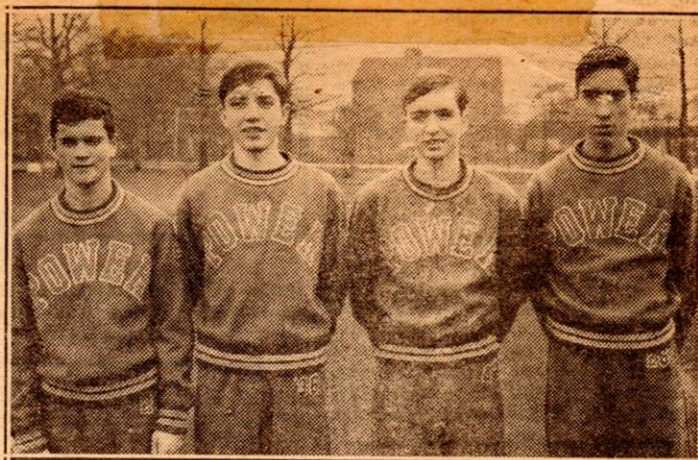

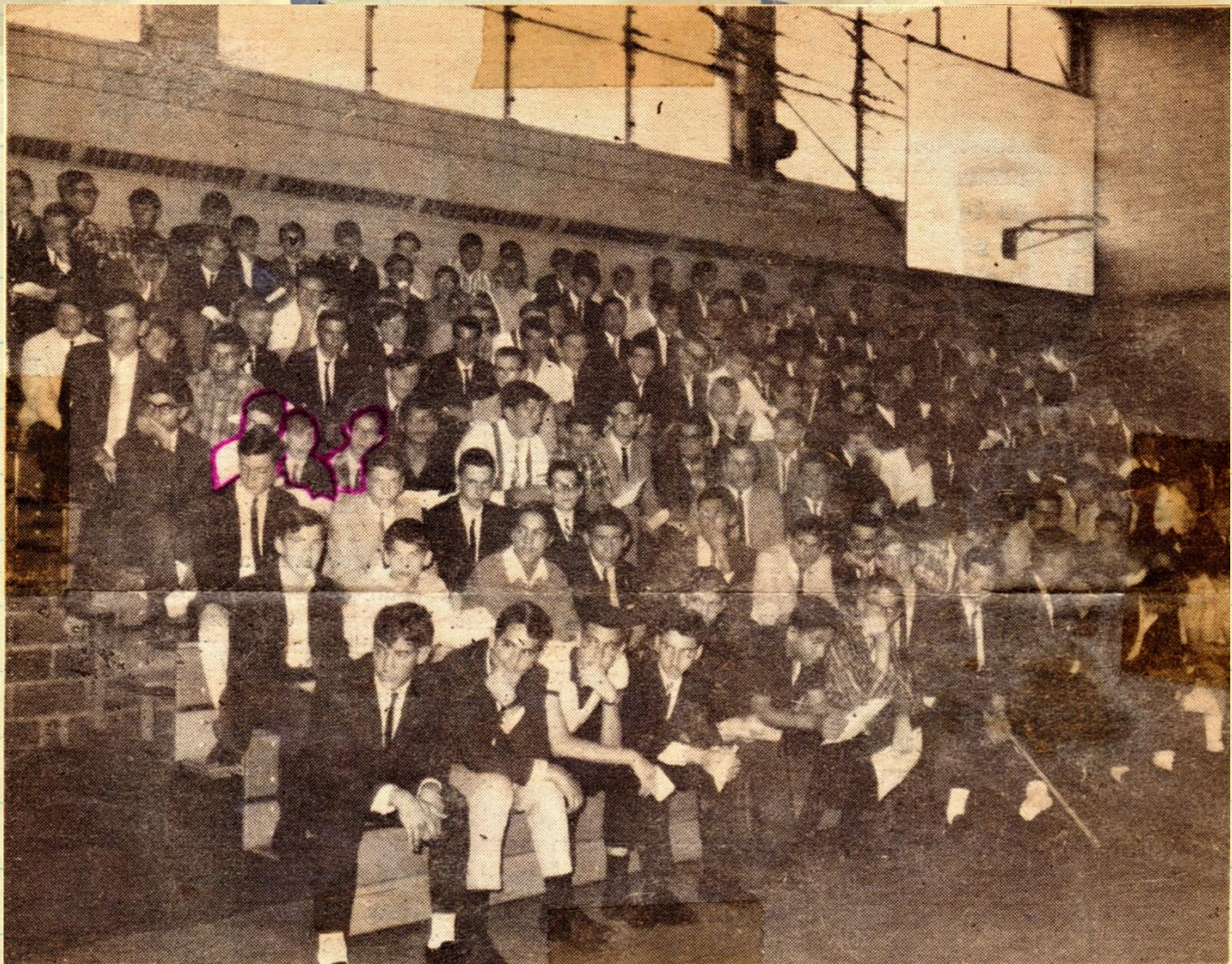
Although Norwood Todmann, Tony Festa, and Eric Brown left a deep gap to fill in the Power Varsity and a few second string Seniors may be dropped from the squad this year, last year's J.V. men and the seniors remaining on the team will be enough to make up the loss. The J.V. shouldn't have too many problems making the play-offs this year either; they certainly have the potential and two consecutive championships would look pretty impressive.

With mainly seniors carrying the trackteam this year in the Varsity division, you can also count on Power to be a strong contender for both indoor and outdoor championships. CHS Meet Ends in 3-Way Tie

Archbishop Molloy, Cardinal Spellman and Chaminade High Schools indoor relay carnival at 102d Engineers Armory. It was the opening track meet of the season and drew 1,500 entries.

Molloy won the mile relay in 8:31.4 and the 180-yard shuttle hurdles in 24.2 seconds. Coach Frank Rienzo's charges might have won a third gold medal if Ed Ziemiński had not been touched off so far back in the distance medley.

RUNNING THE anchor mile, Ziemiński ran a sparkling 4:20.3 mile, his best ever, but his Herculean effort fell 25 yards short of catching Garth McKay of Power, who, with a 4:27.7, brought his team home first in 7:45.4. The Molloy senior was in 14th place when he got the stick, 110 yards behind McKay.

Spellman captured the shotput relay (147 feet, 11 inches) as Richard Conte had an individual

heave of 57-7, and the sprint medley in 2:34.4.

CHAMINADE'S victories came in the two-mile relay (8:12.6) when Mike Carey came from behind in the anchor half, and the high jump relay with a combined height of 17 feet, 4 inches. Jim Reilly led the Flyers with a leap of 6-2.

Coach Jack Mulligan has molded 10 boys into smooth-striding machines that ran the 2½ miles of torture that is the Van Cortlandt Park cross-country course in under 14 minutes.

If you think that's easy, try it. I did. I nearly collapsed trying. It was the kind of crazy thing a guy might do just before he turns 30, maybe a silly attempt to recapture flying youth.

Tennessee Williams said this better in "Cat on a Hot Tin Roof." He had the hero, Brick, running

You know, Mary, I think you're right and I hope the boss reads this. Because any boy who runs across the flats at Van Cortlandt and onto the cowpath and up the hill and across the bridge and into those deep woods, back across the bridge and down that hill and across the long flat straightaway before he hits the finish line deserves to get his name in the papers. And about 1,500 boys do that one Saturday after another in at least six championship cross-country runs.

Track Every Saturday

Problem of Conditioning

Some run faster than others. I know, because my mouth was full of cotton, my heart was banging like a drum, my arms were down around my ankles and my legs felt as if they couldn't move another inch when I tried to run the Van Cortlandt course recently.

It was well over 30 minutes before I staggered across the finish. Once I could run the distance in better than half that time. The conditioning helped me become a half- and a quarter-miler who ran his way through college on scholarship. But I wasn't in the same league as the Power kids today.

For example, Power's Garth McKay, all 5-6½, 120 pounds of him, ran 2½ miles in 12:57.7, hit 4:27 in his first mile run as a senior and can go under two minutes as a half-miler. That's running—and 17 colleges want him. Almost as many want his team mate, Richie Stewart.

Rich hit 13:15 for 2½ miles, galloped a 4:22 mile, ran a lead-off half-mile leg of 1:57 in the CHSAA relays the other night and hit 1:55 outdoors last year.

He should come close to Eddie Duchini's indoor flat track mark of 1:55, if he doesn't break it.

Returns to Power

And Eddie will be rooting for him, because Duchini is back at Power teaching after some great half-mile runs while at Georgetown. Power has some other great 2½ milers in such juniors as Joe Barbary, who hit 13:10; Chancy Marsh (a 2:01 half-miler) who ran 13:23; Gordon Jackson, a 13:39 man; Richard O'Brien, who clocked 13:46 and Mario Campo, a 4:25 miler and 1:57 half-miler who ran 13:53 in cross-country.

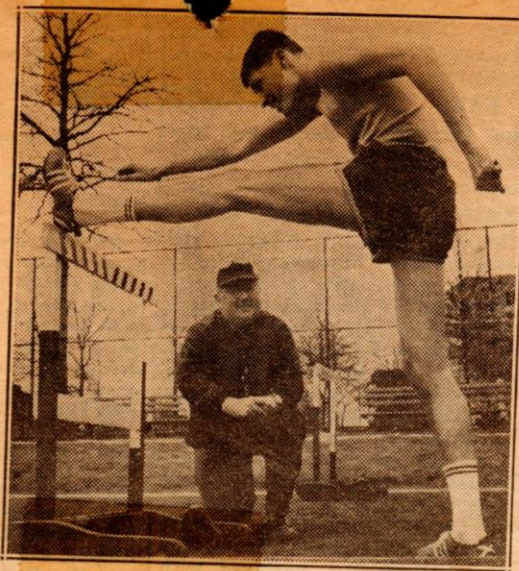
Then there are Pete Lovett and Joaquin Gonzalez, who ran in the 13:50s as did sophomore Andy Walsh. And, for balance, there are 14-minute men: Dick Bollbach, Oswald Vargas, Desmond O'Hanlon and Keith Heron.

Put them all together and you have a great team that could end Molloy's string of six consecutive indoor CHSAA victories. What's the secret? Said Power Coach Mulligan: "The Swedish method of run, jog, walk and sprint distances at intervals. We tried it in Sheep Meadow in Central Park." And boy, does it work!

Power Memorial Out For 3 Carnival Titles

There will be plenty of power at the New York Relays come Saturday, April 30, and a lot of it will be spelled with a capital "P". That's because coach John Mulligan's track forces from Power Memorial Academy will be match-

ing strides with schoolboy rivals from all sectors when the big, new interscholastic track and field carnival gets under way.

One of the top track schools in the Catholic High School AA, Power is readying a bid for three relay victories, one in the championship distance medley relay, another in the shuttle hurdles and a third in either the championship or Class two-mile event. It's a big order for the West 61st St. school but Mulligan's minions may make it.

POWER MEMORIAL tracksters have reaped an ample share of championships honors within their reach. They won the CHSAA cross-country championship in the fall and collected team honors at the Iona Games during the indoor campaign. It's a good bet additional baubles will fall to their flying feet before the current outdoor season ends.

The shuttle hurdles relay championship is a prime target. This is a three-leg, 360-yard race and Power has three top-notchers to fill the bill—seniors Marty Nevrla and Ewald Greene and junior Manny Yanez. Running as individuals, they finished 1-2-3 in the CSHAA sectional championships and 1-4-6 in the loop's city-wide title meet. All three have bettered 7.9 for the 60 indoors with Nevrla's 7.4 clocking the flashiest.

MULLIGAN'S distance-medley foursome is a young one, including soph Chaney Marsh, and two juniors, Mario Compo and Al Novell. The lone senior, Richie Stewart, is one of the best milers (4:25) in the metropolitan area though he can hold his own at

any distance from the quarter to two miles. He won the CHSAA sectional title for the half-mile.

Compo, a crack 600 speedster indoors, will handle the quarter-mile and soph Marsh the half. Novell, the lone senior takes on the three-quarter mile leg. Novell has a 4:27 mile and has broken 2:00 for the half. Another junior, Garth McKay, who packs little more than 110 pounds on a lean, wiry frame, also has a chance to crack into the lineup on one of the first three legs.

IF MCKAY DOESN'T get the distance medley assignment, he's sure to step out with the two-mile quartet. No. 1 man on the cross-country team, he won the sectional two-mile title indoors and finished second in the same event in the citywide championships.

Seniors Wakefield Mahon and Bob Spaulding also are certain of getting the call. They're regulars on the two-mile quartet which registered several big wins during the indoor meets.

Mulligan is holding the fourth spot open. He has four fine prospects, including John Mulligan Jr., a senior. Also bidding for the baton are juniors Don Irvin and Rich Bollback, and 115-pound soph Pete Lovett.

