterns was overshadowed by the individual competition, which provided another surprise. No one watching at Van Cortland Park, the Bronx, on that crisp and sunny afternoon expected to see Power's Matt Centrowitz pounding the turf to the wire--in second place. Despite running a personal best of 12:24.5 on the tough 2.5 layout, Centrowitz was beaten by Maryland's Dave Sandridge, who broke Marty Liquori's '66 course standard with a 12:20.9 effort. It was the only cross-country loss for Matt, the state's leading harrier, who avenged the Easterns setback by whipping Sandridge in the Golden West invitation mile in June.

In the fourth of seven sections another surprise came when Greeley's Mickey Yardis outlasted Nazareth's Pete Caughn, 12:48.5 to 12:48.6. Yardis reaffirmed his strength with a sub-13-minute fifth

in the Intersectional B race.

Madison's triumph in the NY City Public Schools meet hardly was a shock. But the margin of victory was. Expecting a five-team scramble and the usual post-meeting confusion, the Highwaymen won by 66 points, placing all of its scorers in the first 25. Still, the confusion was rampant. Midwood initially was placed eighth. It was finally awarded second after a lost finish card was discovered. Boys' Bill Dabney was the league's leading runner for the second straight year with victories in the team and individual championship meets.

Bishop Loughlin upset Molloy in the Diocese sectional, but the Stanners rebounded to win the championship of the NY City Catholic Schools league --leg for leg the toughest in the state. Centrowitz took the gold medal.

In perhaps the biggest single reversal of all, Colonie lost to Niskayuna and CBA-Albany in the Guilderland meet at Tawasentwa Park. The Garnet Raiders regained their Capital District status with subsequent victories en route to the Section 2-A title. However, Colonie ended its season on a weak note, taking only eighth in the I-S-A section. Some patterns remained stable during the rash of surprises. Meet records were shattered in great numbers and at least 26 new course marks were established.

The All-State selections rewarded, among other things, the consistency of leading runners. The five juniors listed among the three squads are from different parts of the state: Ogdensburg (NY City), Murphy (Westchester), Peck (Albany), Hull (West NY) and Calvario (LI).

There were many reports of girls competing on boys' teams, as state rules permit for this non-contact sport. One of them was Diane Andrede, a 15-year-old sophomore from LI's Melville High. She became the first girl ever to compete in the NYU meet, and she finished 76th in a JV field of 200 with a respectable 15:44 clocking. (See picture on p.22)




