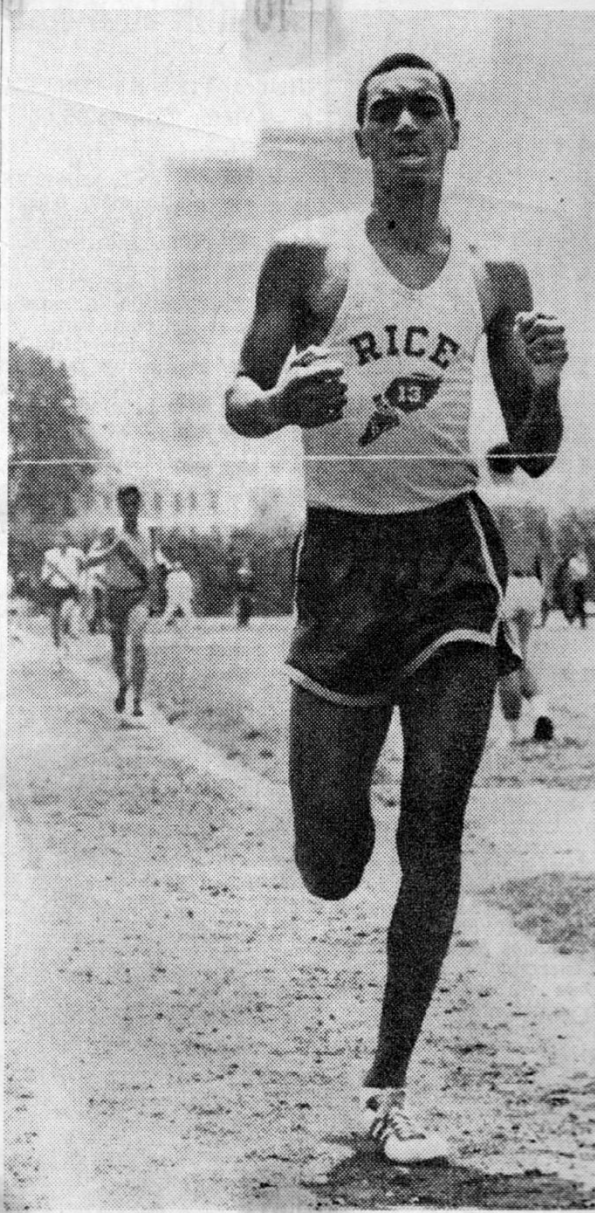

FIKES SETS MARK IN SCHOOL BOY RUN

12:44 N.Y.U. Meet Clocking
Is Fastest by Sophomore

Dennis Fikes of Rice, a freshman schoolboy track standout last year, started his sophomore campaign on the right foot yesterday at Van Cortlandt Park in the Bronx.

The slim 16-year-old runner won the fastest of three unseeded sections in the 31st annual New York University interscholastic cross-country meet. The event drew about 1,700 athletes from more than 100 schools.

Fikes negotiated the 2½ miles of hilly terrain in 12 minutes 44 seconds, just three seconds slower than the meet record. His effort, bettered here by only two other schoolboys in history, was also the swiftest ever recorded on the course by a sophomore.

McDevitt Shows Balance

The other varsity sections were won by Bill McLoughlin of Sacred Heart in 12:46 and by John Devlin of Bishop McDevitt, Wyncote, Pa., in 13 minutes.

Team honors in the varsity groupings were captured by John F. Kennedy of Somers, N.Y., in Division A, with 129 points; Monsignor Farrell in Division B, with 121; and Bishop McDevitt in Division C, with 51. McDevitt placed all five of its scorers among the first 25 finishers.

It was the first major triumph for Fikes, who last Spring established a New York State freshman record for the mile with a clocking of 4:28.

Winner Passes Ortiz

The 6-foot-1-inch, 150-pounder trailed the leaders for the greater part of the race. As he approached the final straightaway, with about 500 yards to go, Fikes glided past Hector Ortiz of Brentwood and went on to record, a 70-yard victory.

Fikes, along with the others was aided by ideal weather conditions. The youngster had hoped to run in "the low 13's" and was surprised when he was informed of his clocking.

He expects to concentrate on the mile during the regular season and is shooting for the Catholic High School Athletic Association indoor record of 4:18.

PIAZZA SETS MARK IN SCHOOL MEET

Runs 2½ Miles in 12:37.6
in St. John's Carnival

At racetime in the seventh annual St. John's University interscholastic run at Van Cortlandt Park, the Bronx, yesterday, Julio Piazza had his heart set on a sub-12-minute-40-second performance. After the grueling 2½-mile excursion, he was all smiles.

The slender, 17-year-old Brooklyn Tech senior was almost letter perfect, winning the fastest of three unseeded varsity sections in 12:37.6. That clocking broke both his own Public Schools Athletic League record and the meet standard of 12:56.8 set by Frank Zydor of Hewlett last year.

The race was also the third swiftest ever by a local schoolboy, and only 14.4 seconds shy of the course record held by Martin Liguori, who was a four-minute miler at Essex Catholic of Newark last year.

The other varsity groupings were led by Dennis Fikes of Rice in 12:55, and by Joe Barbary of Power in 12:58.8.

Team honors were captured by St. Joseph's of Metuchen, N. J., with 76 points in Group A; Roselle Catholic of Roselle, N. J., 94, in B. and St. Anthony's of Smithtown, L. I., 145, in C. Almost 2,000 athletes from 12 schools competed in the meet.

Piazza trailed Hector Ortiz of Brentwood by about 30 yards as the mass of harriers approached the hills about 500 yards from the start. He passed Ortiz after a mile and continued in front for the remainder of the jaunt, recording a 60-yard triumph.

Piazza, who was born in Italy and moved to the United States seven years ago, attributed his success to "more speedwork."

M'LOUGHLIN WINS IN CROSS-COUNTRY

Sacred Heart Runner Scores in East Schoolboy Event

Bill McLoughlin, knees high and arms pumping, finished his race but didn't stop running. He traveled another 30 yards into the outstretched arms of his ecstatic Sacred Heart teammates who extended him their congratulations for winning the 16th annual Fordham University Eastern interscholastic cross-country championship.

The Yonkers senior was clocked in 12 minutes 40 seconds over the 2½-mile Van Cortlandt Park course in the Bronx. That time erased the Catholic High Schools Athletic Association record of 12:44.0 set earlier this season by Dennis Fikes, a sophomore from Rice.

The other sections were won by Hector Ortiz of Brentwood, L.I., in 12:55.4, and Jim Schrader, an upstater from Middleburgh, in 13:16.1.

Team honors were captured by Kennedy of Somers, N.Y., with 168 points. New Jersey clubs gained honors in the other varsity divisions, with Seton Hall and Hackensack tallying 182 and 154 points, respectively.

The wiry Irish lad, who measures 5 feet 7 inches and weighs 118 pounds, led the favorite, Julio Piazza, by a few strides, through the hills. But down the final straightaway the Brooklyn Tech senior faltered slightly, enabling McLoughlin to register a 15-yard triumph.

McLoughlin, who holds the New York State junior class record for the mile with a 4:19.4 effort, suffered from a slight cold "which hurt my windpipe." Nevertheless, the 17-year-old youth was able to top the performances recorded by more than 2,000 athletes from 139 schools in the northeast.

M'LOUGHLIN WINS IN CROSS-COUNTRY

Power Memorial, Loughlin Capture Team Titles

Bill McLoughlin, a Sacred Heart of Yonkers senior, recorded his fifth victory in six major outings this season today by winning the New York Division of the Catholic High Schools Athletic Association sectional championships at Van Cortlandt Park in the Bronx.

McLoughlin was clocked in 12 minutes 42.5 seconds over a soft 2½-mile course drenched from an early morning rain. Only Julio Piazza of Brooklyn Tech, who has a 12:37.6 to his credit, has turned in a faster performance this fall.

The Sacred Heart star's other triumphs were in the Iona Prep, St. John's, Westchester County and Eastern States meets.

Power Memorial, paced by Joe Barbary's second-place 12:47, captured team honors with 91 points. The Panthers were followed by St. Peter's (103), Farrell (118) and DuBois (137).

The sun finally broke through the clouds during the Brooklyn section which was won by Colin Jordan of Christ the King. Jordan, a 17-year-old senior, was timed in 13:30.2 to beat Jerry Richards of Nazareth by 25 yards.

Bishop Loughlin of Brooklyn, which placed all its scorers in among the first 20 finishers, tallied 67 points to take team honors.