MULLIGAN SR., himself a graduate of Power Memorial where he stopped the clock at 4:28 for the mile, has been coaching regularly at the school since '56 and has produced a number of speedsters who made names for themselves in college track.

Protopappas Triumphs in 12:51 In C.H.S.A.A. Cross-Country

Fred Protopappas of Nazareth ran the fastest schoolboy cross-country race at Van Cortlandt Park this season yesterday while winning the Catholic High School Athletic Association championship.

Protopappas covered the 2½-mile course in 12 minutes 51 seconds to set a meet record. Power Memorial easily won the team title with 56 points.

The 17-year-old senior's time clipped a full second off the mark set in last year's meet by Kevin O'Brien. O'Brien, then a senior at Power Memorial, is now a freshman at Notre Dame.

Protopappas also broke 13 minutes last Saturday when his 12:57 clocking gave him second place to Eamon Downey in the Brooklyn sectional championships. This time Downey was the runner-up, about 55 yards back at the finish.

Protopappas was among the first six at the beginning of the grind. He followed Downey and Edward Walsh of Molloy into the hills and kept in third position until the straightaway a half-mile from the finish.

He then unleashed a kick that enabled him to pass both Downey and Walsh, who finished third in 13:09. It was the second triumph of the season for Protopappas. He won the Brooklyn borough championships earlier in the season in 13:19.

Power Trackmen City Champs!

Varsity and JV Victors

Demonstrating a substantial amount of endurance, determination, and speed, the J. V. and Varsity Track Teams of Power Memorial successfully ran off with the City Cross Country Championships for 1966, held on November 5.

The J.V., led by Peter Lovett (1st), scored 34 points, giving Power the undisputed win by a large margin. Cluttering up the line of the first ten finishers with Lovett were Joaquin Gonzales (2nd), Andy Walsh (3rd), and Richard Balbach (8th). Also, Oswald Vargas dropped in for 20th place to complete the victory.

As one can easily see, this was no win-by-a-hair, affair and the Varsity took their Championship in the same manner. Out of the 300-plus entries in that meet, Power again had four of its runners in the first ten finishers. This time the team scored 44 points, which is a true massacre when you consider that the second place team (Stepinac) piled up 230 points — a difference of 176 points! Right behind them, was Power's old arch-enemy Molloy, with 230 points. Needless to say, this victory was well savoured in many circles.

Individually, first place was taken by Bob Shanley of Sacred Heart. That school however, finished fifteenth. Right on his heels, though, was star Senior Garth McKay with a time of 12:52. Helping him out were Joseph Barbary, who took fifth (13:13); Richard Stewart,

8th (13:22); Cancey Marsh, 9th (13:23); and Gordon Jackson, who took 20th place.

It would be well to note that this was the same team who took the Varsity Cross-Country Track Championships last year, the Sophomore City Championships before that, and the Freshman City Championships before that.

Unfortunately, track has not received the attention that it should get here at Power. Very few students know who the track members are. This recent dual victory is a testament to the fact that members of the track teams have given their all since Freshman year. They have worked hard and the victories that they have won are a fitting reward. A more fitting reward, however, might be the personal congratulations of the students and faculty members.

These wins also reflect masterful coaching. Championship teams do not crop up in certain schools like plants; it's the handling they get that accounts for their success.

The Power Memorial student body can now enjoy the luxury of having two championship track teams, an honor that does not come often in the life of a school.

School Swiftie Only Human

At the moment Garth McKay was probably thinking more of his wounds than of his win.

So when a reporter asked the Powed Memorial two-miler if he knew he had almost set a meet record in that event in Saturday's CHSAA championships in the Garden he merely shrugged his shoulders.

McKay was sitting on a chair breathing heavily, the globules of sweat still forming on his chin before dripping off and wincing a little as the doctor applied merthiolate to the cuts on his left shoulder, elbow, middle finger and knee.

The bruises came from a spill McKay took on the sixth lap of the race. He was off the track about five seconds.

He got back on the track to win the race in 9:38.1—not very fast as two miles go—but just 4 and 1/10th seconds slower than the meet record.

Fastest-Time

Two weeks earlier, McKay had done a whole lot better winning the two mile in 9:29.1 to set a meet record in the CHSAA Sectionals, recording the third-fastest time by a CHSAA two-miler indoors.

"My foot got tangled with somebody else's," McKay said. "I think somebody pin spiked me when I was down."

One other unexpected thing happened at the 40th annual CHSAA Indoor Championships, won by Molloy for the seventh year in a row.

The "Super Mile" between Molloy's Ed Zieminski and St. Helena's John Brady didn't come off, as Molloy coach Frank Rienzo asked Zieminski to step down to the 880 and try to finish ahead of Chaminade's Stu Nunnery, a strategy designed to get team points.

The strategy didn't quite pay off as Zieminski finished behind Nunnery, who trailed Nazareth's Jim Sweizer, who set a New York State and meet record in winning the event with a 1:54.5. Nunnery's 1:54.6 was also under the record of 1:54.7 set by Ricardo Urbina of McClancy in 1963. Zieminski finished in 1:56.6.

Real Team Man

"Zieminski wanted to run the mile to try and break his brother's record 4:18.0," Rienzo said, "but when I asked him to do the 880 he gladly consented to help the team effort."

Ironically, by the time of the 880, Molloy already had 16 points and was well on its way to the team championship on the basis of a one-two finish in the 60-yard high hurdles by Mark Fuerst and John Palicka, a win in the six-lap relay by Ed Chapiro, Charles Treubig, Donald Volk and Richard Gumbs and a surprise fourth-place finish by Tom Tym, on Friday in the shot put.

Fuerst walked away with high individual honors (8½ points), setting a meet record in winning the hurdles in 7.5 and tying for first in the high jump at 6-3 with Marvin Lattimore (Hayes), James Monaster (McClancy) and Robert Galchus (Chaminade).

Brady won the mile easily in 4:21.1, getting no real competition from Richie Stewart of Power, who finished second in 4:22.5.

"It would have been better if he (Zieminski) was in it," Brady said after the race.

Chaminade, with 23 points, finished second to Molloy's 35. Power was third with 14½, and Loughlin and Nazareth were tied for fourth with 12 apiece.

SHANLEY CAPTURES C.H.S.A.A. TITLE RUN

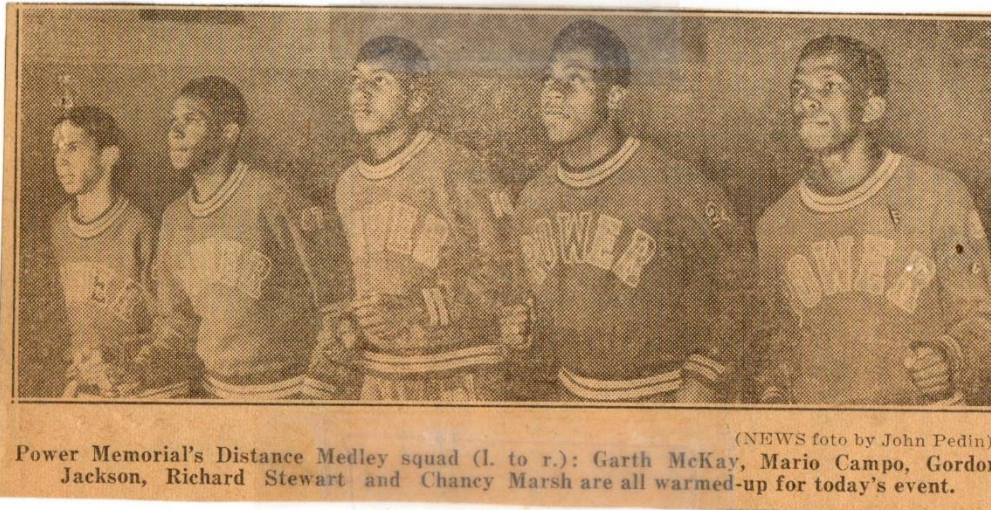

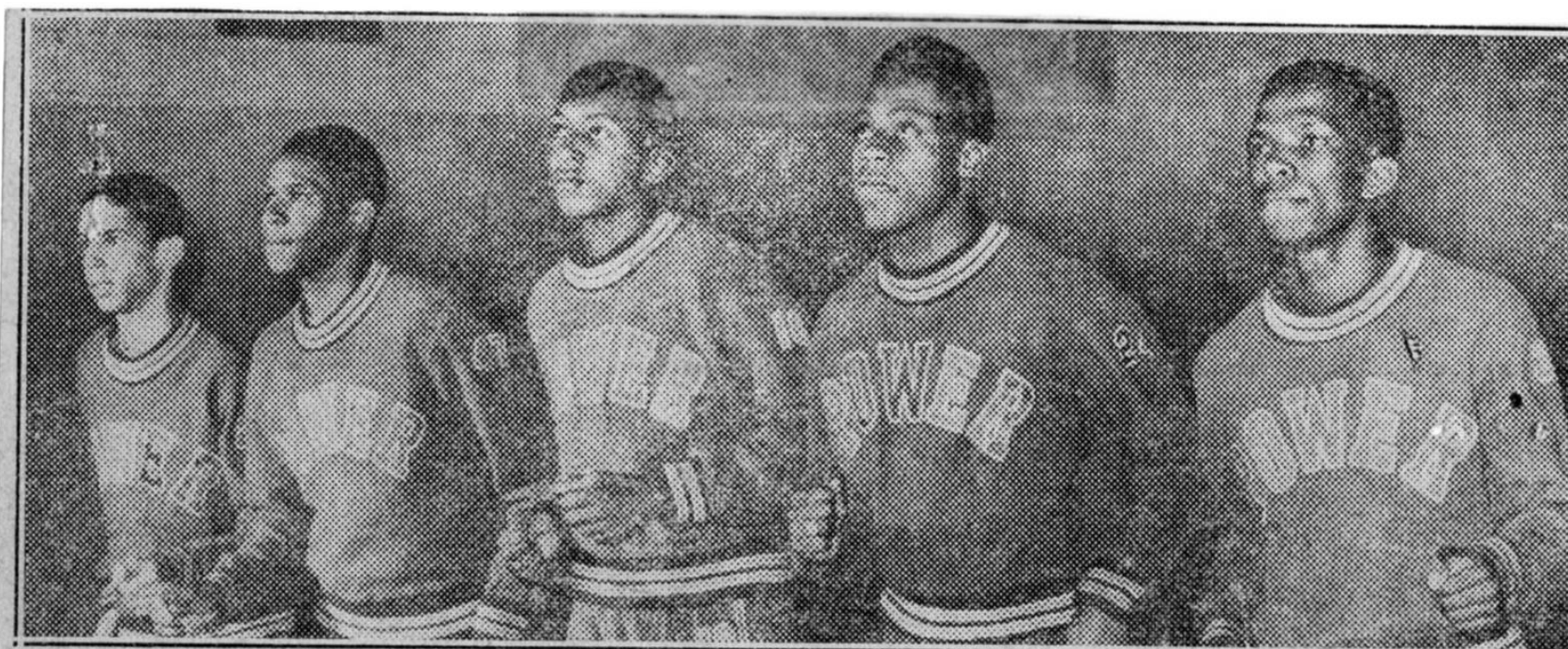

Power Squad Looks Power-ful

Over at Power Memorial High on Amsterdam Ave., coach John Mulligan has a powerful track squad and a big problem. Mulligan and his minions are pointing toward a champion effort at the coming New York Relays, but the big question is, "which event?"

Fortunately there is plenty of time for Mulligan to mull things over. The giant all-schoolboy track and field spectacle is still a few weeks off—April 28 and 29 at Randalls Island.

As it stands now, he has entered his big four—Garth McKay, Rich Stewart, Chancy Marsh and Mario Campo—in two of the championship events, the distance medley and two-mile relay. They'll run only in the one in which Mulligan thinks they'll have the best chance.

Right now he's leaning toward the distance medley and his racing lineup here is Campo on the 440 leg; Marsh, the 880; Stewart, the three-quarter mile, and McKay the mile. Backing them up in the event of pulled muscles, other injuries or illness are three fine juniors, Gordon Jackson, Joe Barbary and Rich O'Brien.

one of the top quarter-milers in the city with an indoor clocking of 51.8 which earned him second place in the CHSAA championships. Marsh is a consistent 880 man with an indoor mark of 1:58.3, which he figures to lower significantly with the shift to the outdoor track. Stewart, normally a miler, will drop down to the three-quarter

distance. He turned in a 4:22 indoor mile and has a 4:19 outdoor performance to his credit. At the Mayor's All City meet during the winter, he took second in the 600 with a tidy 1:15.5.

