Student Council

This year's Council was the first to serve under the revised Constitution. The main provisions of this new Constitution resulted in an enlarged Council. The Council was increased from 13 to 39 members and was composed of a General Membership and an Executive Committee.

Under the able leadership of president Richard Cairns the Council worked hard to overcome the problems inherent in the diversity of opinions and problems resulting from the greater participation of the Student Body in the affairs of the Council.

One of the big projects undertaken by the Council this year was the education of the Student Body to the fact that the Student Council is an advisory body and not a legislative body. The purpose of the Council is to provide a channel through which the ideas and wishes of the Student Body could be made known to the Administration and conversely the thoughts of the Administration could be made known to the Student Body.

Any failure of the Council to live up to the wishes of the Student Body can be traced basically to a failure on the part of the Council to put across a true picture of its function in the school.

The Council continued to function as an aid to the Director of Activities in serving as a regulatory body overseeing the Activities Program in the school and running such affairs as the School Outing, the Senior Prom, the Activities Evening, and the Senior-Faculty Basketball Game.

Everything considered the Council has set a standard which future Councils will be hard pressed to surpass.

National Honor Society







Dance Committee





Aside from having fun, the committee diligently takes care of things like the back doors, the front door, the sodas, and generally keeps the peace.





Varsity "A" Basketball

This year's Power team had the best record since Lew Alcindor left the Academy. The record of 18 wins and 3 losses is impressive, but better things are expected next year. The Panthers had a defensive squad that many college coaches envy; it held the opposition to an average of less than 50 points per game, and twice in the playoffs held the opponent to under forty. The teams offensive skill matched its defense; the team leaders were Jap Trimble (17 ppg), Ed Searcy (15 ppg) and Len Elmore (14ppg).

The team this year was composed of 9 juniors and 3 seniors, led by the captain Emil "Pecky" Gilbert. Although "Pecky" was the smallest starter at 5'10", his sharp outside shooting and skillful ball-handling broke open many games for the Panthers. Lenny Rowe, a forward, proved to be the defensive ace of the squad; he proved his great ability in the championship game by holding Kevin Joyce, Molloy's All-American, to 16 points (19 below his average). Len Elmore, Ed Searcy and Jap Trimble controlled the offensive and defensive boards for Power by finishing the season with 15, 15 and 8 rebounds per game respectively. Power's bench composed of Alan Young, Bob Toner, Steve Duthie, Reggie Small, Gerald Lawrence, Joe Vetack and Brian Dalton helped to move Power closer to victory in many tense games.






J.V. Basketball