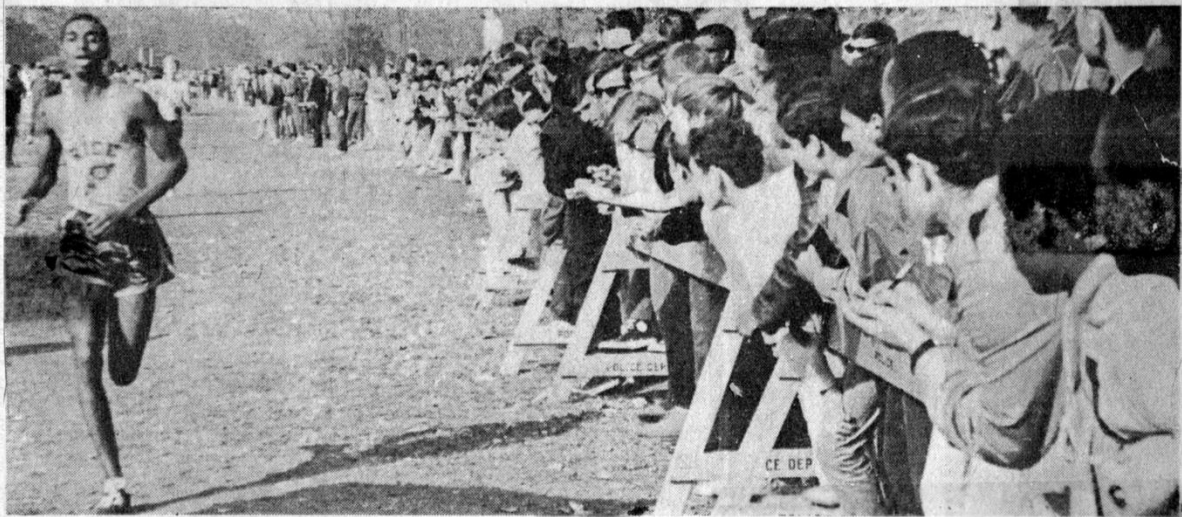

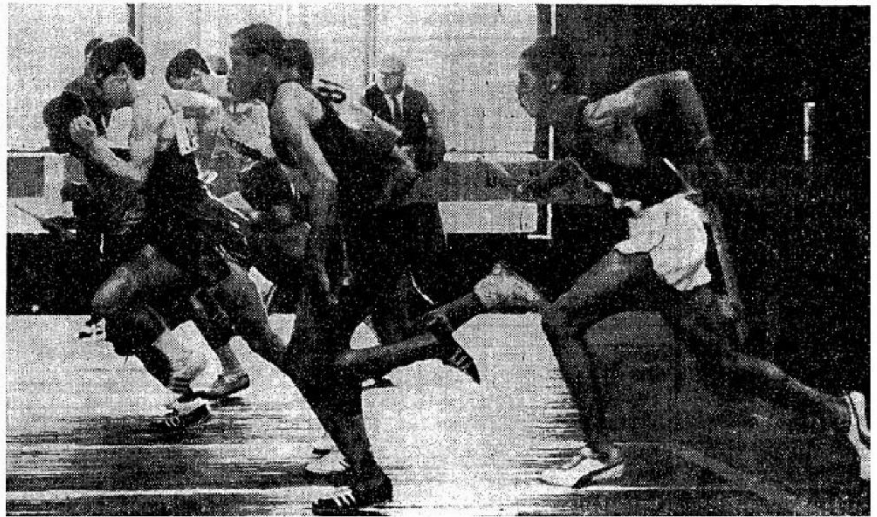

Piazza Sets Two-Mile Mark; Bushwick Wins Loughlin Meet

Julio Piazza, who was disappointed because his leading rival switched to the mile, went out yesterday and ran the second fastest schoolboy flat-floor two miles in New York State.

The Brooklyn Tech senior's time of 9 minutes 20 seconds erased the meet record in the 14th annual Bishop Loughlin Games at the 102d Engineers Army.

The meet, the first major competition this indoor season for metropolitan area athletes, drew approximately 4,500 entries representing 171 schools. Competition included novice and open events and consumed more than 10 hours of continuous activity.

In addition to Piazza's mark, three other records were established and one tied. Bill Coatsney of Edison took the 100-yard dash in 10 seconds, Cardinal Spellman won the mile relay in 3:26.9 and Power Memorial was first in the two-mile relay in 8:03.6 for the records. Royal Fisher of Bushwick tied the 300-yard standard of 32.2 seconds.

When Piazza reached the starting line in the two-mile run and did not see Bill McLoughlin of Sacred Heart (Yonkers) there, he had a temporary letdown. "McLoughlin handed me my only two defeats in six races this cross-country season," Julio said, "and I wanted to meet him on an indoor track. I know I can do 9:10, but I have to have competition from someone like McLoughlin."

Actually, Piazza did get some competition in yesterday's race, but, he said later, "the pace was too slow." Tony Carrion of Bishop DuBois set the pace for most of the run, with Piazza

taking over with about 3 1/2 laps to go. He opened up at that point and pulled away steadily from Carrion to triumph by 80 yards. Piazza said a blister on his right foot bothered him from the third lap on.

Only Walter Walls of Taft, the Bronx, has run a faster two miles on an unbanked track in this state. Walls, now at Kansas University, ran 9:15.4 last year on the same floor. Walls's mark is a state record for any type of indoor track.

Bushwick High of Brooklyn, which has been progressing the last few years under the guidance of Ken Fiedler, captured its first major team victory with 12 points. Roselle (N. J.) Catholic and Jamaica of Queens tied for second with 11 points each.

A third-place finish by Bill Jones in the final event, the 600-yard run, gave Bushwick the title. The outcome made Fiedler very happy, but his day didn't start that way. His car ran out of gas on the Van Wyck Expressway in Queens in the morning and he had to abandon it and take a cab to the meet.

Piazza is a thin, dark-haired 17-year-old who was born in Italy, lived in Canada for awhile and came to this country with his parents seven years ago.

The meet record of 9:33.3 was set by Tom Donnelly of La Salle, Philadelphia, now a star at Villanova, in 1964.

McLoughlin might have disappointed Piazza, but the Sacred Heart senior had a winning race of his own in the mile. The small (116 pounds, 5 feet 7 inches) blond took the mile in 4:25.1. John Brady of St. Helena, who was expected to win this event, dropped out with 440 yards to go when an old injury to his right knee affected his running.

Massapequa Junior Sets Mark

Three upstart juniors weren't polite to their elders at yesterday's St. Francis Prep Games, and the slighted seniors may not be able to recover for the rest of the season.

Brian McElroy of Massapequa High, Hector Rivera of Newtown, and Marcel Philippe of Mater Christi, none of whom had ever won a major indoor race, rose up and captured the lion's share of the honors in the 12th renewal of the high school meet at the 102d Engineers Armory.

McELROY'S 2:14.7 victory in the 1,000 not only was a surprise to most of the 1,500 fans, but his late kick behind Julius Larrymore of Adams and John Heath of Flushing, both seniors, enabled the Long Island youngster to erase the two-year-old meet record held by former Boys High

great, Jim Jackson, now a freshman at Purdue.

The race was the first over the 1,000-yard distance in McElroy's brief running career.

Rivera's late spurt swept him past senior Royal Fisher of Bushwick for a 51.2-second victory in the 440.

PHILIPPE ran away with the mile. The clocking of 4:22.3 was five seconds and 25 yards faster than runnerup Joe Daley of Ketchum High in Wappingers Falls, N.Y. Philippe's previous claim to fame had been a state sophomore record for the outdoor mile—a 4:19.7 at last year's Catholic school championships.

James Schindler saved some glory for the seniors with a meet-record performance in the

M'Elroy, Schindler Set Track Marks

Brian McElroy of Massapequa, L. I., who trained up the down staircase in his school this past week, and Jim Schindler of Stepinac, who was lucky to escape frostbite on the school's outdoor board track in White Plains, set meet records yesterday in the 12th annual St. Francis Prep Games. McElroy, an 18-year old junior, lowered the 1,000-yard record with a 2 minute 14.7 seconds clocking. Jim Jackson of Boys, now a freshman at Purdue, set the previous mark of 2:15.6, also as a junior, in 1966.

Schindler, stepping in the winner's circle of a major meet for the first time, erased the record in the two-mile run when he posted a time of 9:21.9. It was almost four seconds less than the mark set by Tom Donnelly of La Salle (Philadelphia) in 1964.

In other highlights of the meet held at the 102d Engineers Armory, two juniors, Maurice Philippe of Mater Christi and Hector Rivera of Newtown, were impressive in victory. Philippe, a 16 year old, captured the mile run in 4:22.3, while Rivera, who is 17, rallied to take the 440-yard run in 0:51.2.

Team Title to Jamaica

The team title was won by Jamaica High of Queens with 11 1/2 points. Bushwick of Brooklyn was runner-up with 9 and Boys, also of Brooklyn, was third with 8.

McElroy, a gangling 6-footer at 140-pounds, did his distance work on the Massapequa stairs because of the snow and ice around the school's grounds where he usually practices. "I did my sprinting in the school corridors after everyone left," the good-looking, dark-haired youngster said.

The unusual practice formula obviously paid off. In the 1,000 yesterday, McElroy stayed off the fast pace set by John Heath of Flushing and Julius Larrymore of John Adams. Heath went through the first 440 in 55 seconds and the half-mile mark in 1:58.2 with Larrymore right behind and McElroy in fourth place.

At that point, the Massapequa runner began to make his move. He passed Heath and Larrymore. The Adams senior made a bid to head him off, but McElroy breezed past and won going away by eight yards. His time was only seven-tenths of a second slower than the

national flat-floor record. "I think I'll get under 2:14 before this season is over," McElroy said.

Schindler, a 17-year-old senior from Bedford Village, N. Y., was modest about his record-breaking victory in the two-mile. "Everything just clicked right. I had a good breakfast, sufficient warm up, the pace was right, and I felt great throughout the race," the slight (131 pounds, 5 feet 7 inches) Stepinac runner said.

The Stepinac team worked out all week in sub-freezing temperatures on its board track. "I didn't mind the cold at all," Schindler said. "We kept warm by practicing hard. Thursday, for example, I did 10 440's and jogged a lap (160-yards) in between."

Like everyone else, Schindler was surprised that Julio Piazza of Brooklyn Tech, the favorite off his 9:20 outing a month ago in the Loughlin Games, finished fourth. Piazza was in front for the first mile and a quarter, but then faded and finished fourth in 9:30.8. "I ran out of gas" was Piazza's explanation.

Fikes's Mark Not Official

Schindler's time was more than 20 seconds better than his fourth place clocking in the Loughlin Games. Dennis Fikes of Rice was in second place with a time of 9:23.5, surpassed the New York State record for sophomores, but it won't go into the books. Only outdoor times are officially recorded in the class category.

In the mile, Philippe rallied in the final 440 and won easily. Last year as a sophomore, he set a state sophomore outdoor mark of 4:19.7. His coach, Jack Donovan, said he thought the youngster will be around 4:10 this coming outdoor season.

Rivera, who was born in Puerto Rico and is expected to try out for that island's Olympic team, scored his second major triumph of the season in the 440. He won the Loughlin 600 in 1:14.5. Yesterday, he trailed Royal Fisher of Bushwick and Terry Walton of Jamaica until the final 50-yards when he took advantage of an opening on the inside to move ahead and win by a yard.

Cardinal Spellman Takes
Title in New York Section

Molloy Runs Off With 8th CHSAA Crown

When it comes to winning championships, mark down the track team of Archbishop Molloy High School alongside the Yankees of old, the Green Bay Packers, and the Boston Celtics. Molloy ran off with its eighth straight Catholic High Schools' Athletic Association title yesterday in the meet's 41st running at the 102d Engineers Armory.