McKay ran mostly at two miles during the winter. He took the divisional CHSAA title in 9:29 despite a spill which lost almost half a lap.

POWER MEMORIAL had a pretty good day at the New York Relays last year, taking third in the shuttle hurdles and fourth in the distance medley. Campo, Marsh and Stewart ran on that foursome, too.

The school will be represented by one of the largest squads to enter the Relays. Mulligan is sending most of his young runners into the Class (non-championship) relays, where they hope to bag their share of medals.

Rich Bollbach, a senior, will head the Class mile foursome with five sophs—Pete McCann, Tom McGoldrick, Pete Woods, Tom McKenna and Willie Moss battling for the other three assignments.

HE HAS SEVEN juniors and sophs scrambling for berths in the Class two-mile run. Pete Lovett, Keith Heron and Joaquin Gonzalez represent the juniors, while Andy Walsh, Ken Rosal, John Lovett and Kevin Bulger are the soph flashes.

The expanded Relays schedule also gives McKay and Stewart a chance at individual honors. McKay has entered the two-mile and Stewart the mile, both invitation races which feature the relay's Friday schedule. There's an 880 invitation, too. The discus and triple jump are also scheduled for Friday, along with Class 880 relays.

On the Saturday schedule are the five remaining field events, starting at 10 A. M., the seven championship relays which get going about noon, and a full program of Class mile and two-mile events.

Double Victors At All Hallows

Seniors Larry Dinardo of St. Francis Prep and Bob Galchus of Chaminade figured in two victories a piece yesterday at the All Hallows games in Downing Stadium, Randalls Island.

Dinardo, a solidly-built all-PSAL footballer, won both weight events—the shotput with a heave of 4-8½, and the discus with 5a meet record toss of 160-5½. The latter mark erased the standard of 159-11, made last year by Mark Murro of Essex Catholic.

GALCHUS, AN injury-prone 18-year-old from New Hyde Park, won the long jump with a leap

of 21-8¾, and scaled 6-3 to tie for high jump honors with Jim Monaster of McClancy.

Chanlinade of Mineola, L.I., garnered the team trophy for the second year in a row, scoring 41½ points. Besides Galchus wins, the Flyers recorded victories in the 440-yard relay (45.7) and pole vault, Duke King clearing 11-6.

Although chilling temperatures prevented more meet records, there were several noteworthy performances. Included among them were a 10:41.7 distance medley by Power; a 3:29.5 mile relay by Delbarton, and a 19:08.5 four-mile relay by Brooklyn Prep.

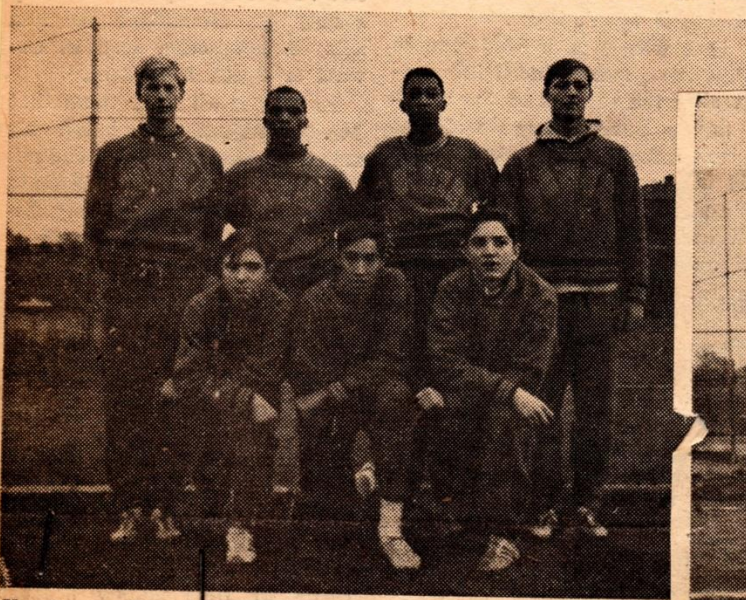

Molloy Runs Off With 8th CHSAA Crown

When it comes to winning championships, mark down the track team of Archbishop Molloy High School alongside the Yankees of old, the Green Bay Packers, and the Boston Celtics. Molloy ran off with its eighth straight Catholic High Schools' Athletic Association title yesterday in the meet's 41st running at the 102d Engineers Armory.

Scoring in all but two of the 12 senior division events, Frank Rienzo's charges rolled up 39 points despite a tough early challenge from Chaminade. Molloy, which makes its home in Jamaica, Queens, has been in existence only 11 years.

CHAMINADE ACTUALLY beat the Stanners in individual triumphs, three events to two. But Molloy had too much strength all down the line, sometimes placing more than one runner in an event and capturing two of the three relays. Chaminade's runnerup total was 16 points.

In one event, the high jump, Chaminade and Molloy split the victory. Vic Nikirk of the Stanners and James Reilly of the Flyers each soared 6 feet, 3 inches.

Other Molloy winners were Richard Gumbs, who copped the 280-yard run in :30.4, and the mile relay team of Steve Gangone, John Deavry, Frank Gallagher, and Gil Peters, which won in the meet record time of 3:28.4.

CHAMINADE'S MIKE Mannion and Pat Keane swept the dash and hurdles between them, Mannion winning the 50-yard sprint in 5.7 seconds, and Keane skimming the 60-yard highs in 7.6.

Despite the heroics of the top two teams, Stepinac produced the meet's outstanding performer in Jim Schindler, a wiry little senior, who bettered the CHSAA standard for two miles by nearly 18 seconds. Running the last mile in 4:27, Schindler beat a tough field that also included Denis Fikes of Rice, the city's cross-country champ, in 9:16.5. The time was the second fastest ever run by a New York State schoolboy on a flat floor, behind the 9:15.3 Walter Walls.

THE MEET RECORD of 9:34 that fell belonged to Joe Lynch, who ran for LaSalle in 1961 before going on to a distinguished collegiate career at Georgetown.

John Brady, who won the CHSAA mile title as a junior at St. Helena's last year, found that running half the distance could be just as much fun yesterday, racing to a one-yard triumph over John Lovett of Power Memorial in the 880. Brady's time was 1:57.0, one-tenth better than Lovett.

The CHSAA indoor title meet returned to the Armory in upper Manhattan for the first time in four years with yesterday's running. It has been conducted at the old Madison Square Garden the past three years.

With the best clockings so far this season for both the two-mile and distance-medley events, Power Memorial High from over on W. 61st St. has already raced to a "top team" rating for the coming New York Relays. The little school from the big city won the distance-medley title a year ago and they're out to make it two straight at the huge Randalls Island meet, April 26 and 27.

The Power speedboys, Chancy Marsh, Joe Barbary, Pete Lovett and his brother John, didn't even lose stride during a recent coaching change. The veteran mentor, John Mulligan, favoring his health, stepped to the sidelines and handed his stop watch and duties to Brother J. G. Bielen.

Of the four steppers, Marsh is the only holdover from the '67 foursome that won the '67 distance medley title in 10:22.5, an even second off Molloy High's meet record.

MARSH RAN the half-mile leg a year ago. This year he moves up to the three-quarter-mile stint.

Lining up with him are John Lovett for the 440, brother Pete, the half-mile, and Joe Barbary, the mile. This was the lineup for the distance medley at the recent Brandeis Games, when the foursome turned in a winning time of 10:24.6, an early-season effort that has not yet been topped and that is a live threat to Molloy's meet record.

Marsh also ran the anchor when the same four took the two-mile relay at the All Hallows Games last week and clinched the win with a 1:58.3 anchor effort. The team clocking was 7:59.6, another excellent early-season outing that has not yet been beaten.

BROTHER BIELEN has entered his star striders in both the two-mile and distance-medley events at the New York Relays and reserves the right to send

Mater Christi Sets 2-Mile Relay Mark; 2 for Samara

On a dazzling anchor leg by junior Marcel Phillippe, Mater Christi High of Long Island City led the charge on the record book at Randalls Island yesterday as the all-schoolboy New York Relays sprinted to a spectacular windup under cloudy and menacing skies. Marcel and mates, whose 7:51.3 splintered the previous standard for the two-mile, shared the plaudits with spring-limbed Fred Samara of Fort Hamilton, who set two meet records with an unprecedented double in the pole vault and broad jump.

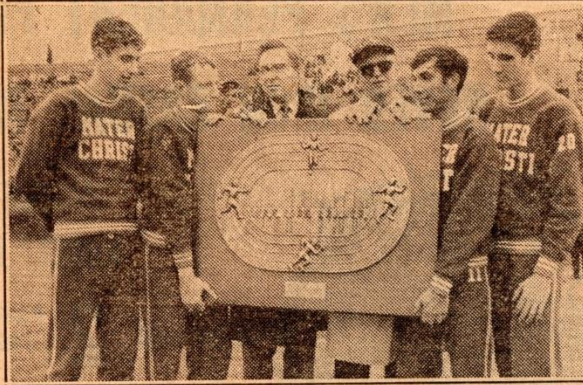
Through an early-morning rain and a continuing threat of more to come kept the crowd down to an enthusiastic corporals guard, it didn't dampen the spirits of the more than 3,000 schoolboy stars who competed. Nor were the Mater Christi triumph and the Samara heroics the only standout performances for the day.

HAVE PERRIN of Edison Tech, N. J., also set a meet record with a 6'7" leap in the high jump. The former record, 6' 4½", was set by Randy Smith of Bellport, L.I., last year. Bob Gray of Essex Catholic in Newark won the shot put with a heave of 59'3" and Steve Narrington of South Freehold, N. J., won the javelin with a throw of 186' 11½".

Joining Mater Christi in the ranks of relay winners were Molloy, 440; Jamaica, 880; Fordham Prep, mile; Rice, distance medley; and Massapequa, on a steaming half-mile anchor leg by Brian McElroy, the sprint medley.

Samara, a junior, overcame a double setback in registering his double win. Practicing at Randalls Island Friday, he broke his favorite pole. He bought a new one yesterday morning. Then, on a warmup just before the broad jump started, he wrenched his knee and for about five minutes thought he'd have to scratch from both events.

IN THE JUMP, he defeated

the defending champ, Ron Carter, N. Y. School of Printing, in dramatic fashion. On his last jump, Carter, who set the meet record last year with 23'6½", jumped 23'10½" to take the lead. Samara had only one try left. He poised in the runway, sprinted down to the jumpoff, soared high and away to plant his heels in the sand at a winning 23'10¾".

Samara was equally pressed in the vault. Only he and Andre Shy of Southside, Rockville Center, were left when the bar was raised to 13'3". Samara made it on his first try. Shy missed his first and brushed the bar on the second, but made it. The bar went to 13'6". Again Samara

made it the first time. Again Shy made it on his second, his body shaking the bar once more as he went over.

Up the pole went to 13'9". This time, on his first vault, Samara brushed the bar. It quivered and shook but stayed up. Shy made three gallant tries at the same height but failed. Samara then had it raised to 14 feet, but the long day, the new pole, the bruised knee and the extra height were too much. The bar fell each time.

The two-mile was a tremendous race. Though 12 teams started, it came down to a three-way battle on the final half-mile leg. Power Memorial led most of the way with the Lovett brothers, Pete and John, and Joe Barbary all breaking 2:00 comfortably. Jamaica, Brentwood and Mater Christi were all in it. Going into the final lap, Terry Walton of Jamaica took the lead but Chancy Marsh of Power took it back. Then came Phillippe, moving up to third on the first turn and taking second on the backstretch.

THEN IT WAS a stride for stride duel between him and Marsh, around the last turn. Phillippe won the duel, took the lead going into the straightaway and won by seven yards. He was caught in a blistering 1:53.2 for his half. Power finished second but was disqualified when Marsh threw his baton away before crossing the finish line. Power nevertheless was timed in 7:52.8, also under the previous record (7:53.1 by Mount Vernon). Jamaica, which moved up to second, did 7:54.1.

They started even as they picked up the baton for the half-mile leg. They matched strides for the first lap and ran shoulder to shoulder as they rounded the first turn of the final lap. In the backstretch, McElroy moved out

in front by a stride, with Larrimore at his heels and Rivera seven yards back.

Coach Larry Ellis' crackerjack sprint foursome won the 880 championship handily though not in the blazing time Ellis had hoped. He shifted his usual anchor man, Walton, to the two-mile, in hopes of winning two championships—and almost made it. Ted Ford, Ellis' sub anchor man on the 880, ran a fine race, fighting off Brentwood's Tony Urso in the last 50 yards to win comfortably with a team timing of 1:31.1. Brentwood was caught in 1:31.5 for second.

BRIAN McELROY, Massapequa junior, almost matched Phillippe's brilliance as he anchored his team to the sprint-medley championship. This came down to a half-mile match race between McElroy, Julius Larrimore, national indoor champ from John Adams High, and Hector Rivera, the speedboy from Newtown High.

Rounding the last turn, McElroy edged away from Larrimore but going into the straightaway, Rivera came on. He made his challenge but McElroy answered it. He held his lead to win by six yards with Rivera and Newtown second and Larrimore and Adams, the defending champs, third.

MASSAPEQUA'S TIME was 3:33.0. McElroy was clocked in 1:55.7, Rivera, 1:56.7 and Larrimore 1:59.0, far off his usual figure.

It was no surprise that coach Ron Gundry's threesome from Sayreville, N.J., skimmed to the 360 shuttle hurdles championship. Sayreville is undefeated and holder of the unofficial national record for 480 yards. Gerry Carney, the leadoff man, won the 330 invitation individual championship on the Friday schedule at Randalls Island.

In both his heat and his sec-

tion of the finals, Carney stepped out to a lead his runningmates, Bill Rathbun and Paul Szawaryn, held. Perth Amboy, which had won the title in '66 and '67, came a cropper when its leadoff man hit a hurdle and fell in the heats. Sayreville's 0:45 just missed Perth Amboy's meet record 44.8.

IT WAS NO SURPRISE, either, that Dennis Fikes, sensational Rice High soph, anchored his school to the distance-medley championship in 10:28.0, less than 0:07 from the meet record.

Fox Lane, New Dorp and Sewanaka were alternating leaders on the first three legs. Fikes was 30 yards behind in fifth place when he picked up the baton. First, he passed Marty Walsh of New Dorp. Next, he moved up on Herb Camien of Sewanaka. Then, with a lap to go, he showed his heels to Jim Ingegnieri of Fox Lane. Ingegnieri stayed with him and challenged, but the 16-year-old soph held his lead and breezed in. Fikes was clocked in 4:18.6 for his mile leg; Ingegnieri in 4:21; Camien in 4:26.6.

FIKES TRIUMPHS IN C.H.S.A.A. RUN

Rice Ace Timed in 12:40
in Cross-Country Event

The consistency that has marked the scholastic cross-country campaign continued at Van Cortlandt Park yesterday.

Denis Fikes of Rice High posted his sixth victory in seven outings this season by capturing the New York section of the Catholic High School Athletic Association meet with a 12-minute-40-second clocking, a personal best. 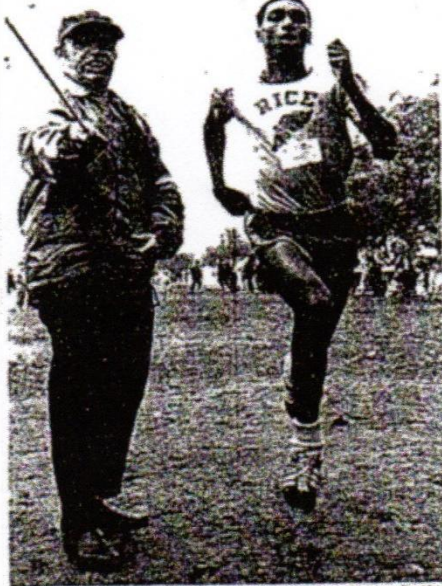

McElroy Eclipses 600 Record; Boys Keeps Hayes Team Title

Brian McElroy of Massapequa (L. I.) High, who thinks variety is the spice of life in track competition, found success yesterday in the 600-yard run at the 20th annual Cardinal Hayes Games.

The 19-year-old senior led from start to finish, an unusual pattern for him, and posted a national flat-floor record of 1 minute 12.6 seconds at the 102d Engineers Army. The former mark was set by Jim Sweizer of Nazareth two years ago. McElroy also erased the meet standard of 1:13.4.

Boys High captured its second straight team title with 19½ points. St. Joseph's Regional of Montvale, N. J., was runner-up with 15½. Doug Terry's Kangaroo squad had three individual victories, by Trevor Matthews (the 440 in 50.9 seconds) and the 880 relay (1:32.6) and the mile relay (3:29).

"I just don't like to run the same distance in successive meets," McElroy said following his victory. To prove that he practices what he preaches, the good-looking athlete announced he would run the mile next week in the N.Y.U. schoolboy fixture.

The Massapequa star, who ran the fastest 880 for a junior in the country last outdoor season (1:51.1), began this indoor campaign by running the two miles in the Loughlin meet ("I finished fifth but was satisfied because I had been sick.") Two weeks ago he won the St. Francis 1,000 easily in a snappy 2:14.9 "I sure would like to run against Joe Savage of Roselle Catholic at this distance."

Friday afternoon McElroy registered the fastest 440 split (49.7 seconds) in a series of high school mile relay events at the Federation Meet in Madison Square Garden.

"I thought I might be a little tired from that effort today," he said, "but I really felt great and even had something left at the end."

He broke out on top in the 600, but was disappointed that no one went past him early. No one dared to at the pace the Long Islander set. He hit the first 220 in 27 seconds and past the 440 mark in 53.2 seconds.

He was still moving away from the field at the finish and won by 12 yards over Hector Rivera of Newtown.

One other meet mark was eclipsed. Power Memorial's two-mile foursome of Ray Naudain (2:03.6), Peter Lovett (1:58.8), Tony Colon (2:00.4) and John Lovett (1:56.1) won in 7:58.9, almost six seconds under the previous record.

Savage made a strong effort to overhaul Lovett on the anchor leg. The 16-year-old Roselle Catholic junior made up all but 7 yards of a 25-yard deficit, but it was not enough and he had to settle for a blazing 1:53.5 stint on the slow, flat floor.

Marcel Philippe, Mater Christi ace, won his fifth straight race of the season, but in a lackluster effort. He took the two-mile run easily in 9:36, his best clocking, but didn't extend himself. "The two-mile is a bore," he said later. "There are times during the race that you feel like dropping out."

M'ELROY IS FIRST IN SCHOOL MILE

Massapequa Star Sets Meet Mark With 4:17 Clocking

Brian McElroy of Massapequa (L. I.) High switched to the mile yesterday in the 20th annual New York University schoolboy track games so that he might face Marcel Philippe of Mater Christi.

Philippe was entered in the 1,000-yard run by his coach in the hopes that he might duel McElroy.

As a result, the two didn't meet but it had little effect on the way they ran. McElroy set a met record in the mile with the fastest clocking of the season, 4 minutes 17 seconds, and Philippe won the 1,000 in the meet record time of 2 minutes 16.1 seconds at the 102d Engineers Armory.

Unfortunately, the two stars of the indoor season will not face each other in the only other meet of the season. This is in the Eastern Championships on February 28. McElroy is entered in the 1,000 and Philippe in the mile—the opposite of their entries yesterday.

Boys High won its third straight team title of the season with 24 points. The Kangaroos had individual victors in Dewey Hickman in the 60-yard hurdles, the mile relay and the 880-yard relay. It marked the fourth year in a row Boys has won the N.Y.U. trophy. St. Peter's of Staten Island was runner-up with 13.

McElroy's victory was his third straight. Last week in the Hayes Games he set a national flat floor mark of 1:12.6 for the 600. Two weeks before that he won the 1,000 in 2:14.9 at the St. Francis Meet. He finished fifth in his first meet, the Loughlin Games back in December, after being sick for several weeks.

Philippe continued unbeaten as he registered his seventh victory. It was his first attempt at the 1,000 this season (following four mile and two two-mile outings) and he seemed unsure of himself at the shorter distance. He stayed back off a slow pace (60.7 second 440 and 1:59.8 half) and made his move 1½ laps from the finish to win going away.

"I was dying out there," Philippe said by the way of apologizing for a meet record time, "when I heard how slow the pace was. I didn't want to

Actually, Philippe might have had an excuse (which he didn't use) for his legs being heavy. Wednesday, the 17-year-old senior had run his fastest mile of the season, 4:19.2, at the Catholic sectionals. Yesterday's time gave him five meet records in his seven victories.

McElroy, a 19-year-old senior, erased the oldest record on the N.Y.U. books, a 4:20.1 by John Kopil of Bayonne, (N.J.) High in 1953.

Molloy Wins in Catholic Track; Philippe, Bozzone Extend Streak

Three winning streaks were maintained yesterday in the Catholic High Schools Athletic Association indoor track championships at the 102d Engineers Armory.

Archbishop Molloy of Queens captured its ninth straight team title with 27½ points. Frank Rienzo's Stanners had two first places. Jim Ruger, a junior, won the 50-yard dash in 5.7 seconds and Gil Peters took the 280-yard dash in 30.5.

Marcel Philippe's victories reached eight in a row when he won the mile in 4 minutes 18 seconds. It was his fastest individual mile of the season and tied the meet record set by Bob Zieminski in 1964.

The third streak kept intact was that belonging to Brian Bozzone of Nazareth. The 16-year-old junior finished first for

the eighth time (including two ties) with a leap of 6 feet 6 inches. He has cleared this height four times, but no higher.

Two meet records were set. Ed Traks of St. Peter's won the 60-yard high hurdles in 7.4 seconds and the Power Memorial two-mile foursome of Kevin Bulger (2:05.7), Ray Naudain (2:00.6), Andy Walsh (1:58.8) and Tony Colon (1:57.8) finished first in 8:02.3.

John Lovett of Power continued his impressive half-mile clockings. He won the 880 in 1:55.1, six-tenths slower than the meet mark. He has done better than 1:56 in his last four outings, including a 1:53.2 relay leg.

Molloy also captured the junior-midget championship. The Queens school tallied 44½ points to take the trophy for the eighth consecutive year.

Philippe Runs Mile in 4:18.0

Marcel Philippe of Mater Christi made pawns of formidable foes yesterday to capture the mile in the CHSAA indoor track championships at the 102d Engineers Armory in Washington Heights. He clocked 4:18.0 to equal the meet record and post his eighth win of the season.

PHILIPPE BEATEN IN ONE-MILE RUN

Finishes Fourth as Walton
Wins in Eastern Meet

Marcel Philippe, the winner of eight straight races this winter, finally met defeat last night. Three out-of-state runners finished ahead of the Mater Christi senior in an exciting one-mile run at the Eastern States indoor schoolboy championships in the 102d Engineers Armory.

Holly Walton, a 17-year-old junior from Hope High School in Providence, R. I., unleashed a brilliant sprint on the last lap that took him from fifth place to victory. He made up 30 yards and beat Joe Savage of Roselle (N. J.) Catholic, by an eyelash. Each runner was clocked in 4 minutes 19.2 seconds.

James Quirk of Boston College high was two yards off the leaders in 4:19.8 with Philippe another five yards back in 4:20.7. Walton unofficially was clocked in 2:03 for the last half mile after running a slow 2:16 for the first 880 in which he trailed in seventh place.

Three meet records were set, two by athletes from St. Joseph's Regional of Montvale, N. J., which upset Boys High for the team title.

Philippe's defeat could be traced to a tactical error on his part. After holding the early lead, he let Savage and Quirk run away from him after the half mile. At one point, Philippe trailed by more than 20 yards.

Philippe started to kick with a 150 yards to go but as he made his move, Walton shot around him and sprinted the rest of the way in a display of speed that left the crowd gasping. The Rhode Island youngster caught Savage at the tape.

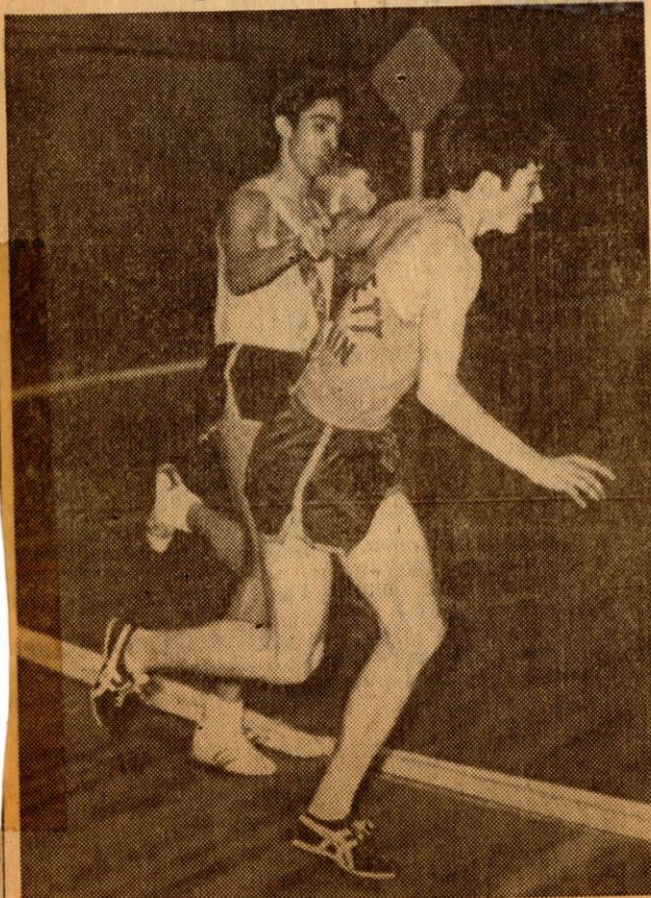

PHILIPPE SECOND, 30 YARDS BEHIND

Boys Trackmen Take Team Title—Fikes, Hickman Break Meet Records

By WILLIAM J. MILLER

"I bombed out. I'm beat mentally and physically." This was the way Marcel Philippe explained his second straight defeat and his poorest performance of the indoor season in the mile run yesterday.