Scoring in all but two of the 12 senior division events, Frank Rienzo's charges rolled up 39 points despite a tough early challenge from Chaminade. Molloy, which makes its home in Jamaica, Queens, has been in existence only 11 years.

CHAMINADE ACTUALLY beat the Stanners in individual triumphs, three events to two. But Molloy had too much strength all down the line, sometimes placing more than one runner in an event and capturing two of the three relays. Chaminade's runnerup total was 16 points.

In one event, the high jump, Chaminade and Molloy split the victory. Vic Nikirk of the Stanners and James Reilly of the Flyers each soared 6 feet, 3 inches.

Other Molloy winners were Richard Gumbs, who copped the 280-yard run in :30.4, and the mile relay team of Steve Gangone, John Deavry, Frank Gallagher, and Gil Peters, which won in the meet record time of 3:28.4.

CHAMINADE'S MIKE Mannion and Pat Keane swept the dash and hurdles between them, Mannion winning the 50-yard sprint in 5.7 seconds, and Keane skimming the 60-yard highs in 7.6.

Despite the heroics of the top two teams, Stepinac produced the meet's outstanding performer in Jim Schindler, a wiry little senior, who bettered the CHSAA standard for two miles by nearly 18 seconds. Running the last mile in 4:27, Schindler beat a tough field that also included Denis Fikes of Rice, the city's cross-country champ, in 9:16.5. The time was the second fastest ever run on a New York State schoolboy on a flat floor, behind the 9:15.3 Walter Walls.

THE MEET RECORD of 9:34 that fell belonged to Joe Lynch, who ran for LaSalle in 1961 before going on to a distinguished collegiate career at Georgetown.

John Brady, who won the CHSAA mile title as a junior at St. Helena's last year, found that running half the distance could be just as much fun yesterday, racing to a one-yard triumph over John Lovett of Power Memorial in the 880. Brady's time was 1:57.0, one-tenth better than Lovett.

The CHSAA indoor title meet returned to the Armory in upper Manhattan for the first time in four years with yesterday's running. It has been conducted at the old Madison Square Garden the past three years.

Queens College defeated teams from Hunter, CCNY and Brooklyn College yesterday in the City University Indoor Track and Field Championship in the victor's Fitzgerald Gym.

SCHINDLER SETS C.H.S.A.A. RECORD

Stepinac Star Wins 2-Mile Run in Indoor Title Meet

By WILLIAM J. MILLER

Two lightweights, Jim Schindler of Archbishop Stepinac and Bill McLoughlin of Sacred Heart, turned in heavyweight performances yesterday in the 41st annual Catholic High Schools Athletic Association indoor track championships.

Schindler, 5 feet 7 inches and 130 pounds, registered the second fastest flat-floor two miles ever run in New York State when he turned in a time of 9:16.5 at the 102d Engineers Armory to set a meet record.

McLoughlin, also 5 feet 7 inches, but only 116 pounds, ran in the unseeded section of the mile run due to his coach's misunderstanding of the rules, but still managed to turn in the fast time of 4:19.1 with no competition. He won by nearly a half lap, but was off the meet mark of 4:18.

Molloy Sets Relay Mark

There was one other meet record. The Archbishop Molloy mile relay team of Steve Gangone (53.2 seconds), John Beaury 52.8), Frank Gallagher (51) and Gil Peters (51.4) finished first in 3:28.4. The previous record was 3:29.5, set by Fordham Prep in 1963.

Molloy of Queens captured the team title for the eighth straight year (only Bishop Loughlin has a longer streak in the history of this meet — 12 straight between 1935 and 1946) with 39 points. Chaminade of Mineola was a distant second with 16 points. Molloy also won the Junior-Midget C.H.S.A.A. crown for the seventh consecutive year.

The Stanners had two other first places, besides the mile relay and shared the top spot in the high jump. Richard Gumbs, a 17-year-old senior, who is the outdoor Catholic 220-yard champion, came on with a rush at the end to win the 280-yard dash by inches in 30.4 seconds and Molloy's two-mile relay team was first in 8:06.1. Vic Nikirk tied Jim Reilly of Chaminade in the high jump at 6 feet 3 inches.

John Brady of St. Helena, the outdoor one-mile champion, won the 880-yard run by two yards in 1:57 and Al Logie of Bishop Ford took the 440-yard run in 51 seconds in two other feature events.

Only Walter Walls of Taft has run a faster two miles than Schindler did yesterday. Last year, Walls covered the distance in 9:15.4.

An Oversight by Coach

McLoughlin was placed in the second unseeded section of the mile because his coach, Dick Robinson, failed to show at the seeding meeting. "I gave my list to someone and thought that would do it," Robinson said in his defense. However, he failed to designate that someone as his proxy as the C.H.S.A.A. rules provide and the result was the second section for his outstanding miler.

McLoughlin, a 17-year-old senior, set his own pace in the second section. Marcel Philippe of Mater Christi won the first section in 4:23.3.

ST. HELENA STAR SETS 1,000 MARK

**Brady Is Clocked in 2:16.4
at Iona Meet Run**

Three of the top schoolboy milers in the metropolitan area—John Brady of St. Helena, Bill McLoughlin of Sacred Heart and Marcel Philippe of Mater Christi—moved down to the 1,000-yard run yesterday at the 102d Engineers Armory.

The net results were a victory for Brady by a yard over McLoughlin and 6 yards over Philippe and a meet record of 2 minutes 16.4 seconds in an exciting race at the seventh annual Iona College Spike Shoe Club schoolboy games.

The 1,000 mark was one of seven that fell during the 12-event program. Previous records for this meet were not exceptional. In former years the meet was for those athletes who failed to qualify on a time basis for the Eastern interscholastic championships.

The Easterns this year are listed for March 15, which permitted some of the best Catholic high-school runners to compete yesterday. The public schools only took part in a special event yesterday since their championships will be held tomorrow.

Mile Mark Broken

Other meet records were: Al Logie of Bishop Ford in the 300-yard dash (32.6 seconds); Phil McClusky of Molloy in the 600 (1:15.1); Jim Schindler of Stepinac, one-mile run (4:24.3); Dennis Fikes of Rice, two-mile run (9:35.7); Cardinal Spellman High in the 880-yard relay (1:34.3) and Nazareth in the two-mile relay (8:055).

Archbishop Molloy retained its title in Division I with 44½ points. The Stanners had five individual winners. Nazareth of Brooklyn was a distant second with 13½ and Bishop Ford, also of Brooklyn, was third with 13.

The first six finishers in the 1,000 were under the previous record of 2:21.3 set by Charles Hewson of Ford in 1966. Richard Schuler of St. Agnes, in sixth place, was clocked in 2:20.1.

Phil Napolitano of St. Augustine (who finished fifth in 2:18) set the pace for the first two laps. Brady moved to the front at the 600-yard post, followed closely by McLoughlin and Philippe. He passed the 880 mark in 2:01 and held off several challenges by McLoughlin, who won the Catholic mile in 4:19.4 last week, over the last 100 yards.

Schindler moved down to the mile yesterday following his impressive two-mile time of 9:16.5 in last Saturday's Catholic championships and won as he pleased. The 17-year-old senior was aiming for 4:20 or better, but the lack of any strong competition and a slow first half (2:11) hurt his chance

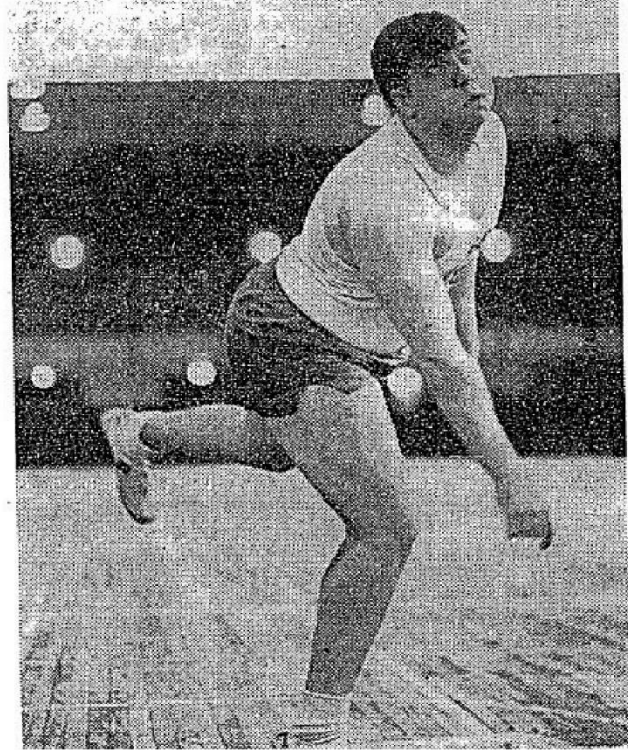

BRADY SETS MARK IN 1,000-YARD RUN

St. Helena Ace Does 2:12.4
in School Meet Here

"When I heard the split times, I was pleased. It made me run all the faster." This is how John Brady, a long-striding St. Helena senior, summed up his setting of a national all-floors record of 2 minutes 12.4 seconds for the 1,000-yard run last night.

In what some seasoned observers of schoolboy track called the "best race they have ever witnessed," Brady defeated a star-studded field in one of the leading events of the Eastern States interscholastic indoor track and field championships at the 102d Engineers Armory. The meet closed the indoor season.

The first three finishers in the 1,000 were under the former national record of 2:13.7 set by Jim Smeltzer of Barrington (R. I.) high in 1966. Tom Sullivan of St. George High in Evanston, Ill., did 2:10.5 as a senior in 1961 but that mark was not set in an all-schoolboy race.

Julius Larrymore of Adams, who led for the first lap and came on with a rush at the end, was second in 2:12.6 and Bill McLoughlin of Sacred Heart, who set a national flat-floor record for the mile (4:13.6) only three days ago in the same track, was third in 2:13.3.

Brian McElroy of Massapequa, the pre-race favorite, finished fourth in 2:14. His time tied the previous national flat-floor record set by Jim Jackson of Boys in 1966.