The Mater Christi senior, winner of eight straight races before his fourth-place finish last week in the Eastern States championships, looked woeful as he was beaten by 30 yards by Dan Carroll of St. Peter's, Staten Island, in 4 minutes 21.1 seconds at the 13th annual meet at the 102d Engineers Armory.

Philippe led for the first 440 in the slow time of 1:05.5, let Carroll pass him easily at that point, fell back to next-to-last in the 12-man field at the three-quarter mile mark and then put on a weak kick in the last lap to get second.

Slow Time Posted

His time of 4:27.7 was his slowest since the 4:29 he posted outdoors last season at a meet in Schenectady. It was right after that performance Philippe quit the Mater Christi team and didn't return for the rest of the outdoor campaign. His excuse for leaving the team then was similar to his current excuse.

Boys High captured its fifth team title of the season with 28 points. St. Peter's was a surprise second with 13. Although the meet was sponsored by the Mayor's office, no one from the official family showed up as in previous years. Howard, Arnold Schwartz, head of the Brookdale Foundation, which put up the money for the meet, was on hand.

Carroll, who was not going to run because of a bad cold, didn't like the early slow pace. "I knew I had to step it up if I were to beat Marcel," the St. Peter's senior said. "The half time of 2:14.3 was too slow." The slim (130 pounds, 5-foot 7-inch) Staten Islander broke the race open with a 63.2 third quarter (he had 50-yards on Philippe by then) and followed with a 63.6 final 440 for a 2:06.8 last half.

Second Victory of Year

Carroll's victory was his second this year. He won the New York sectional mile in 4:19.2, his fastest of the season, but lost to Brian McElroy of Massapequa in the New York University mile and was third to Philippe in the Catholic

schools meet. He also has a 1:53.5 relay leg half mile to his credit. He is headed for Notre Dame.

Dennis Fikes of Rice, who has been out most of the season due to illness, made his first start since the Loughlin games last December and looked impressive. He won the two-mile run in 9:25.8, a meet record. The 17-year old junior took the lead at the mile and won by 50 yards.

Another meet record went to Dewey Hickman of Boys in the 60-yard high hurdles. Running with a slight pull in his right leg, the Boys's senior was timed in 7.4 seconds as he barely edged Ed Traks of St. Peter's.

Trevor Matthews of Boys, missed the Easterns, took the 440-yard run in 50.8 seconds. Jerry Monroe of Taft, his arch-rival this season, scratched from the event to run on the mile relay.

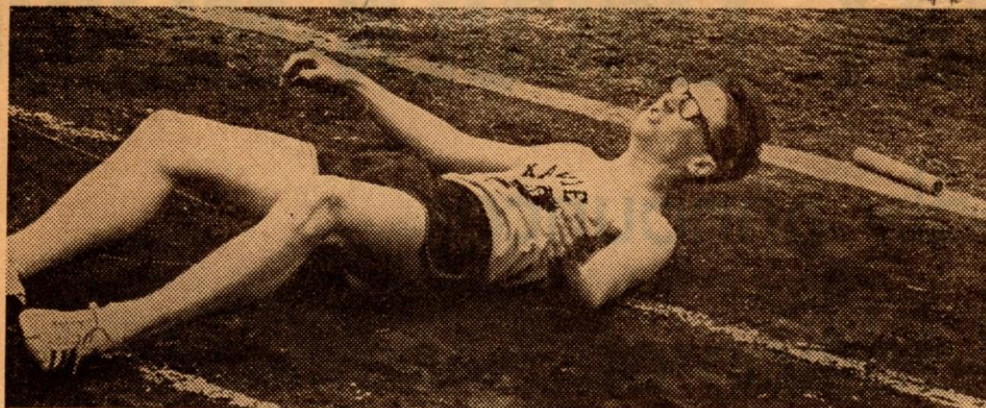

Boys Takes 880

Steve Adams, a 16-year-old junior from St. Joseph's, Montvale, N. J., turned in the only meet record performance yesterday as the 15th annual Queens-Iona relay carnival opened a two-day stand at Randalls Island with an all-scholastic program.

Adams, a 6-foot-6-inch, 260-pounder and "still growing," put the 12-pound shot 63 feet 5 inches to surpass the mark of 60-7 1/2 set by Richard Conte of Cardinal Spellman in 1967.

Today, starting at 11 A.M., the colleges will swing into action with Villanova the favorite to succeed Army as the team winner. Army will not be on hand because of dual meet commitment with Harvard. Thirty colleges will compete.

In addition to the shot-put, five other schoolboy championship events were contested yesterday. Three more will be held today.

Power Memorial, on the strength of a solid 1:54.8 anchor leg by John Lovett, defeated Archbishop Molloy in the two-mile relay by five yards in 7:55.1 over a slow track that got slower as the rain started to fall midway through the program.

Andy Walsh (2:03.3), Tony Colon (1:57.3) and Pete Lovett, John's brother, who ran 1:59.7, ran the first three legs.

Boys High got off to a slow start but picked up momentum on the second leg to run away with the 880-yard relay title. The Kangaroos won by five yards from Molloy in the good time of 1:28.9. The winning quartet consisted of Larry Hinds (0:23), Gary Gordon (0:21.6), Trevor Matthews (0:22) and Larry Brown (0:22.3).

Brian Bozzone of Nazareth High School picked up where he left off at the end of the indoor season with a victory in the high jump. The 5-foot 9-inch Brooklyn junior leaped 6 feet 6 inches. He lost only once in eight indoor meets but still cannot get higher than 6-6, which he accomplished consistently last winter.

In the other two championship field events, Fred Samara of Fort Hamilton was a double winner—of sorts. He easily captured the long jump with a leap of 24 feet 2 1/2 inches but ended in a five-way tie for first place at 12 feet in the pole vault when rain forced the officials to halt the event. The five competitors were awarded identical first-place prizes. Last year, Samara captured both events.

Power Runners Eyeing Triple

With one leg already clinched and a second at stake at the Penn Relays this weekend, Power Memorial may well be within reach of a schoolboy triple crown when the New York Relays move into Randalls Island. The big New York meet comes up Friday and Saturday of next week.

The triple crown is something new in schoolboy circles. It involves winning the same event in

the Queens-Iona games, the Penn Relays and the New York Relays. Power won the two-mile at Queens-Iona last week, competes in the same event this week and can make it three in a row at Randalls Island.

The prize foursome includes either Andy Walsh or soph Art Naudain on the first leg, Tony Colon on the second and the Lovett brothers, Pete and John, finishing up. Walsh ran the opening stint at Queens-Iona and, according to Brother Beilen, Power coach, will get the assignment in Philadelphia. However, he leaves

In the Queens-Iona meet, Power's time was a meet record 7:55.1 on a soft track. Molloy followed at 7:55.3, then Jamaica. This is not likely to be good enough at the New York Relays since, as the season advances, the opposition gets tougher. Molloy and Jamaica both have entered the two-mile again at Randalls Island, along with Xaverian, Wantagh, Spellman, Mount Vernon, Freeport and, most important, Roselle Catholic.

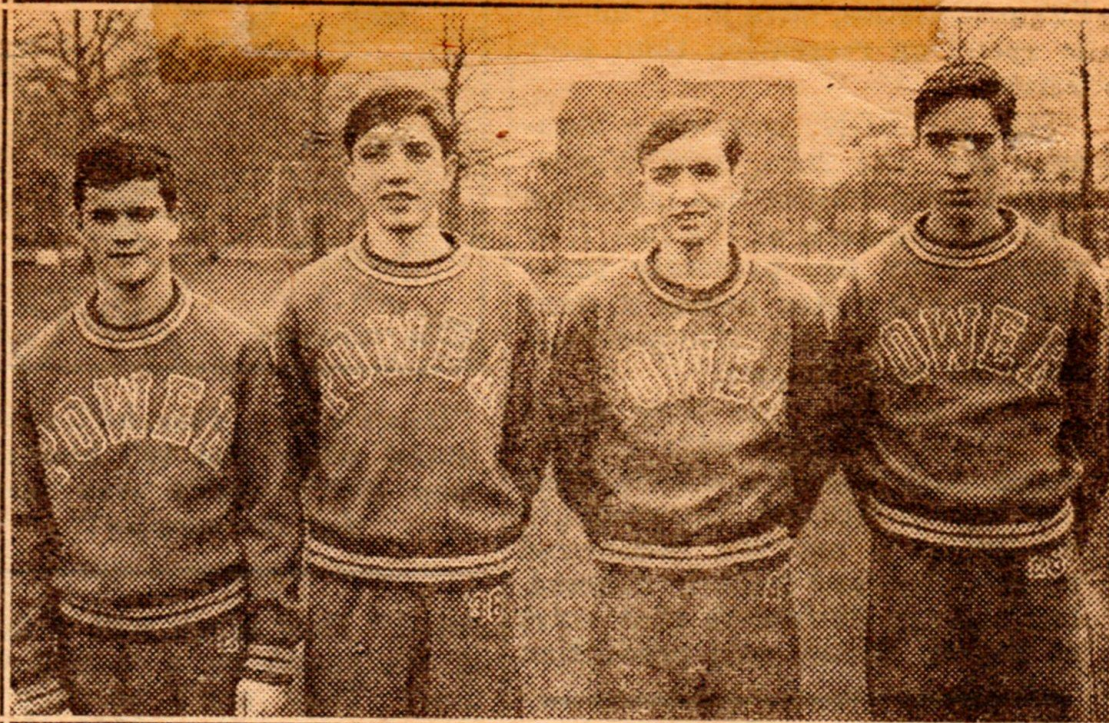

Boys Team Timed in 0:41.6

—Power 2-Mile Victor—

Abington Wins Mile

PHILADELPHIA, April 26 — New York City schoolboys just missed scoring a sweep of the championship events today at the Penn Relays.

Boys High of Brooklyn won the 440-yard race and Power Memorial took the two-mile event with meet record performances, to give New York two more titles. Rice High School captured the distance medley crown yesterday.

But Abington High of Philadelphia checked the New York attempt at a sweep by the margin of a chest in the mile relay. A brilliant anchor leg by Bill Neely, a junior, in which he made up 15 yards, gave Abington the victory in 3 minutes 16.6 seconds. Neely, who was clocked 47.1 seconds, matched stride for stride with Gary Gordon of Boys in the final 110 yards in the most thrilling finish of the day.

Boys' meet record in the quarter-mile relay of 41.6 seconds was the result of almost flawless stick passing, a requisite for winning in this event. The Brooklyn foursome of Larry Hinds, Gary Gordon, Trevor Matthews and Larry Brown beat Excelsior of Jamaica, which held the record at 41.7 seconds, by five feet.

Boys High Won in 1968

For Boys, and for Hinds and Matthews, this was a repeat performance in the winner's circle. Last year the two seniors were on the Kangaroo quartet that won here in 42.2 seconds. Matthews also ran on the mile team today and turned in a 47.5-second third leg.

Power's time of 7:40.7 in the two-mile race was almost four seconds under the previous record. John Lovett, on the anchor leg, was the strong man for the Manhattan foursome with a 1:52.4. For this effort and a 3:10.4 clocking in the 3/4-mile stint on the distance medley yesterday, the 17-year-old Lovett, a senior, was named the most valuable schoolboy athlete in the meet.

Other members on the Power team were Andy Walsh (1:59.5), Tony Colon (1:54.1) and John's brother, Pete Lovett, (1:54.7). Colon, a junior, gave Power the lead it never relinquished as Penn State College High was second, 25 yards behind.

Roselle Catholic, which was expected to be Power's closest competitor, got a tough break when its second man, Bill Carroll dropped the baton. Carroll was in second place at the time and was last by the time he recovered. As a result, Joe Savage, Roselle's outstanding half-miler was never in the race but still ran the fastest 880 in 1:51.7 on the anchor.

The New York area shared in another record when Zach Gilson of Peekskill High won the triple jump with a 49-feet-10 1/2-inch effort. The 19-year-old senior had erased the meet mark of 49-5 by Bob Beamon on an earlier jump at 49-6 1/2 and then he improved on it.

Mile, 2-Mile Marks Fall in

Record-shattering performances by Brian McElroy of Massapequa and Tom Shiland of Cambridge Central, 45 miles north of Albany, gave the two-day New York Relays a spectacular start at Randalls Island yesterday. Under sunny skies with little wind, McElroy bettered the meet mark for the invitational mile by more than five seconds—and almost lost—while the slender 6-3 Shiland, the state champ, shaved more than 12 seconds off the standard in the invitational two-mile.

Pat Keane, the CHSAA champ from Chaminade, won the 330 hurdles and John Lovett the 880.

The fourth annual all-schoolboy track and field carnival, sponsored by THE NEWS and the Spiked-Shoe Club of Fordham Prep concludes with a day-long program, climaxed by seven championship

relays at about 4:00 p.m. The javelin at 9:30 A.M. opens the action. The pole vault starts at 10:30 and freshman and class relays will be contested up to the championship time.

The McElroy race was a thriller. He and Paul Broderick of Seawanhaka were caught in the same time—4:17.2—Broderick making up 30 yards in a blazing finish. McElroy, hoping to beat his own best time (4:12.1) set a week ago at the Penn Relays, opened with a blistering 0:57 first quarter that almost drained his stamina

Both share the new record. The old one, 4:22.3, was set in 1966 by John Brady of St. Helenas, and now of Notre Dame. Next year, Broderick will run for Texas Christian. McElroy has his pick—Tennessee, Kansas, Texas U., or Texas at El Paso.

SHILAND, who is headed for Dartmouth, ran a 9:24.8 two-mile to crack the 9:37 mark set by Ken Long of Plainedge last year.

Mike Keough, the Essex Catholic junior, stayed with Shiland until the backstretch where he challenged and almost passed Shiland. But Tom lengthened his stride and forged ahead to win by 12 yards.

Marty Walsh of New Dorp was third with 9:31.5 and Tom Flem-

ing, Bloomfield, N.J., fourth with 9:36.7.

JOHN LOVETT won as expected in the 880, his 1:54.4 missing a meet record by two-tenths of a second. He and his brother Pete, a year older, will run on Power Memorial's crack two-mile relay foursome today. "I didn't want to use up everything today," John said. "We can have a tough race tomorrow."

Lovett, who'll go to Manhat-

tan, led all the way. Terry Walton and Warren Lyons, both of Jamaica, and Leon Busiello of Xaverian were within range; they headed into the last lap Walton challenged, drew shoulder to shoulder on that backstretch and then dropped back. Busiello challenged and dropped back around the last turn. Hector F. Vera, Newtown, staged a great closing sprint. He managed to take second from Walton but Lovett hit the tape with a yard lead. The tiring Lyons finished sixth.

Two Jerseyites were favorites in the 330-hurdles, John Bykowski of St. Joseph's Regional, the state champ, and Joe Abitante of Roselle Catholic. After six eight hurdles, Bykowski was front with Abitante at his heels. Approaching the seventh hurdle however, Bykowski lost his stride and almost stumbled. Abitante hit the hurdle and spilled. Chaminade's Keane, neatly cleared the remaining barriers and outspined Bykowski to the tape. They were both caught in 39.9.

Samara Tops Long Jump, Pole Vault Marks at Relays

Smashing his meet records in both the pole vault and the long jump, Fred Samara, Fort Hamilton High senior, registered his second double at the New York Relays at Randalls Island yesterday as Boys High and Power Memorial raced to triple relay crowns. Meet standards were blasted in five of the eleven championship events and equaled in another as schoolboy athletes from five states concluded the two-day track and field carnival.

Sponsored by THE NEWS and the Spiked Shoe Club of Fordham Prep, the meet listed 2,851 actual competitors who represented 208 schools. It opened on Friday with four invitation individual championships and two field events with athletes coming from as distant as Watertown, Mass., and Henderson, Pa.

SAMARA WAS the field event standout. He scored his first double last year with meet records in his two specialties and broke both marks in winning them again. In the pole, after almost missing at 12'6", he cleared 14' 3/4" on his second try at the winning height. Connie Watson of Watertown High, who beat Samara with a 14' effort at the Penn Relays, and Chris St. Lawrence, Andover Academy, who has done 14'2", each missed their three tries at Samara's height.

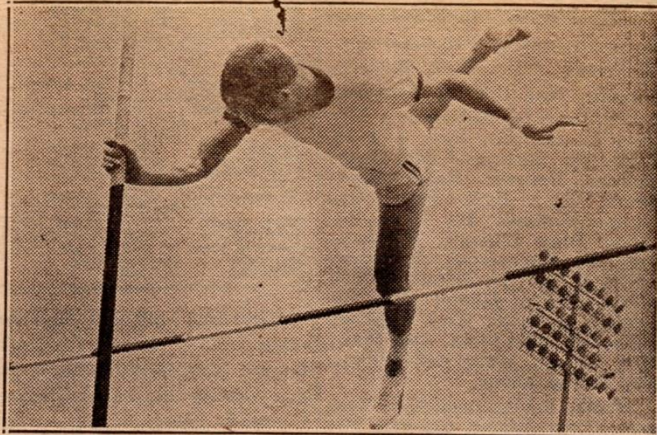
As soon as his vault victory was official, Samara raced across the field to the jumping pit. On his second jump he zoomed from the takeoff board, soared through the air and planted his heels in the sand for the winning effort. It measured 24'3", four inches better than his former mark.

In the triple crown department, Boys in the 440 and Power in the two-mile added the New York Relays diadem to the crowns they had previously won in the Queens-Iona and Penn Relays. Boys High's blistering foursome equalled the meet record, 47.2, which another Boys foursome had set in '66. Power, on a 1:53.5 anchor by John Lovett, splintered the old record with a 7:44.3 clocking. The old mark, set by Mount Vernon in '67, was 7:51.3.

OTHER STANDARDS were topped by Boys High in the 880 championship and by Massapequa, anchored by Brian McElroy, in the sprint medley. Only the marks for the shuttle hurdles, won by Molloy in 45.1; the mile, defended successfully by Fordham Prep in 3:20.3; and the distance medley, won by Roselle Catholic in 10:25.33, remained untouched.

Boys High's victory in the 880 was one of the most spectacular of the day. They dropped the baton and finished third in their heat, but despite the drop they had the sixth fastest time and qualified for the finals where it was no contest. With Trevor Matthews contributing a 20.8 leg, they breezed in 1:26.8, two full seconds under the old mark set by Mount Vernon in '67.

McElroy, who set a meet record in taking the invitational mile on Friday, turned in the fastest half-mile leg—1:52.5—of the day in churning Massapequa to the sprint medley title for the second

straight year. Bishop DuBois, Boys High and Christ the King were all close until McElroy opened up on the final lap. The lean senior gradually pulled away, opened up wide in the stretch run and won by 12 yards. The time was 3:28.8. The old record was 3:30.5 by Boys High in '66.

COACH FRANK RIENZO'S Molloy squad, always around when championships are at stake, added to their honors in the 360 shuttle hurdles. Rich and Bill Bihrl with CHSAA champ Andy Kappell on the anchor leg won their qualifying heat comfortably and went on to take the title run in 45.2.

Rice High, also trying for a triple crown in the distance medley, was far behind when Dennis Fikes, star miler, took up the baton on the final leg. It developed into a duel between Joe Savage, anchor for Roselle Catholic, and Paul Broderick for Sewanhaka. Broderick led into the stretch but Savage nipped him at the tape. Savage's mile leg was 4:17; Fikes,

Power Sets 2-Mile Meet Mark At New York Relays in 7:44.3

The old cinder track at Randall's Island will be replaced next fall by an all-weather surface but the schoolboys in yesterday's fourth annual New York Relays posted performances that would be noteworthy even on the new Tartan oval.

These included:

Power Memorial's meet record of 7 minutes 44.3 seconds in the two-mile for a sweep of the major races at that distance this spring.

Boys High's meet record of 1:26.8 in the 880 which is the fastest in the country this year.

Massapequa, with Britn McElroy, who won the invitation mile Friday, running the anchor 880 in 1:52.5, registering a meet mark of 3:28.6 in the sprint medley.

Boys 440-yard foursome tying the meet record of 42.7 seconds.

Fred Samara's outstanding double meet record victory (for the second straight year) in the pole vault (14 feet 3/4 inch) and the long jump (24 feet 3 inches), both career bests.

Many Outstanding Feats

Several other performances were also outstanding. Among these were a 4:17 anchor mile by Joe Savage of Roselle Catholic in winning the distance medley (10:25.3). Fordham Prep's 3:20.3 victory in the mile with three men under 50 seconds and Archbishop Molloy's upset of New Milford in the 360-yard shuttle hurdles in the school record time of 45.1 seconds.

Power's two-mile record was its eighth of the indoor-outdoor season and followed its stunning victory in 7:40.7 at the Penn Relays last week. The foursome of Andy Walsh (2:01), Tony Colon (1:54.8), Pete Lovett (1:55) and his brother, John, (1:53.5) lowered the record by almost 7 seconds.

"That might be our last race as a relay," Brother Beilen, Power coach, said later. "With proms and dances coming up and meets with individual races, I don't think this foursome will run again as a unit. There's an

outside chance we may run the two mile in the Eastern States in June, but that's a long way off."

Boys almost didn't make it to the finals in the 880 relay. On the first stick exchange in the heats, the Kangaroos dropped the stick and only great efforts by Trevor Matthews and Larry Brown on the third and fourth legs brought the quartet into third place and the finals.

In the finals, Boys ran flawlessly and again Matthews made the difference. Getting the stick in second place, he flew around the 220-yards in a breath-taking 20.8 seconds and Brown (21.2) breezed home an easy victor. Earl White (23 seconds) and Andy Williams (21.8) rounded out the team.

Samara of Fort Hamilton has scored eight double victories in the last two years in the pole vault and long jump. He is believed to be the only schoolboy in the nation who has enjoyed this kind of major success in this unusual double.

His triumph in the pole vault was especially sweet to him.

"I wanted to beat Conrad Watson (Watertown, Mass., High) to avenge my loss to him in the Penn Relays," the 18-year-old senior said. Watson was second at 13-6.

"I broke my left wrist during the indoor season and did not have too much practice at the vault since. But this new pole (a black Cata-Pole) is great and now that I know I can do 14 feet, I have my sights on 14-6," Samara said. His previous bests were 13-9 in the vault and 24-2 1/2 in the long jump. He also has his sights set on the decathlon where he already has competed and scored 6,500 points.

McElroy, who said he tied up badly in winning the mile Friday, said, a mile walk to a barber shop to get a haircut yesterday morning loosened him up. "You'd be surprised how a little walk like that could do it. I felt relaxed out there today," McElroy said. He ran his first 400 in 56.8 seconds.

Relays a Record Success

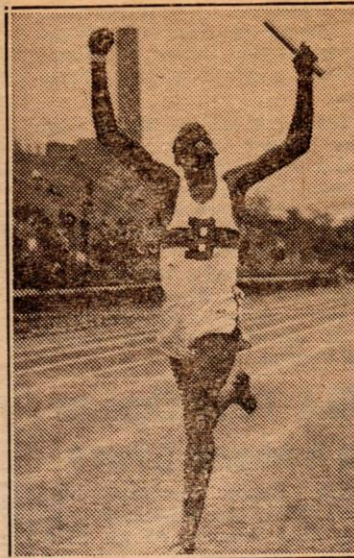
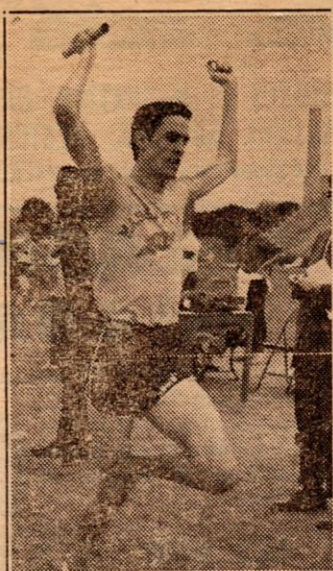
Schoolboy track stars rested on their laurels yesterday—and were never more entitled to. After two days of spectacular effort at the New York Relays at Randalls Island, they merited a collective pat on the back and a wholesale revision of the record book. Seven meet records were set and another equalled in the 18 championship events.