Essex Catholic of Newark captured the team title with 13 points. Thomas Edison of Queens was second with 12. Three teams, Roselle (N. J.) Catholic, Taft of the Bronx, and Jamaica High tied for third with 9 points each.

SAMARA CAPTURES VAULT, LONG JUMP

Power, Mount Vernon Also Score at Iona Relays

Fred Samara, the latest movie star to emerge from Brooklyn, and strong foursomes from Power Memorial and Mount Vernon were the major victors yesterday as the Queens-Iona Relays opened a two-day stand at Downing Stadium on Randalls Island.

Yesterday's program was turned over to the schoolboys and over 1,000 from 125 metropolitan-area schools kicked up enough dust on the parched track to create a good scene for a "Grapes of Wrath" remake.

The college teams will swing into action today starting at 11 A.M. with the field events. Thirty-three colleges are entered with Villanova defending its team title. Track events will begin at noon. Included are three high school championship relays.

4th Relay in Row for Power

Samara, whose dad, Edmund, records his every move in the pole vault and long jump on film, repeated his double victory of two weeks ago in the Brandeis Relays. The 17-year-old Fort Hamilton junior won the pole vault at 13 feet and the long jump at 23 feet 8 inches, his best ever.

"The only time Fred long jumps is in a meet," his proud father said. "He never practices it because the pit at Fort Hamilton is unsuitable and he could hurt himself."

Power's well-balanced two-mile relay was a 15-yard winner in one of the two championship baton events. The quartet of John Lovett (1:58.3), his brother, Pete (1:59), Joe Barbary (1:59.1) and Chancy March (1:57.3) was timed in the good time of 7 minutes 53.6 seconds, the fastest local clocking this year.

In the five high school championship events on the two-day program, no meet records were set. This is an unusual happening in major schoolboy meets these days.

Weekend Times Promise Exciting Relay Program

With one weekend of dazzling performances behind them, schoolboy track stars brushed the dust from their scuffed cleats yesterday and plunged into preparations for the huge New York Relays, Friday and Saturday, at Randalls Island. The weatherman promises clear skies and balmy temperatures. That's all the schoolboys need.

Reports from the Queens-Iona meet at Randalls Island and the Highland Park Relays in New Jersey the past weekend indicate they have reached a rare peak. On the Jersey cinders, coach Ed Zarowin's Brooklyn Tech foursome posted 10:17.4 for the distance medley, the best in the country this year, and coach Ron Gundry's crack hurdlers from Sayreville (N. J.) High continued undefeated.

SPARKLING TEAM and individual efforts abounded at Randalls Island. Power Memorial's undefeated foursome tuned up for the New York Relays with a 7:53.6 two-mile and coach Larry Ellis put his top sprinters together for a tidy 42.9 400 win.

Top individual efforts, all pointing to eye-popping outings at Randalls Island, included National champ Julius Larrimore's 1:54.2 half; Julio Piazza's 4:19.5 mile under wraps for Brooklyn Tech; another double, pole vault and long jump, by Fort Hamilton's Fred Samara; 6'5¼" in the high jump by Jim Reilly, Chaminade; a 48.2 quarter-mile leg by Newton's Hector Rivera and a 4:17.6

mile leg by Rice High's sensational soph, Dennis Fikes.

VERSATILE FIKES, rapidly developing into the best of the CHSAA milers, will switch to the Invitation two-mile run on the New York Relays Friday (3 p.m.) program, but on Saturday will run the mile leg for Rice's distance medley team. His 4:17.9 mile, though on a relay leg and not official, compares with the national record for a soph of 4:19.2.

Some of the coaches did a double take on the stop watches. Charlie Scher at DeWitt Clinton and Duke Marshall at Evander Childs gaped as their sprint foursome turned in unexpectedly sharp turns.

AT FORDHAM PREP, Coach Tommy Byrnes blinked when his young quartet was caught in a 3:23.9 mile. Byrnes has three sophs, John Hallinan, Gene Costello and Des Sugrue; a junior, Fred Miller, and a lone senior, Joe Schaller. They've improved so rapidly, he's confronted with a double dilemma. First, which four of the five to name; then which event to enter, sprint medley or mile. He has until race time to find the solution.

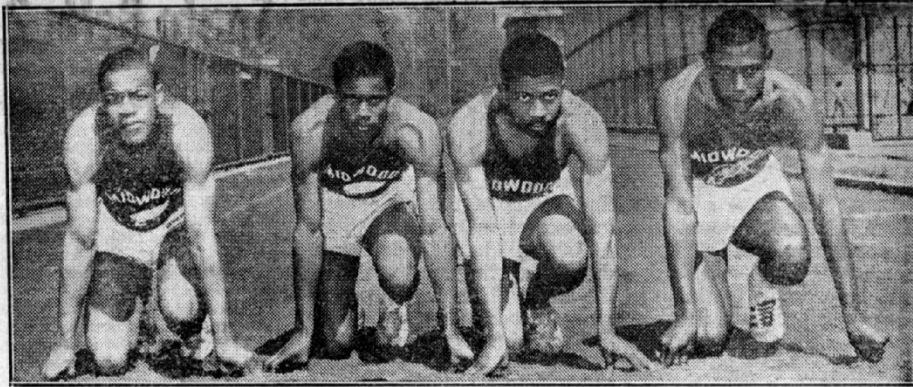

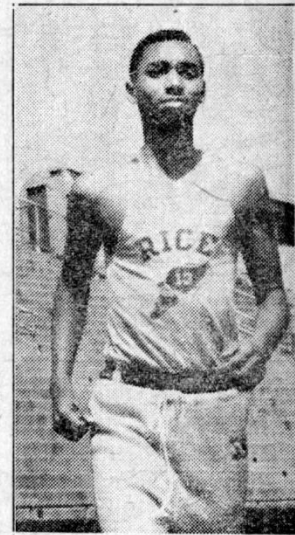

Strongest Field Ever Begins Record Assault in N. Y. Relays

In a stirring assault on time and the measuring tape, the 3d annual New York Relays gets under way at Downing Stadium, Randalls Island, at 3 p.m. today. Six individual championships will be decided on the opening-day program with 12 more titles at stake on the day-long schedule for tomorrow.

Favorable skies are forecast for the schoolboy speedsters and their rooters but the outlook for the record book is ominous.

FROM THE MOMENT national indoor champ Julius Larrimore of Adams High takes his place at the starting line in the 880 Invitation today until the vaulters put aside their poles late tomorrow afternoon, one record after another will come under fire. Overall, it is the strongest field ever to churn the cinders in the huge event.

The four individual title runs—880, mile, two-mile and 360-yard hurdles—along with the triple jump and discus, challenge the speed, strength and agility of the young athletes this afternoon. Seven championship relays and five more field events provide the challenge tomorrow. Numerous non-championship relays round

out the program each day. Field events start tomorrow at 9:30 a.m.; the championship relays at about 11 a.m.

MOST MENACED of the records today is the 880 Invitation. The mark is 1:55.6 set by Ed Zieminski, Molloy, in the race inaugural last year. Larrimore set the national indoor mark at 1:54.3. His target now is the state

record, 1:50.6, by Tom Carroll, Fordham Prep.

Larrimore is in an exceptionally strong field. At the starting line with him will be such standouts as Hector Ortiz, Brentwood; John Heath, Flushing; Hector Rivera, Newtown; Larry Cimato and John Whyte, New Dorp; Jim Ingegneri, Fox Lane, and Bill Jones, Bushwick. The complete field will not be determined until race time.

A MEET RECORD for the 360 Invitation hurdles is certain. It is a new event. The state, East Coast and national record is 37.3 by Joe Kurzrok, Mount Vernon, set last year. Advance word points to such Jersey stars as Rod Jones, South Freehold; Gerry Carney and Ron Gutkowski, Sayreville, and Bill Kozikowski, Hackensack, as favorites. However, New York timber toppers such as Art Fludd, Roosevelt; Andy Kappel, Molloy, Brian Basel, St. Mary's of Manhasset, and possibly Delio Valdez, Mount Vernon, will be tough to beat.

Mater Christi Sets 2-Mile Relay Mark; 2 for Samara

On a dazzling anchor leg by junior Marcel Philippe, Mater Christi High of Long Island City led the charge on the record book at Randalls Island yesterday as the all-schoolboy New York Relays sprinted to a spectacular windup under cloudy and menacing skies. Marcel and mates, whose 7:51.3 splintered the previous standard for the

two-mile, shared the plaudits with spring-limbed Fred Samara of Fort Hamilton, who set two meet records with an unprecedented double in the pole vault and broad jump.

Through an early-morning rain and a continuing threat of more to come kept the crowd down to an enthusiastic corporals guard, it didn't dampen the spirits of the more than 3,000 schoolboy stars who competed. Nor were the Mater Christi triumph and the Samara heroics the only standout performances for the day.

DAVE PERRIN of Edison Tech, N. J., also set a meet record with a 6'7" leap in the high jump. The former record, 6'4½", was set by Randy Smith of Bellport, L.I., last year. Bob Gray of Essex Catholic in Newark won the shot put with a heave of 59'3" and Steve Narrington of South Freehold, N. J., won the javelin with a throw of 186' 11½".

Joining Mater Christi in the ranks of relay winners were Molloy, 440; Jamaica, 880; Fordham Prep, mile; Rice, distance medley; and Massapequa, on a steaming half-mile anchor leg by **Brian McElroy**, the sprint medley.

Samara, a junior, overcame a double setback in registering his double win. Practicing at Randalls Island Friday, he broke his favorite pole. He bought a new one yesterday morning. Then, on a warmup just before the broad jump started, he wrenched his knee and for about five minutes thought he'd have to ser from both events.

IN THE JUMP, he defeated

the defending champ, Ron Carter, N. Y. School of Printing, in dramatic fashion. On his last jump, Carter, who set the meet record last year with 23'6½", jumped 23'10½" to take the lead. Samara had only one try left. He poised in the runway, sprinted down to the jumpoff, soared high and away to plant his heels in the sand at a winning 23'10¾".

Samara was equally pressed in the vault. Only he and Andre Shy of Southside, Rockville Center, were left when the bar was raised to 13'3". Samara made it on his first try. Shy missed his first and brushed the bar on the second, but made it. The bar went to 13'6". Again Samara

made it the first time. Again Shy made it on his second, his body shaking the bar once more as he went over.

Up the pole went to 13'9". This time, on his first vault, Samara brushed the bar. It quivered and shook but stayed up. Shy made three gallant tries at the same height but failed. Samara then had it raised to 14 feet, but the long day, the new pole, the bruised knee and the extra height were too much. The bar fell each time.

The two-mile was a tremendous race. Though 12 teams started, it came down to a three-way battle on the final half-mile leg. Power Memorial led most of the way with the Lovett brothers, Pete and John, and Joe Barbary all breaking 2:00 comfortably. Jamaica, Brentwood and Mater Christi were all in it. Going into the final lap, Terry Walton of Jamaica took the lead but Chancy Marsh of Power took it back. Then came Philippe, moving up to third on the first turn and taking second on the backstretch.

THEN IT WAS a stride for stride duel between him and Marsh, around the last turn. Philippe won the duel, took the lead going into the straightaway and won by seven yards. He was caught in a blistering 1:53.2 for his half. Power finished second but was disqualified when Marsh threw his baton away before crossing the finish line. Power nevertheless was timed in 7:52.8, also under the previous record (7:53.1 by Mount Vernon). Jamaica, which moved up to second, did 7:54.1.

They started even as they picked up the baton for the half-mile leg. They matched strides for the first lap and ran shoulder to shoulder as they rounded the first turn of the final lap. In the backstretch, McElroy moved out

in front by a stride, with Larrimore at his heels and Rivera seven yards back.

Coach Larry Ellis' crackerjack sprint foursome won the 880 championship handily though not in the blazing time Ellis had hoped. He shifted his usual anchor man, Walton, to the two-mile, in hopes of winning two championships—and almost made it. Ted Ford, Ellis' sub anchor man on the 880, ran a fine race, fighting off Brentwood's Tony Urso in the last 50 yards to win comfortably with a team timing of 1:31.1. Brentwood was caught in 1:31.5 for second.

BRIAN McELROY, Massapequa junior, almost matched Philippe's brilliance as he anchored his team to the sprint-medley championship. This came down to a half-mile match race between McElroy, Julius Larrimore, national indoor champ from John Adams High, and Hector Rivera, the speedboy from Newtown High.

Rounding the last turn, McElroy edged away from Larrimore but going into the straightaway, Rivera came on. He made his challenge but McElroy answered it. He held his lead to win by six yards with Rivera and Newtown second and Larrimore and Adams, the defending champs, third.

MASSAPEQUA'S TIME was 3:33.0. McElroy was clocked in 1:55.7, Rivera, 1:56.7 and Larrimore 1:59.0, far off his usual figure.

It was no surprise that coach Ron Gundry's threesome from Sayreville, N.J., skimmed to the 360 shuttle hurdles championship. Sayreville is undefeated and holder of the unofficial national record for 480 yards. Gerry Carney, the leadoff man, won the 330 invitation individual championship on the Friday schedule at Randalls Island.

In both his heat and his sec-

tion of the finals, Carney stepped out to a lead his runningmates, Bill Rathbun and Paul Szawaryn, held. Perth Amboy, which had won the title in '66 and '67, came a cropper when its leadoff man hit a hurdle and fell in the heats. Sayreville's 0:45 just missed Perth Amboy's meet record 44.8.

IT WAS NO SURPRISE, either, that Dennis Fikes, sensational Rice High soph, anchored his school to the distance-medley championship in 10:28.0, less than 0:07 from the meet record.

Fox Lane, New Dorp and Sewanaka were alternating leaders on the first three legs. Fikes was 30 yards behind in fifth place when he picked up the baton. First, he passed Marty Walsh of New Dorp. Next, he moved up on Herb Camien of Sewanaka. Then, with a lap to go, he showed his heels to Jim Ingegneri of Fox Lane. Ingegneri stayed with him and challenged, but the 16-year-old soph held his lead and breezed in. Fikes was clocked in 4:18.6 for his mile leg; Ingegneri in 4:21; Camien in 4:26.6.

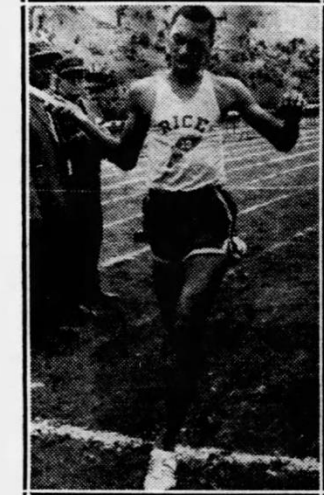

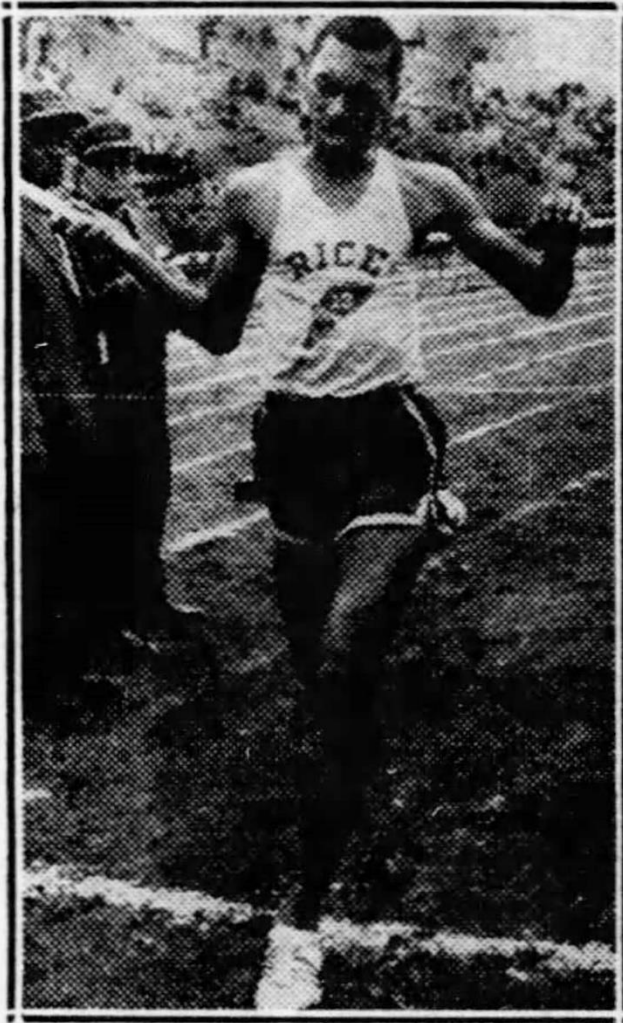

Send him the tenner you don't have because the New York Relays was a groovy scene and Fordham Prep co-sponsored it with THE NEWS and the Prep's fund-raising drive should have as much get up and go as some of the 3,000 New York City schoolboy runners who competed.

That's what an over-30 Prep grad was thinking as he watched Rev. Eugene O'Brien, Society of Jesus, sit through a weekend of schoolboy racing, rooting his Fordham Prep kids home at Randanas Island.

U.G.O.B.S.J. had come a long way from the scholastic who was known by his initials to a generation of Prep kids who would never forget the day he had to proctor an exam and stood up on a desk and said: "You are all gentleman so of course there will be no cheating."

Now Rev. O'Brien is trying to raise \$3½ million for a new Prep building that looks like a birthday cake and the largest single donor has been somebody named "Anonymous" who donated something like \$500,000 and the rest of the alumni combined should only do as well. But there was U.G.O.B.S.T. watching 'em all go off to the races and a Prep mile relay team that didn't really figure came home with a championship.

It was just one of a series of exciting races in the great track carnival that is the brainchild of ex-Fordham Prep track coach Joe Fox.

Fordham Prep sophomore Gene Costello led off with a 52.9 leg

that left the L'il Rams wallowing in around sixth place when senior football ace Joe Schaller grabbed the relay stick and took off like the Xavier backfield was chasing him. Those tightly muscled legs ground out the yards until Joe looked up for the first time on his hand off and saw he was second on a 50.2 split that carried him past Jackson, Spellman, Bushwick and Molloy with only Midwood out in front.

Junior Fred Miller stretched those long legs of his 'til he looked like Ichabod Crane galloping through Sleepy Hollow but he was maybe three yards ahead of Midwood when he handed off to soph John Hallinan. Mauger ran 48.8, the fastest 440 on the track, but it was close and no cigar for Spellman, the pre-race favorite. Manhattan-Bronx kids looked great all over the track, though.

For example, Rice's sensational soph Dennis Fikes anchored his team to the distance medley championship with a 4:18.6 mile. Tyrone Cunningham of Gompers won the triple jump with a leap of 47 feet two inches. Arthur Mudd of Roosevelt and Maurice Silverman, the Stuyvesant football player, looked "boss" in the hurdles even though they didn't win.

And Chancy Marsh of Power had to be the hard luck runner of the meet. Chancy ran a 1:57 anchor half in the two mile relay only to be nailed at the tape by Mater Christi's Marcel Philippe, who hit 1:53.2.

Inaugural Meet At White Plains HS Saturday

Westchester Runners Have Best Times For Distance Races At Loucks Games

WHITE PLAINS—

Much of the interest in the Glenn D. Loucks Memorial Track and Field Games Saturday at White Plains High School will center around the distance running events.

At least eight of the milers have hit 4:20 or better and two of the two-milers have clockings of 9:20 or faster. The best times of entries in each event are held by Westchester parochial school runners.

Bill McLoughlin of Sacred Heart in Yonkers has run a 4:13.6 mile, erasing the 4:14.8 record set in 1965 by Ossining's John Lengers. With pushing, he could conceivably get down to 4:10.

Another Ossining miler will be out to regain the record for the Indians. He is Amos Young, whose 4:18.0 clocking is the fourth best among the 33 entries — just one second slower than Julio Pizza of Brooklyn Tech and one-tenth slower than Denis Fikes of Rice.