Boys High, which won two championships, and Power Memorial, the two-mile champ, accomplished the triple crown of schoolboy track, adding the New York Relays title to those won at the Queens-Iona and Penn Relays. The Boys High 440 foursome equalled the meet mark (42.7) and Power bettered the old two-mile standard by more than six seconds as John Lovett broke the tape at 7:44.3.

MORE DRAMATIC was the Boys High victory in the 880. A dropped baton in the qualifying heat almost eliminated the Brooklynites before they got started. Despite the drop, they finished third in the heat. In the finals, they turned in the fastest 880 in the country this year—1:26.8—shattering the old record by two seconds.

Brian McElroy Massapequa senior who set a record in the invitation mile on Friday anchored his mates to a new one in the sprint medley. On an anchor 880 of 1:52.5 Massapequa took the event for the second straight year. The record time was 3:28.8.

Roselle Catholic in the distance medley became the first New Jersey team to win a non-hurdles

relay title. Rice High defending champ also trying for a triple dropped behind on the first three legs and the race developed into a duel between Joe Savage of Roselle and Paul Broderick of Sewanhaka. Savage's 4:17 mile leg won it. Sewanhaka was disqualified when Broderick stumbled three strides from the tape and dropped the baton. Dennis Fikes, Rice's star, had a 4:17.5 mile leg but was still far behind when Savage finished.

FOR THE SECOND straight year, Fred Samara, Fort Hamilton High senior doubled and set meet records in the pole vault and long jump. Samara cleared 14' 3/4" on his second try then headed for the jumping pit. On his second leap he cleared 24' 3".

After losing at the Queens-Iona and Penn Relays, Fordham Prep made a great comeback. The Rams won the mile title with a spicy 3:20.2, fastest this year on a cinder track. Prep won the title last year too.

Molloy High, as usual, was among the champions. Coach Frank Rienzo's timber skimmers brought hurdles honors to the

city for the first time, taking the shuttle hurdles with a 45.1 clocking.

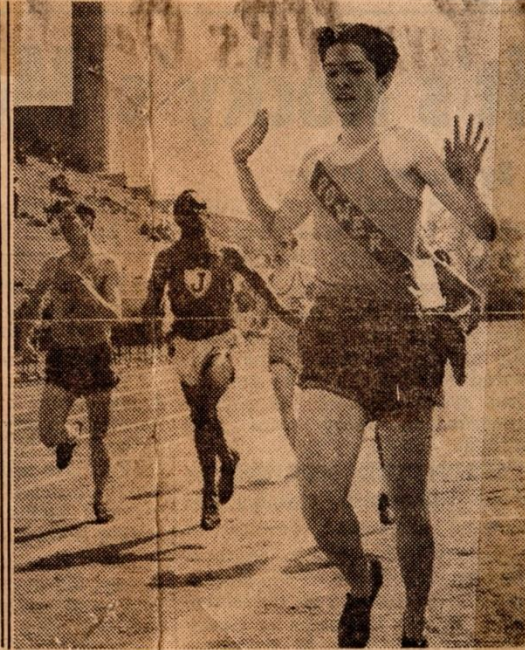

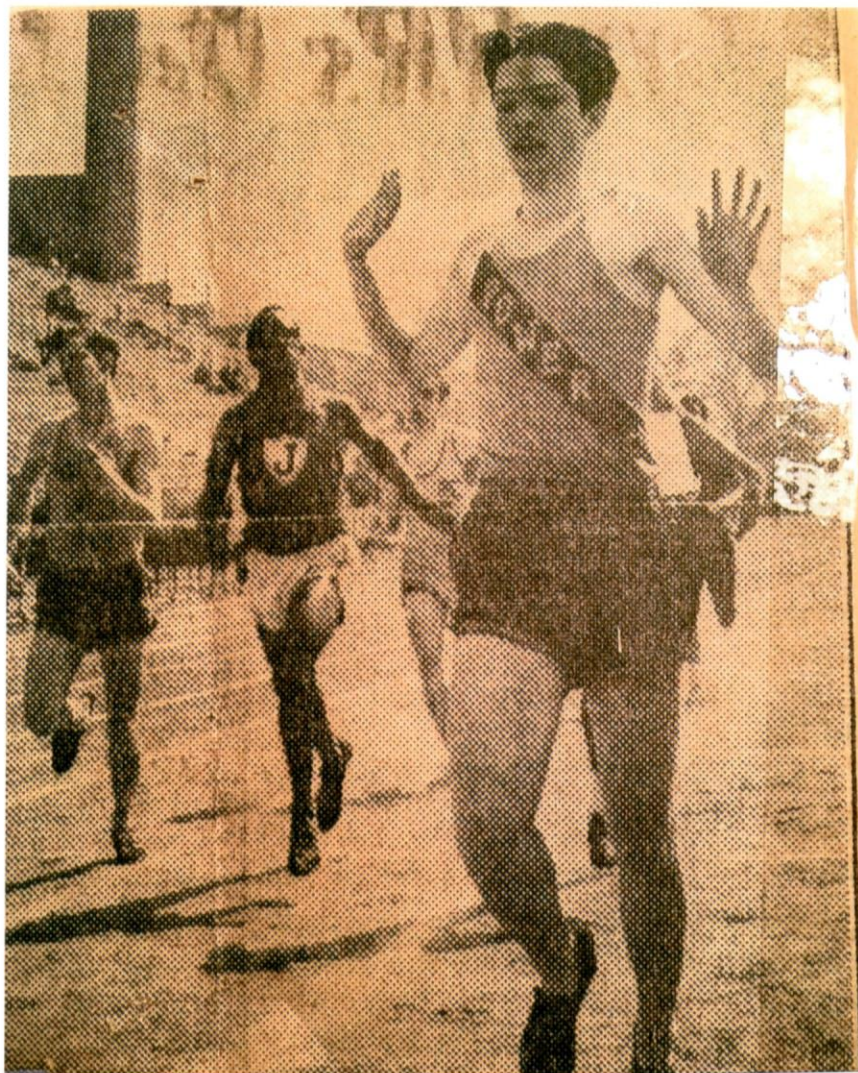

Molloy wins C.H.S.A.A. Track As a Farewell Gift to Its Coach

"What a delightful way to bow out." The speaker had a grin on his face that was almost as wide as the Triboro Bridge, which stood behind him on Randalls Island.

The happy individual was Frank Rienzo, who had just seen his Archbishop Molloy squad score 48 points to win the team title in the 41st annual Catholic High Schools Athletic Association outdoor track and field championships yesterday.

Rienzo, who has guided Molloy track fortunes for 13 years, becomes head coach at Georgetown University* next fall. Although his teams have won nine straight indoor C.H.S.A.A. titles, the outdoor crown has been more evasive. Yesterday's triumph was only the third outdoors for Molloy.

The Stanners killed the opposition with place points. The Queens school had only two

first places. Gil Peters won the 220 in 21.9 seconds and the two-mile relay team was first in 7:54.2. The two-mile four-some of Tom McGloin (2:00.7), Jim Gay (1:58), Jim Freely (1:57.1) and Ted DiBlasi (1:58.4) set a meet record with its time.

Four other meet marks were set. Best of these was the 4 minutes 13.8 seconds turned in by Denis Fikes of Rice in the one-mile run. The talented 17-year-old athlete also was credited with a New York State record for a third-year student. The previous state mark for juniors was 4:14.4, set by Dan Supulski of Dansville, N. Y.

The other records went to Brian Bozzone of Nazareth in the high jump (6 feet 4 inches), Pat Keane, Chaminade, in the 120-yard high hurdles (14.4 seconds) and Henry Szczepanski Loughlin, in the discus throw (162 feet 5 inches). Bozzone's victory was his 16th in 18 outings, indoors and outdoors.

SEWANHAKA STAR CLOCKED IN 9:18.5

Beats Field by 100 Yards After Fikes Drops Out— Team Title to Boys

A competitive two-mile run was reduced to a runaway and an outstanding racing form was reduced substantially in the Eastern interscholastic track championships at Downing Stadium on Randalls Island yesterday.

Denis Fikes of Rice, running even with Paul Broderick of Sewanhaka in the two-mile, the showcase event of this 33th annual meet, dropped out with two laps to go. Broderick proceeded, with effortless motion, to whip the remaining field and post a 100-yard victory. He was timed in 9 minutes 18.5 seconds, a meet record.

Fikes later said: "I'm just exhausted. I didn't feel too well from the start of the race."

Marty Walsh, a junior from New Dorp, won the one-mile run in 4:19.1 just moments before a huge downpour, accompanied by bolts of lightning, flooded the track. Competition was delayed for 25 minutes and resumed on a cinder track that was soggy, slow—and therefore dangerous.

FIKES AND LOVETT SET TRACK RECORDS

Denis Fikes of Rice in the mile (4 minutes 21.5 seconds) and John Lovett of Power in the 880 (1:53.6) set meet records yesterday in running events of the Athletic Association of Private Schools championships at Mount St. Michael Field, the Bronx.

Lovett eclipsed the record of 1:54 by Riccardo Urbina of McClancy, set in 1963.

Power Eyes 2d Straight Triple in N.Y. Relays

Anchored by Tony Colon, one of the country's top schoolboy track stars, Power Memorial High sprinted in with a firm bid for a second straight triple relay crown yesterday.

It came from Brother Bielen, coach of the crack quartet from the W. 61st St. school. "We hope to clinch the triple at the New York Relays," he said. "We tripled last year, we can do it again."

Sponsored by THE NEWS and the Spiked Shoe Club of Fordham Prep, the New York meet, the wind-up of the relay season, is slated for Randalls Island, Friday, May 1, and Saturday, May 2. It follows the Queens-Iona and Penn Relays as the last of the major schoolboy track carnivals. The triple crown involves winning the same event in all three meets.

LAST YEAR, Power tripled in the two-mile with Pete and John Lovett, Andy Walsh and the current anchorman, Colon. Despite the loss of all but Colon, Brother Bielen suspects his new team is even better. Power Memorial High Victor In Distance Medley in 10:13.4

PHILADELPHIA, April 24—With raindrops falling on his head, Tony Colon outsmarted and outfought Joe Savage of Roselle (N. J.) Catholic to give Power Memorial the championship today in the schoolboy distance medley at the Penn Relays.

Colon made his move past the leader, Denis Fikes of Rice, on the backstretch and then held off a desperate bid by Savage off the final turn to win by 5 yards. Power was clocked in 10 minutes 13.4 seconds, good time on a very wet track.

"He [Savage] waited too long," Colon said after the race. "I said to myself on the turn 'If he's going to come, I'm ready.' I felt very strong. That slow 880 helped."

The Power senior, who ran 4:14.2 for his mile, was right. Savage, who is considered a better miler than Colon, was clocked in 4:12.7, but his running strategy was a mystery. He started 15 yards behind Fikes and Colon in fourth place, and made no move to challenge the leaders until the last lap. He ran a slow 2:11.5 first half.

Actually it was Fikes, who won this title for Rice last year, who decided on the slow pace. He was given the stick in first place, 2 yards up on Colon. The Rice senior immediately cut the pace and in time, Savage was only 5 yards behind but still fourth.

Fikes led at the 440 in a slow 1:05 and the half in 2:12.3 with Colon on his heels. The 18-year-old Power senior made his move on the backstretch while Fikes, who ran 4:18.8, faltered for the second straight week and Savage made his futile bid on the last turn.

Savage, heartsick, left Franklin Field after the race. His pre-race instructions were to hold off from the pace if he was behind until the last lap, but he miscle-

Savage, beaten yesterday by Tony Colon of Power Memorial in the distance medley "by my own stupidity," outlasted Colon today in a memorable last lap battle for the two-mile championship that had the big crowd at Franklin Field cheering wildly.

The 6-foot-3-inch Roselle Catholic senior, touched off 12 yards behind Colon on the anchor half-mile, drew alongside of Colon with 250 yards to go and the two matched stride-for-stride from that point on until the head of the stretch. Then with 60 yards left, Colon finally broke stride while Savage maintained his drive and hit the tape a five-yard winner in 7 minutes 49.2 seconds.

Lincoln, with Keith Davis turning in two sparkling anchor legs, led the Phil Payne forces to the school's first championship victories in the Penn Relays. The Lions made up for 30 years of drought with two exciting races, including a meet record of 3:15.4 in the mile relays.