The other top performers include John Brady of St. Helena (4:19.0), Marcell Phillipe of Long Island City's Mater Christe (4:19.3), David Lynch of Essex Catholic (4:20.0) and Joe Savage of Roselle Catholic (4:20.0).

At double the distance, Jim Schindler of Archbishop Stepinac of White Plains leads the pack with a 9:16.5. However, this time is well above the record of 9:09.6, which Dave Pottetti of Fox Lane set last year. Pottetti's mark is also a State standard.

Providing the smooth-striding Crusader with his toughest competition is expected to be Brooklyn Tech's Piazza, who has a 9:20.0 to his credit. Four others in the field of 30 have broken 9:30.

Tony Carrion of Bishop DuBois has a 9:23.4 clocking, Fikes a 9:23.5 and Jeak Seniuk of Ossining and Michael Kehoe of Essex Catholic a 9:24.0.

Nearly all of the 43 contest-

ants in the 880-yard run have broken two minutes, with St. Helena's John Brady possessing a 1:52.5 clocking for the best.

Julius Larrymore of John Adams has a 1:53.5 and Peter Toohy of Essex Catholic a 1:54.0. The best county performer is Jim Ingegneri of Fox Lane, who has run a 1:54.9.

These times compare with the county record of 1:53.4 set in 1964 by Earl Jordan of White Plains.

The 43 entries in the half-mile race tops the individual listings.

The dashes should also provide ample excitement. There of the 39 entrants in the heats of the 100 have broken 10 seconds — and another nine have 10 seconds flat — a dozen of the 39 contestants in the 220 have bettered 22 seconds and 11 of the 37 quarter-milers have gone under 50 seconds.

In the 100, Phil Covington of Fox Lane has come closest to the 9.6 record set by Barry Townsend of Edgemont in 1960 and matched by Ollie Hunter of New Rochelle four years later. The Fox Lane sprinter has been clocked in 9.8. Steve Albert of New Rochelle and Phil Lewis of Gompers have been clocked in 9.9.

Among the group at 10 seconds are Kenneth Burton and Ian Hall of Mount Vernon and

Earl Crutchfield of New Rochelle.

Best times for the 220 entries is 21.3 indoors by Ernest Moore of Edison Vocational and Herman Williams of Andrew Jackson in a relay.

William Coatney of Edison has a 21.4 indoors and Deril Watley of Newton the same in a relay. Michael Vaughan of Mount Vernon and Lewis of Gompers both have 21.6 in relay legs.

Covington has a 21.7 straight-away clocking while Craig Davis of Mount Vernon has the same in a relay.

The record for the distance around a turn is 21.2 by Bruce Pratt of Fox Lane in 1965.

Otis Hill of White Plains holds the Westchester and State records for the 440 with 47.3 seconds in 1966. The best among the entries is 48.2 in relay legs by Leroy Latta of Carnarsi and Hector Rivera of Newton. Terry Walton of Jamaica has a 48.9 and Delio Valdes of Mount Vernon a 49 flat, same as William James of Bushwick.

All in all, the flat running races should produce the best competition ever seen in the county.

Competition in the inaugural meet will commence at 11 a.m. The Olympic-type parade of athletes and brief dedication ceremonies will begin at 10:15 a.m.

FESTIVITIES MARK SCHOOLBOY MEET

Brady, McLoughlin Produce Standout Track Efforts

WHITE PLAINS, May 11—The fanciest schoolboy track meet to be staged in the metropolitan area in many years produced some top-grade performances today.

The first annual Glenn D. Loucks Memorial Track and Field Games, sponsored by the White Plains Board of Education at the city's handsome high school facilities, included a premeet ceremony, a parade, a speech by the Mayor, band playing and a plaque unveiling. The field was dotted by colorful pennants, the officials wore hats of different hues, a striped awning tent covered the prizes, scorekeepers and press, and the first-place prizes were trophies, designed by Lumen Martin Winter, a well-known artist and sculptor, in the form of the Olympic torch.

The only setback the meet received was a lack of cooperation from the weatherman. A light rain fell almost throughout the meet, making the cinder track soft and the all-weather infield runways slippery.

The athletes, representing more than 80 schools in the East, seemed inspired by the surroundings, which included spectators sitting in the grass on the high hill surrounding one part of the track.

Two of the most inspired were John Brady of St. Helena, the Bronx, and Bill McLoughlin of Sacred Heart High, Yonkers. Brady ran the fifth fastest 880 in New York State history with a clocking of 1 minute 51.9 seconds. McLoughlin, his 116-pound frame went from the rain, was in front all the way in winning the mile in 5:12.8, the best time in the country to date this year.

Bound for Notre Dame

Brady, who set a national flat-floor record for the 1,000 last winter, ran a smart race in the half-mile. Julius Larrymore of Adams, winner in 1:52.6 at Englewood last week, sprinted away from the field right at the start, as he did last Saturday in New Jersey.

He had five yards on the field at the 220, but then he slowed down. He had a small lead on John Heath of Flushing and Brady at the 440 mark, which he passed in 53.2 seconds. At the next turn Brady was in the lead with Heath right behind and Larrymore dropping back fast.

The St. Helena senior, who is headed for Notre Dame, built a 10-yard lead down the backstretch and held it to the wire for the fastest 880 of his career. Heath posted his fastest at 1:53.8. Larrymore finished far back, sixth in 2:01.9.

"I thought Larrymore was going to run 1:40 the way he sprinted that first 220," Brady said. "I figured he was nuts and I wasn't going to run after him. I'm sure glad I was right."

Denis Fikes, a 16-year old sophomore from Rice High in Manhattan, also was outstanding as he clocked 9:23.2 in winning the two-mile, the fastest time for the distance by a New York State second-year schoolboy. Fikes last year set a freshman state mark in the mile with a 4:28.

Other noteworthy performances were a 13-foot-9-inch pole vault by Fred Samara, Fort Hamilton, Brooklyn (he also finished third in the long jump), a double victory for Brooklyn's Edison high in the sprints as Bill Coatney won the 100 in 9.9 seconds and Ernie Moore the 220 in 21.9 seconds; the first 60-footer in the shot put for Fred Kurtz of New Jersey's Glen Ridge (60-4/4), and a snappy 7:49.5 two-mile relay victory by Powers Memorial of Manhattan.

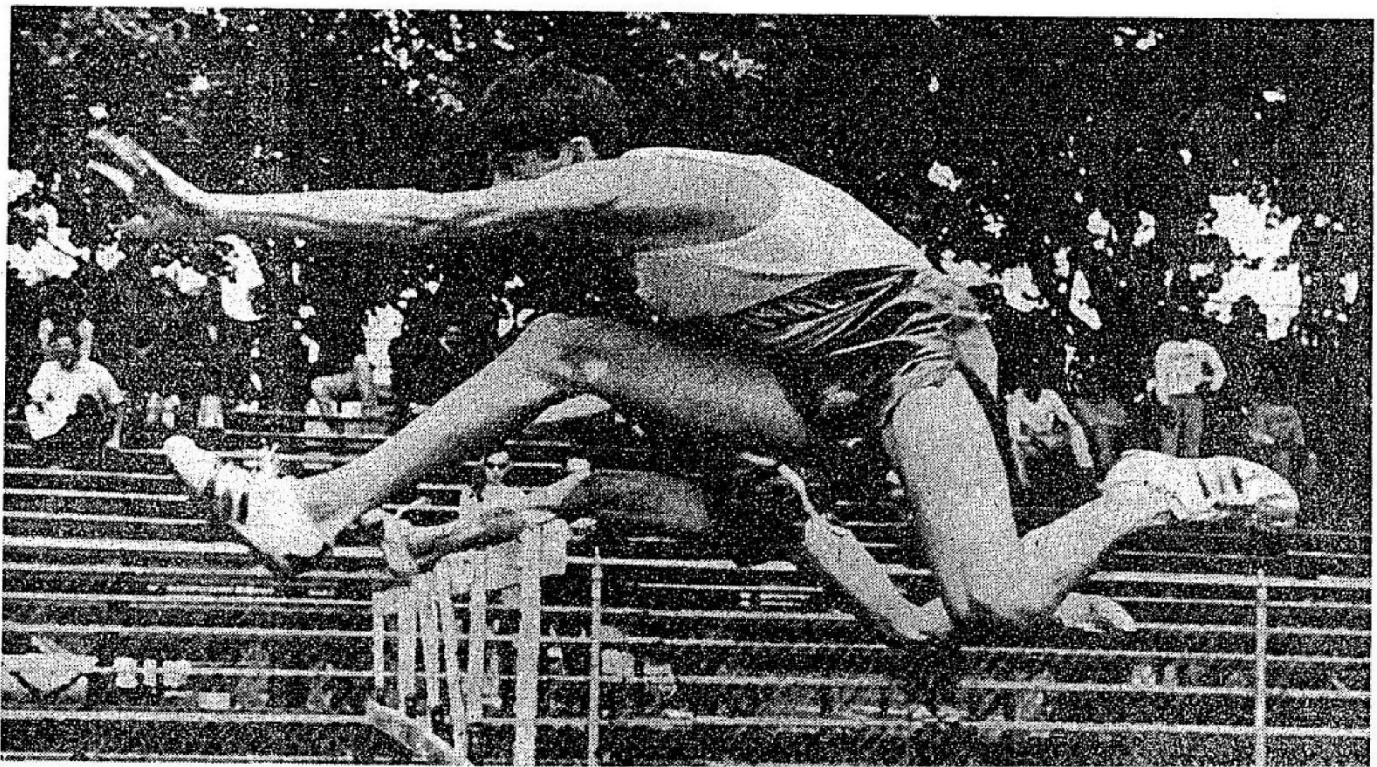

2-MILE MARK SET IN SCHOOL MEET

Schindler Breaks Record—
Team Title to Stepinac

Jim Schindler set a meet mark in the two-mile, Dennis Fikes ran his fastest half-mile, Vince Dwyer posted a New York State record for freshmen and Archbishop Stepinac of White Plains captured the team title yesterday in the 37th annual Athletic Association of Private Schools championships.

The second section of the two-day met was held at Mount Michael's McGovern Field in the Bronx. Originally it was listed for Randalls Island on Friday but rain forced a postponement. Randalls Island was not available yesterday.