Davis, touched off four yards behind Bill Collins of Mount Vernon, stayed behind for over 300 yards, but as he hit the turn he shifted into high gear and went whizzing past Collins. The Mount Vernon senior came

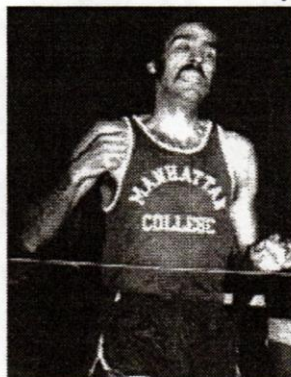

Dear Sir:

I would appreciate a few moments from your busy schedule. Please do not be confused by my current address. I was born and raised and lived for 27 years in New York City; the Washington Heights and Riverdale area. I continue to work in New York City at Bristol-Myers - a 1982 sponsor (BUFFERIN). I have competed in this year's Heights-Inwood 10 K race with a time of 39:28, but I had to miss the Riverdale Ramble due to prior commitments. In addition other races this year include the Corporate Challenge series and the Rockaway Boardwalk Run. I competed at Power Memorial Academy (1965-1969) at the High School level and Fordham University (1969-1973) at the collegiate level.

During the past ten years the business world, graduate school and raising two boys, now ages four and two have sapped most of the available time that I might have otherwise devoted to running.

As a child of the advent of television, (I am currently 32 years old), I was often influenced by what I viewed on television. Last year's coverage of the New York Marathon on ABC had a similiar influence. I began training the following day, October 25, with the express intention of competing in this year's race.

While not of the caliber of worldclass or even top flight local class road runners, my workouts are currently in the 40-60 miles per week range, stressing quality (5:30-6:30 per mile) versus quantity. (I have been keeping a log since October 25th). My personal goal is to break three hours. Having expended so much time imagine my disappointment on August 25th when a REJECTION NOTICE appeared in my mail.

I have been a supporter of the New York Marathon since the days when it was known as the CENTRAL PARK MARATHON. I competed along with a FEW HUNDRED people in the 1971 race running in the Top 20-30 through half the race before dropping out due to Cross Country championships at Van Cortlandt Park the next week.

Perhaps as an expression of thanks for support when the race was young, I might obtain an entry to this year's race.

Thank you for your time.

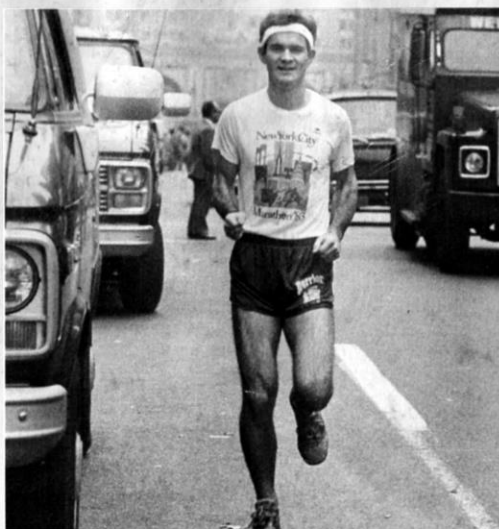

Andy Walsh Keeps Pace in NYC Marathon

Sunday, October 23 will stay on Andy Walsh's mind for some time to come. That morning, he ran more than 26 miles – in the New York City Marathon. With 3:22 finish, the Assistant Sales Administrative Manager for the Products Division placed 3,891 in a field of approximately 17,000. Not bad.

Still Andy was disappointed. He had hoped to break three hours even in bone-chilling rain and cold. "Every part of my body ached at the end," he recalls. "I had terrible cramps from the hips down."

He'd been setting a speedy six minute mile pace until the last stretch when, virtually crippled by the pain,

it took him over an hour to cover the last six miles.

Andy was a high school and college cross country and middle distance runner. He returned to running last year.

It wasn't easy. At first, Andy ran only nine minute miles and could only squeeze the run in at 10 PM. He ran a hilly course near his home in Rochelle Park, New Jersey. Eventually, the work paid off. Nine minute miles became six minute miles; three-and-a-half mile courses stretched to 10 miles at one time, then 12 and eventually 20. He decided he was ready for the New York City Marathon.

Runners for the annual marathon are chosen by chance. Except for a few well-known runners who are invited to enter, everyone else mails in an application and is then picked by lottery. Andy wasn't among those picked this year.

Crushed, he decided to appeal. After all, he's raced as a schoolboy in New York, and had once run half of an earlier version of the New York City Marathon. In mid-August, he got the decision—he was in.

"I wasn't a bit nervous, but I was really caught up in the carnival atmosphere of it all," Andy says. "People clapping like mad and cheering me on, kids holding their hands out along the course for me to slap them five and my family on First Avenue screaming my name. Fantastic!" ■

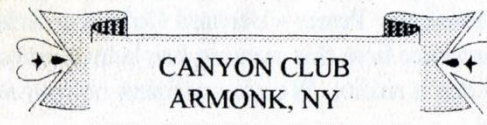

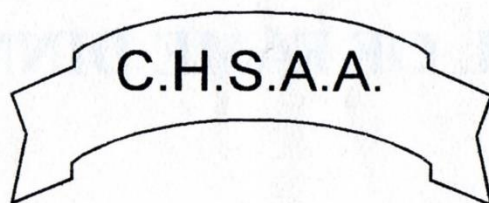

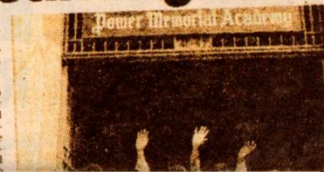

Power's last game gets title

The city and national championship basketball teams in the huge athletic success Power Memorial had over the years—built proudly on the walls of the Panthers gymnasium on Manhattan's W. 61st St.

If one studied them, it showed great athletic achievement, especially in basketball and cross-country. And on Friday night—probably the last basketball game ever at Power—the talented Panthers crushed a strong All-Hallows quintet, 70-50, clinching a New York Archdiocesan championship with their 12th win in a row. The way Steve Donohue's five is playing, they could add city and state title banners. But there will be no spot on the wall for them. The school is closing in June.

It was the last hurrah. Excitement abounded as the gymnasium tradition continued in the ancient gymnasium as the last group of Panthers led by All-America candidate Melvin Kennedy, went through their paces. A packed house cheered every move. This was not a memorial. Power showed every move. Then the game ended and the realization hit—it's all over.

BUT LIKE in any athletic event, the fight to keep the school open will go down to the bitter end. The overflow crowd listened and cheered speeches before the game. Speeches telling the throng about the legal ways they are fighting the Congregation of Christian Brothers who dropped the bombshell last November. The bombshell that they were selling the property in the shadow of Lincoln Center. But the way teachers, alumni and friends of Power are battling to the bitter end. Power won't go down easily.

Kennedy, a 6-5 husky youth who could be the last superstar at Power, reminisced about the school. "I went to Aviation my freshman year," said Kennedy, who has accepted an athletic scholarship to Virginia. "My marks were bad. But a friend and my coach Larry Feltz, star of the last Power championship team told me about Power. I never thought of going to a Catholic school. I was young and had no guidance. So I decided to try it. I'm glad I did."

My academics became sound. I benefited from the small class numbers, the way they made you study and saw my grades rise into the mids. And athletically, it's the best."

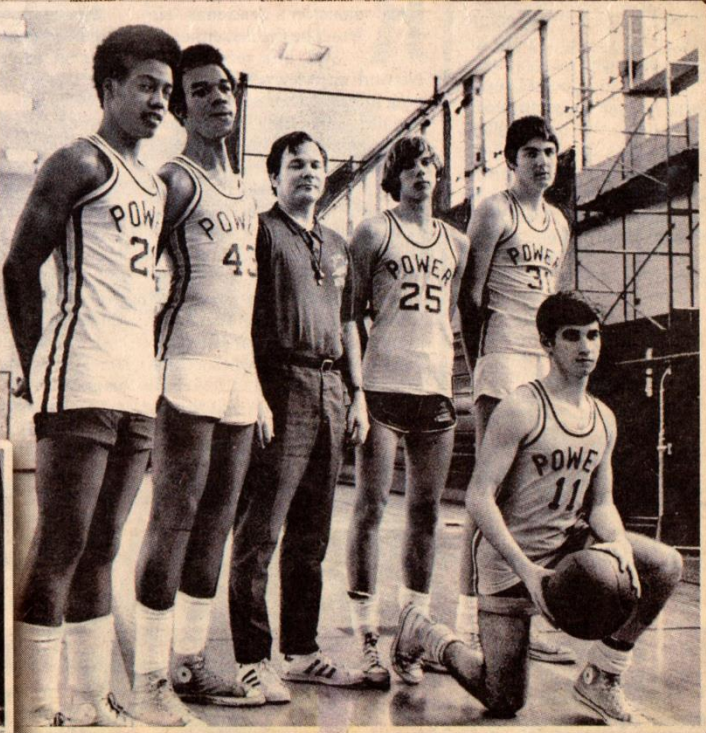
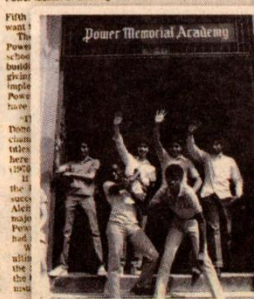
KENNEDY is graduating as the closing is just a few days away. But for players like Barry Walker and James Fryer, typical Power students, where does the future lie?

"I try not to think about it," claimed Walker, a 6-7 junior. "A coach upstairs told me one going to the school. He told me about the great traditions. Now what?"

While Walker didn't want to think about the future, point guard James Fryer did. "I'm really not over the shock," said Fryer, whose intention is the starting lineup in December has helped the Panthers through their ups and downs. "I've upseen 13th St.

Legacy of fabled school transcends basketball court

BEFORE LEN ELMORE became a 10-year ABA and NBA player, an assistant district attorney in Brooklyn or an ESPN college basketball commentator, he was a willowy kid from South Jamaica, Queens, making a two-hour daily commute to Power Memorial Academy on W. 61st St. in Manhattan.

"We didn't have a football team," said Elmore. "The track and baseball teams were good, but basketball defined the sports program. In many ways, it defined Power."

Elmore, 59, whose 1970 team won the city championship, became one of many students from New York City and its suburbs to be drawn by basketball to the West-Side school.

The discipline enforced by the Irish Christian Brothers stuck with those who walked its hallways; it remains vivid, even today.

"The length of your hair, the length of your pants, how you dressed, everything," said NBA Hall of Famer Kareem Abdul-Jabbar, who was named Lew Alcindor when he led Power to a 71-game winning streak from 1963-1965 and three CHSAA championships. "Everything had to be the prescribed way that they wanted things done."

The grandeur of Power was on display Saturday, at the school's 80th anniversary dinner and Hall of Fame induction ceremony, held at 630 Second Ave. in Manhattan.

In addition to Elmore and Abdul-Jabbar, honorees included Rep. Joseph Crowley, a U.S. congressman from Queens; former New York City Council Speaker Peter F. Vallone; Bishop Gerald Walsh, the director of St. Joseph's Seminary; and business owner Terrence McAdams.

The school, which closed in 1984, sent students into the world to excel in finance, politics and elsewhere. Its impact on sports, however, is still felt.

"The importance of having a tranquil place to learn and also learning about basketball, that was the key component," said Arthur Kenney, who played with Abdul-Jabbar at St. Jude's parish in Inwood and later on the 1963 and 1964 championship teams. "And it wasn't just basketball," he added. "It was learning to get along with other people."

Power's three straight CHSAA championships under coach Jack Donohue marked it as a dynasty. Only St. Francis Prep (1955-57) and Tolentine (1980-82) have matched the feat.

"Those were really dominating teams when (Abdul-Jabbar) was there," said Tom Konchalski, the Forest Hills-based basketball scout. "The loss to DeMatha (to break the 71-game winning streak) was their only loss in his last three years."

Basketball defined Power. But speak to former basketball players from the school, and a deeper understanding is evident.

"I went to a Catholic school even though I wasn't a Catholic," said Elmore. "But the underpinnings (of the faith), the understanding of the mores, how to deal with fellow man, I think a lot of that kind of resides in me."

Elmore recalled the journey that led him to Power.

"My father worked for the Department of Sanitation," said Elmore. "My mother was a clerk. It was a struggle to send me to Power."

"I had to sweep the floors, clean the school (to help pay for tuition). Really, it made sense to me: if you want something, you have to work for it."

When Elmore was a freshman at the University of Maryland, he struggled, missing class and lacking discipline. It was the words of his old coach at Power, Jack Kuhnert, that led him back.

"Things started getting out of control," said Elmore. "That's when I realized, this is what I learned at Power."

The proceeds from the dinner will fund two Power Memorial Academy scholarships, worth \$2,500 per year over a four-year period. The two recipients, who are chosen based on financial need, attend All Hallows—also an Irish Christian Brothers school—and St. Agnes.

"We look for a boy that has the spirit of giving to others," said Andrew (Chick) Pisani, the president of Power's Alumni Association. "(A student with) a good sense of strong values. That's the legacy we want to carry on."