Schindler, a senior headed for New York University, scored an easy victory, winning by over 60 yards in 9 minutes 31.2 seconds, more than 5 seconds under the previous record. The 17-year-old Stepinac runner, who has run 9:22 this season, said he didn't push himself. "The prom was last night and I was a little tired today," he said.

Fikes, a 16-year-old sophomore, turned in a 1:55.7, anchor-leg 880 on the record-setting Rice High two-mile relay team (8:00.9). The youngster, who had excellent cross-country and indoor seasons and has bettered 4:18 in the mile this campaign, was making one of his few starts at the half-mile. "I thought it would give him a good speed workout for the mile and two-mile races coming up," his coach, Joe O'Keefe, said.

Freshman Mark Broken

Dwyer, a 15-year-old freshman at Rice, finished second to Schindler in 9:43.4. This erased the previous New York state record held by Mark Bingham of Fox Lane since 1964. Dwyer entered Rice to play basketball but he was convinced by Ed Robinson, the school's freshman track coach, to try his hand at running.

Stepinac, scoring in 12 of the 17 events, retained its team title by a narrow margin. Bill Krebs's squad posted 47 points while Cardinal Hayes of the Bronx had 45 2/3. St. Francis Prep, which did all of its scoring in the field events, was third with 39 1/2.

In addition to Schindler, Stepinac had a second individual winner in Bob Curran, a strapping senior, who will enter West Point in the fall, had an easy time of it and won in 4:22.8. He went to the senior prom Friday night, too.

Seton Hall, of Patchogue, L. I., won the Class B team title with 65 points. Delehanty Academy was a distant second with 14. St. Francis Prep, of Brooklyn, took the freshman title with 27 1/2 points.

Sets Sophomore State Mark in C.H.S.A.A. Sectional

Denis Fikes of Rice posted a New York State sophomore record for the mile run yesterday when he was timed in 4 minutes 14.8 seconds in the Catholic High Schools Athletic Association New York sectional track and field championships at McGovern Field in the Bronx.

Fikes, who also holds the freshman mark of 4:28, finished 10 yards ahead of Bob Curran of Archbishop Stepinac (4:16.9). Dan Carroll of St. Peter's was third in 4:19.6 and John Brady of St. Helena fourth in 4:24.8.

NEW YORK—Archbishop Stepinac High School of White Plains ran away with the Catholic High Schools Athletic Association Sectional track and field championship Saturday at Mount St. Michael's all-weather track in the Bronx.

After scoring 22 points with three firsts in Friday's field events, the Crusaders added two more victories to finish with 52-5-6 points, well ahead of Monsignor Farrell High's runnerup 29. Nineteen schools competed in the meet to determine the Bronx, Manhattan, Westchester titlist.

Bert Hurns, who had won the triple jump Friday with a 44-0 effort, gained a double by posting a 21.5 clocking in the 180 yard low hurdles, in which teammate Martin Camargo took fourth.

Jack Fogarty, third to Hurns in the triple jump, garnered a

third place tie in the high hurdles.

Jim Schindler covered the two mile run in 9:26.6, to easily surpass the record of 9:32 set by Power's Garth McKay last year.

Fellow Stepinac distance man Bob Curran led through three laps of the mile but fell behind in the last 440 to trail Dennis Fikes of Rice by some 10 yards. Fikes' 4:14.8 and Curran's 4:16.5 were both well below the former meet mark of 4:22.

Ted O'Donnell's 1:59.1 was good for fourth in the 880 while fifth place finishes were earned by Roland Baroni in the 100 and by the 880 relay quartet of Rich Calarco, Jim Moore, Jim Buchignano, and Bob Briggs.

In a special novice mile run, Crusader freshman Frank Skuthan turned in a sparkling 4:49 to capture third.

Sophomore Neil Stone had cleared 12-6 and Mike Benziger 11-6 to give Stepinac a 1-2 finish in the pole vault Friday. Kevin Crowley added another first with a 168-0 javelin toss.

Bruce Pahlot took runnerup honors in the shot put with a 51-10 effort and hurled the discus 130-0, good for third.

Carl Mohr gained a fourth in the long jump while Neil Connelly tied for fifth in the high jump.

Coach Joe Krebs is now pointing his squad toward Saturday's Catholic Championships at Randall's Island. Stepinac's biggest competition is expected to come from Archbishop Molloy, which dominated the Long Island Sectionals.

Dennis Fikes, a budding sophomore, blossomed under the hot sun at Downing Stadium yesterday. The Rice High product blazed to a meet-record victory in the two-mile in the 12th Eastern States Interscholastic track championships.

Fikes clocked 9:20.6 to shatter the mark of 9:27.1 established in 1966 by Fred Protopappas of Elizabeth. His performance also dipped below his own New York State soph record of 9:23.2.

GENE PAKUS of East Meadow posted a meet record in the pole vault by scaling 14 feet to snap the mark of 13-7½ set by Gil Botvin of Peddie in 1965. The 100-yard mark was equaled by stocky Bill Coatney of Edison, who streaked to a 9.7 time.

In the long jump, Ron Carter of Printing leaped 24-4, the best this season for a state schoolboy.

Boys High, running with soph Kevin Davis and Mark Buchanan and juniors Larry Hinds and Trevor Mathews, won the 880 relay in 1:27.7 to establish records for the meet and PSAL.

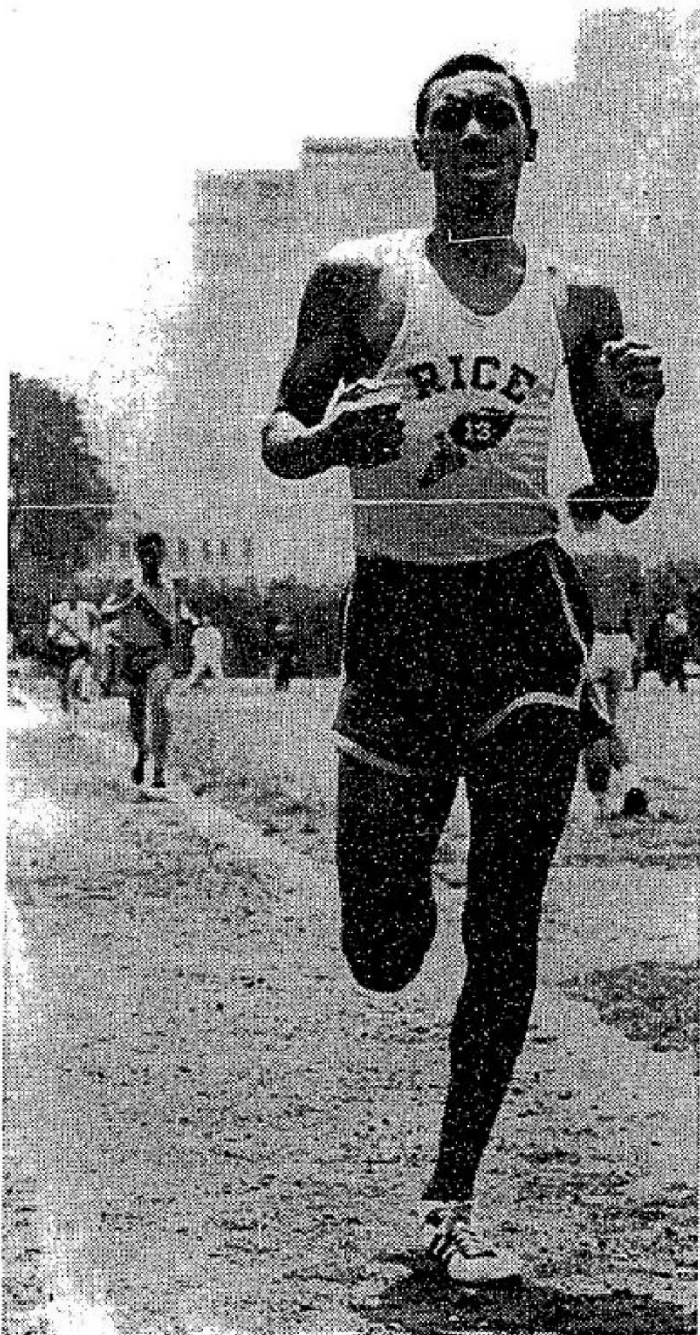

Fikes, Rice Sophomore, Snaps 2-Mile Mark in Eastern States

Denis Fikes celebrated his 17th birthday last Wednesday, but it wasn't until yesterday that he received his best present and that one he gave to himself.

Running in the annual Eastern States interscholastic track and field championships at Randalls Island, the tall Rice High School sophomore posted a meet record of 9 minutes 20.6 seconds in the two-mile run. He also smashed the New York State record of 9:23.2 for sophomores, which he set only a month ago.

"It sure capped a happy week for me," Fikes said. "I couldn't have had a nicer present."

It has been a brilliant year for the 6-foot-2-inch, 150-pounder. Two weeks ago he ran the mile in 4:14.8, also a state record for second-year students.

Class records are not maintained for indoor performances, but Fike's 9:23.5 at two miles last winter was probably the fastest for a sophomore in the state. And in the cross-country season, he won five of seven races and had a clocking of

12:44 for 2½ miles at Van Cortlandt Park, considered the fastest for a sophomore.

Two other meet records were posted and one was tied as the curtain went down on the schoolboy season. The Eastern States usually draws the best track and field athletes from New York and surrounding states. This year there were entries from more than 90 schools.

Gene Pakus, a senior from East Meadow (L.I.) High, cleared 14 feet, his best height, to erase the pole-vault mark, and a swift 880-yard foursome from Boys High did 1:7.7 for the other record.

Bill Coatney, the undefeated sprinter from Edison High in Queens, gained his seventh victory of the season in the 100-yard dash at 9.7 seconds, tying the meet mark. He is headed for the University of Southern California.

Essex Catholic of Newark, scoring all its points in three of the 18 events, captured the team title with 17 without benefit of a first place. It tallied in the shot-put, discus throw and javelin throw.

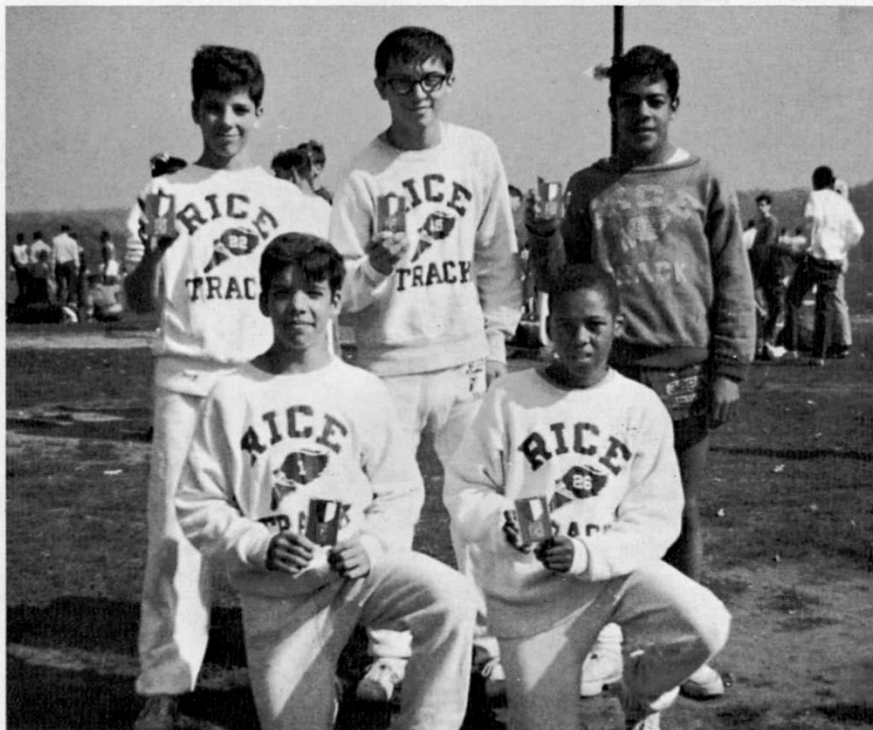

STEPINAC, MOLLOY WIN TRACK TITLES

10 Marks Set in C.H.S.A.A.
Division Competition

Archbishop Stepinac of White Plains and Archbishop Molloy of Queens captured the team titles yesterday as 10 meet records were set in the Catholic High Schools Athletic Association division indoor track and field championships at the 102d Engineers Armory.

Stepinac won the New York division crown with 28½ points in a close team race. Molloy, on the other hand, had an easy time winning its eighth straight Brooklyn-Long Island title with 49½ points.

Six meet records fell in the New York section while four marks were posted in the other section. Both meets, which had a combined total of 24 open events, consumed more than 8 hours.

The most notable of the records was the 9:29.1 registered by Garth McKay of Power Memorial in the New York two-mile run. This lowered the record by more than 13 seconds and was the third fastest run by a C.H.S.A.A. two-miler indoors.

Ed Zieminski of Molloy and John Brady of St. Helena, the Bronx, two of the top milers in this area came up with record winning efforts in their specialty. Brady, who won the mile at the Hayes meet last week (4:20.3), had a faster time than the Molloy senior by two-tenths of a second. The 16-year-old junior had a 4:22.8, compared to Zieminski's 4:23.

Bob Galchus of Chaminade registered the other noteworthy record in the high jump. The Mincola senior cleared 6 feet 5 inches his best height to date. He attempted 6-7 but failed to clear on all three tries.

Brady Wins Catholic School Mile Run in 4:15.5

BRONX BOY SETS MARK FOR JUNIOR

Rampino Triumphs in 440
—Chaminade Beats Out
Molloy for Title

John Brady of St. Helena, who hadn't eaten since Friday night, ran the fastest mile ever run by a New York State schoolboy in his junior year yesterday in the 40th annual Catholic High Schools Athletic Association outdoor track and field championships.

Brady's time of 4 minutes 15.5 seconds at Downing Stadium on Randalls Island bettered the former state mark of 4:18.2 set by Amos Young of Ossining High several weeks ago. It also put into discard the Catholic record of 4:19.9 held by Brian Kivlan of Bishop DuBois, who now competes for Manhattan College.

The mile-run produced two other New York state records. Marcelle Phillipe of Mater Christi, with a third-place time of 4:19.7, lowered the sophomore standard of 4:23.7 set by John Lengers of Ossining in 1963. In doing 4:28 in seventh place, 15-year-old Denis Fikes, a Rice freshman, beat the freshman mark of 4:28.7 established by Mark Bingham of Fox Lane in 1964.

Chaminade of Mineola beat out the defenders, Archbishop Molloy of Queens for the team championship. The flyers tallied 39½ points to Molloy's 33½. Archbishop Stepinac of White Plains was third with 28½ and Cardinal Hayes of the Bronx fourth with 21 points.

Other Meet Marks Set

Robert Rampino of Nazareth, in the 440 (48.9 seconds); Mark Longo of Brooklyn Prep in the two-mile run (9:33.5); Terry Kramer of Stepinac in the pole vault (13 feet 6¼ inches) and Ray Jenkins, of Hayes in the triple jump (44 feet 9¾ inches) registered other individual meet records.

Bishop Loughlin's 880-yard relay team turned in a meet mark in that event. The foursome of Ollie Robinson, Chris Fox, Tom Bryant and John Carroll was timed in 1:30.5.

Brady, who will be 17 years old two weeks from today, provided the thrill of the meet for the handful of spectators. Never off the pace by more than a few yards, the 5-foot 11-inch 133-pounder from the Bronx moved quickly around Edward Zieminski of Molloy, who was favored, on the gun lap and blazed through the final quarter 61.6 seconds to triumph by more than 30 yards.

Zieminski faded badly and finished in sixth place and out of the point scoring which hurt Molloy's team title aspirations. Robert McLaughlin of Sacred Heart of Yonkers, nipped Philippe for second place in 4:19.4, his fastest mile. Martin Thompson of St. Pius X, in fourth, also recorded his best mile of 4:20.5.

Brady, who lost to Zieminski in Schenectady two weeks ago, said he didn't feel good during that race. "I ate that morning, and I think that's what did it. So I decided that I wouldn't eat until I ran. I followed this routine during the indoor season and was beaten only once in five races."

The long-striding youth had been the surprise of the indoor season with three victories in the mile-run (including the Catholic indoor title), one triumph in the 1,000 (2:16.3) and a second-place in the two-mile run (9:35.1).

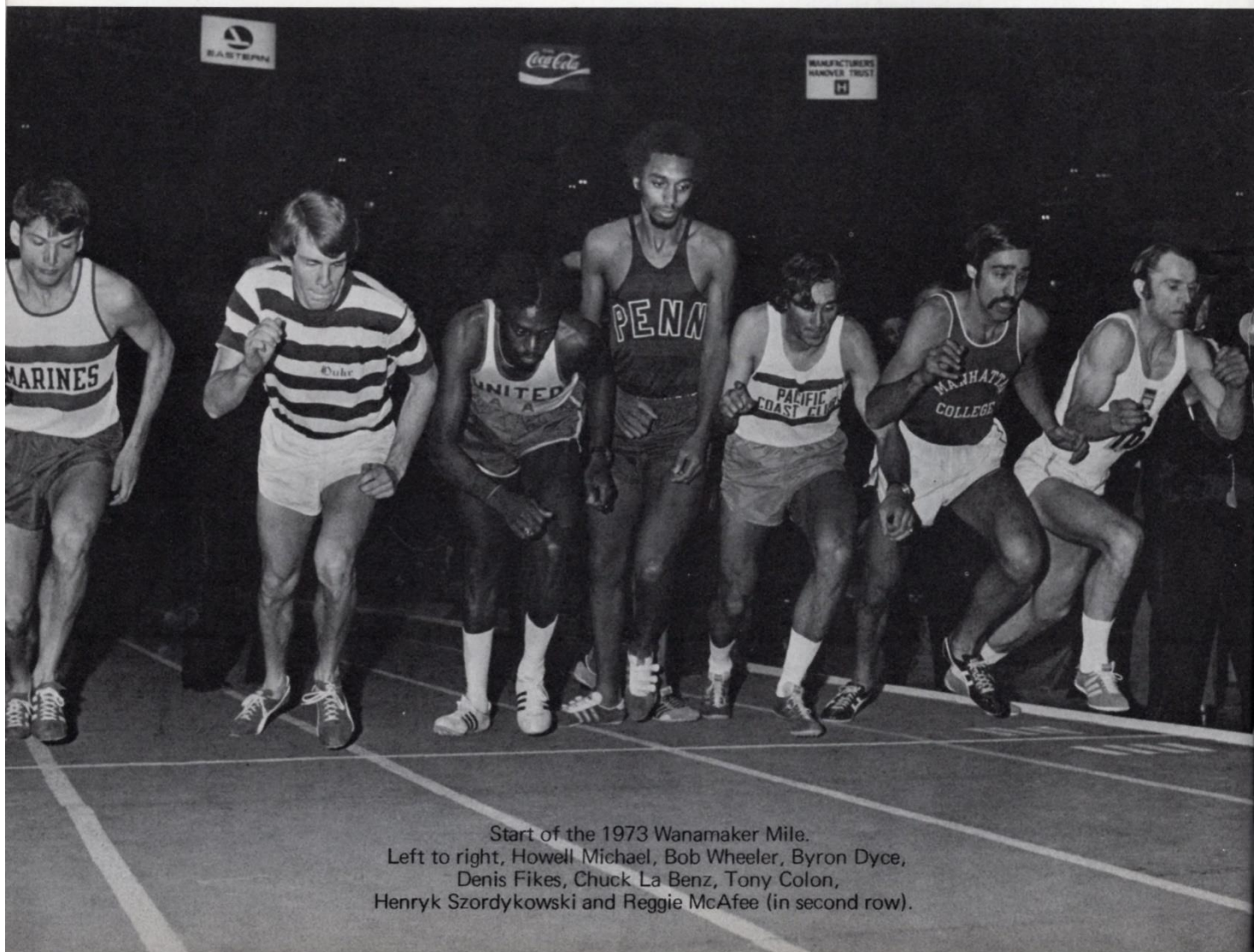
